GOV. GEER SHOVELS DIRT

At Opening of the Bohemia Railroad

Gets a Great Ovation at Cottage Grove, Lane Co.

COTTAGE GROVE, May 1.—The greatest gathering here in many years assembled at the breaking of dirt on the new railroad into the Bohemia mining region. The affair was got up on two days notice.

The Exercises.

Rev. Beck offered a prayer and the mayor, B. R. Job, called to order and delivered an address on the great enterprise here launched. He paid a glowing tribute to the peerless resources of Lane county. He grew eloquent over the undeveloped lumber and mining business and introduced Gov. T. D. Geer. He received a great demonstration of applause and referred humorously to the strife that formerly existed between Cottage Grove and Lemah, but now all dwell in peace and harmony. Gov. Geer said he now repeated what he had often said, that Lane county enjoyed a greater degree of prosperity than any county in the state, and it was due to her enterprising people and great natural resources. He referred to the enormous mining industry and practically inexhaustible timber wealth, paid a deserved tribute to the beautiful county seat of Eugene.

This railroad would develop Cottage Grove and the Bohemia country and no part of the country can prosper without all being benefited. Bohemia had long needed this railroad and was destined to become one of the greatest mining camps in the west. He spoke of the great wealth coming from a good soil and climate, but it was still to be carved with a climax of industrial wealth that would flow from this enterprise. He said that Cottage Grove was truly the place where the rocks and brooks and valleys with milk and honey flow, the meadows green with verdure and the mountains clad with snow.

As he closed Mayor Job offered him a shovel that seemed a great deal too short for the Governor, and he humorously remarked that this was not the first and he never broke. As he descended from the platform he was followed by the crowd to the starting point of the railroad.

"See the Governor dig?" "He's all right!" were cries that rent the air as he threw the first shovelful of dirt. Three great cheers rent the air and then a tiger was given with a good will.

Later a reference to Mrs. Geer being present brought a round of applause from the thousands of farmers and town people present.

About twenty stalwart Swedes were pitching a camp near preparatory to going to work at grading. Another group arrived from Eastern Oregon on the next train and there is great life and activity here.

City of Cottage Grove has raised about \$3000 to help buy the right of way, which is all secured for the 22 miles that is contracted. The whole line will be 36 miles long. The road runs through several belts of fine timber on the Row river and will be made to pay as a lumber line from the start.

The Evening Reception

Surpassed in cordiality anything that has ever been witnessed in this part of the state. At 8 o'clock the largest hall in the city was packed to the street and the ushers had to clear a passage for Gov. and Mrs. Geer and the other guests of honor. The hall was festively decorated in the national colors and Oregon fir and as the party entered the audience rose and cheered.

After music by the band Mayor Job called to order. The audience was one of those splendid Oregon assemblages that are unequalled anywhere in the world for looks and average intelligence. Gov. Geer got another ovation when he was introduced, after the band had played, and playfully alluded to the fact that he had once before addressed them and no one should be punished twice for the same offense.

He pictured the great changes that had occurred since the country was settled, all of which he had witnessed since his boyhood. He pictured a still more hopeful future for Oregon and showed that a rapidly increasing population would produce still more wonderful changes. He said the state of Oregon was in better condition today than ever before, and that no state in the Union was in better condition than Oregon industrially or financially. Applauded.

Among the visitors who sat on the platform at the evening reception and made speeches were Senators Booth and Kuykendall and S. H. Friendly of Eugene.
