### Wedding at Macleay.

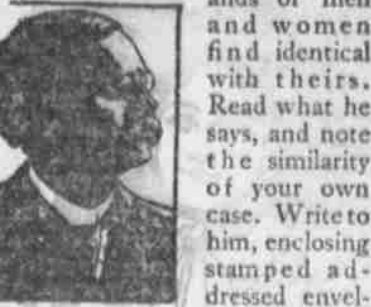
