THE HUMOR OF THE SITUATION.

County Commissioner Mack has sued Harvey Scott for libel. His attorney is Wilson T. Hume, and there hangs a tale. Hume is the man who, with Dan Malarkey, was roasted out of existence in the Oregonian, when he ran for senator as a Mitchell-Republican against Joe Simon, in 1898. Hume went to Alaska, and has not been heard from for some time, until he shows up in a big lawsuit to cinch the Portland paper for its libels on County Commissioner Mack. The fun in all this situation is that when Scott and Glass, and others, were with the Simon machine a year ago, the commissioners, Mack, Showers and Steel, were their meat, and had complete control of the political situation. A bill was passed to put Steel off the board, and make Judge Calkins a member of the county commissioners' court, and thus Mitchellize the board. Scott, Glass, McGinn et al. howled over this outrage, and demanded that Governor Geer veto the bill, as it struck a blow at the vitals of the Simon machine. Hall, Carey, Calkins, Fulton, et al., rallied around Governor Geer and begged him not to support the bill, and Geer listened to their siren song about a promised renomination, and the Scott-Glass crowd played their last bow. They had one of their faithful pull the alleged receipt Governor Geer is accused of having given to the Hon. H. H. Plummer, agreeing over an alleged gubernatorial signature to appoint him superintendent of the state prison, in consideration of a large sum. They said to the governor, veto that bill to turn the county court of Multnomah county over to the Mitchellites, and we will give you this receipt, and it will never be heard from again. Governor Geer is said to have got mad, for once in his life, told them he would not give two cents for

It, and showed them the door. He said there might be fifty such forgeries in existence, and he was not being clabbed into vetoes that way. From that time on there was nothing but a cold stream of abuse for the county commissioners, who could not be legislated out of existence, and for the governor who could not be coerced there was no place on the ticket. When it was found that there was a majority of the commissioners still loyal to the regular organization, Scott and Glass lined up with the Mitchell machine, and locked arms with Hall, Carey and Calkins, to down the man the latter had promised to protect if he would not veto their bill. As the county board has control of the naming of primary and election officers, it will be seen where the shoe pinched Scott and Glass, and why they switched in their loyalty to the Simon faction. The man who has sued Scott for libel was referred to as the Republican leader who, with Malarkey, was a monkey in 1898, and the question was asked in the Oregonian, if the priest is a monkey—what must be the God of such a party? That libel suit will furnish some interesting revelations, and make the Oregonian's inconsistencies complete.

CONFESSIONS OF THE SUGAR TRUST.

Before the United States senate committee investigating the sugar trust, President Havemeyer, of the American Sugar Company, was asked: "Do you get Porto Rican sugar any cheaper because all the duties have been taken off?" "Not at all," was his answer. "If the tariff rates were reduced one-third of a cent a pound on Cuban sugar, would you get it that much cheaper?" "We might get it 1-16th of a cent a pound less."

This confession amounts to a statement that free trade with Porto Rico does not cripple the beet sugar industry of the United States. The market of the rest of the world for raw sugar, and the demand for raw sugar is so great that Hamburg, Germany, fixes the price. Reciprocity with Cuba to the amount of 20 per cent. with Cuba would not kill the American beet sugar industry.

MR. FULTON'S DEFENCE.

Senator Fulton's defence of his record in the legislature—that is what his campaign speech for Mr. Furnish amounts to—is clever, but it is not full of inspiration for the taxpayer. While other states are bending their energies to lowering their state taxes on property, Oregon's state tax went up to the unusual figure of 7.4 mills. New York this year levies three-eighths mill state tax, Ohio, Iowa and other states almost no tax, and many states are doing away with it altogether, and they are Republican states, too. In the last legislature, of which Mr. Fulton was the presiding genius, many good bills were introduced to raise revenue. But all were killed or pigeon-holed. Will Mr. Fulton deny that? No, but he will send heavenward that perpetual spout about the bravery of our soldiers, the inquiry of lowering our flag in the Philippines, and how much less it costs Oregon to be governed than some other states with greater population and wealth. And the indications are that the people will swallow his political wind pudding, and dig up more taxes. The Journal has repeatedly said that Oregon would not get to the bottom of the slide until Fulton and Brownell were put in complete control, and it bids fair to come true.

OHIO'S NEW TAX LAW.

The Ohio legislature has just enacted a tax law by the terms of which the quasi-public corporations will contribute the larger part of the state's future revenue, for they will be required to pay a tax of one per cent on their gross incomes.

At the same time all private corporations formed for the purpose of profit will pay one-tenth of one per cent on their capital stock.

The two will add over \$2,000,000 a year to the state treasury, and they are the main steps in Governor Nash's taxation plan, which, when fully carried out, will work an entire reorganization in the tax system of the state.

They are the main steps toward bringing about a condition in which direct property taxes are as a means of securing revenue for the state government will be entirely abandoned, while every cent of the necessary money will be secured from corporations in one form or another.

The property taxes, both on real estate and on personality, are to be left to the counties and municipalities exclusively. In this way the state board of equalization will no longer have any reason for existence, as it

will make no difference to one part of the state how high or how low the assessment is in another part, and the abolition of the board will normally follow.

In carrying out the scheme still further, a bill will be passed by both house and senate this week, levying a tax of 2 1/2 per cent of their premiums on all foreign insurance companies doing business in the state, whereby \$800,000 a year will probably be raised.

ARE THERE NO NEW ISSUES?

Some of the Republican orators would have people believe this state campaign is to be composed only of the old issues between the parties. How then would it be possible to make any progress? New issues are constantly springing up. The old die and pass away.

For instance the Furnish campaign managers would like to have the people entirely go blind to the fact that appropriations made by the last legislature require state revenues for this fiscal year amounting to \$1,100,718.06 (see page 10, pamphlet on appropriation of state taxes for 1920).

That is one new issue that the board who controlled that legislature wish to lose sight of.

THE ISSUE ON STATE PRINTER.

Your vote for state printer should be guided by your judgment as to \$2500, instead of \$25,000. If you are an honest man, and a well-wisher of the state, and favor a little common honesty in public affairs, you will vote for Jim Godfrey.

A reform of that office that will satisfy F. C. Baker, and with men like Jack Matthews and W. P. Keady "holding cases" on the printer nominated by the Republicans dictating its terms would be a corker.

The circulation of one small paper like The Journal cannot bring the situation home to more than a fraction of the voters of the state. But candidate Chamberlain hammers it into the minds of every meeting he addresses.

Senator Fulton and Candidate Furnish are silent on the monster printing graft. They dare not tell the people the truth, and let the daylight of facts into it. Oregonian ditto.

This is a business proposition, and if Mr. Furnish is to be solely a business governor he ought to be willing to talk a little "business" on this matter of state printing.

Elect Godfrey at \$2500 a year. Abolish the office of salaried expert; abolish the expensive biennial legislative whitewash; abolish the lobby that works the legislature to run up bills for printing.

For the sake of decent government and honest Republicanism, don't extend the Jack Matthews graft to Salem. Confine it to the fourth ward in Portland.
