CHAMBERLAIN VERSUS FULTON.

There is nothing cheaper than for a man like Senator Fulton to get out and whoop and howl in the name of patriotism—when he knows that he has a partisan majority back of him. No one ever catches this class of thrifty patriots doing anything for the cause of reform, unless they feel sure there is a good big, safe majority of the people that can be appealed to for partisan purposes—and a graft. That is purely gratuitous camp following that shields and defends and excuses all existing abuses for the sake of keeping in with the party that has a right to deliver. But it is the last refuge of those who prey on the poor, blind and deluded taxpayer—wave the flag and tell how our brave soldiers bled in order that some scoundrel may keep his grip on the public trust, and cling to the manger of fat official place with both hands. No wonder Mr. Fulton is on the defensive, while Geo. E. Chamberlain rakes him fore and aft with the cold facts that tell the story of the necessity of a change in Oregon. Chamberlain deserves great credit for his noble and fearless exposure of the \$50,000 of excessive fees and perquisites now taken from the people by the state officials every year. Even if Fulton is elected Chamberlain will be the taxpayers' champion.

UNBLUSHING INSINCERITY.

The Journal is getting credit where it deserves none for printing Mr. Fulton's campaign speech in full alongside of Mr. Chamberlain's. It should be the duty of any fair, respectable newspaper to print such news. The "only" paper in Portland lowered itself in the estimation of all decent people when it failed or refused to print Mr. Chamberlain's speech, because it was a vivid arraignment of the very grafts that in times past the Oregonian has denounced, but now, it has got in with what it termed "the

associated gang of grafters." It keeps silent about. All its posing of high moral attitudes and its loud denunciations of others for not being pure and disinterested in their public relations fall to the ground. Its inconsistencies have reached the climax, and it is to be regretted that its usefulness for good government has been almost completely obliterated by an unparalleled record of unblushing insincerity.

ASTORIA WANTS THE EARTH.

Astoria now has the fastest office in the state, secretary of state, and wants the other biggest office—the United States senatorship—a big undertaking for the little city by the sea. The Astoria News has the following editorial on Geer and Fulton and as it is supposed to be the personal organ of Secretary Dunbar and Senator Fulton, who leads the fight for Fulton, it is interesting:

"The true leader of the party or of the people is not a self-seeker. If he chances to aspire to an office, and is defeated, he never 'beefs.' 'It is the will of the people,' says the skillful leader. Then the people applaud. They feel that he has bowed to their will, and straightway a kindly feeling for the defeated comes to their breast, and he is stronger to lead, when he essays the task again. 'The politician who sues after defeat always goes down. A man from Eastern Oregon is filling that role now in the Republican party. He will be relegated to the rear. It is said that Governor Geer has been asked to take the stump for Fulton. If he is a shrewd politician he will jump at the chance to gain a warmer nod in the party heart. 'Senator Fulton is the ideal politician. He always stands ready to forward the claims of his party associates who have received the party nomination. Even though he may not be satisfied, even though he may feel a keen disappointment, he always bows to the voice of the people. 'Today he is leading the hosts of his party. The campaign that opened at Astoria found him the rallying point of his party from one end of the state to the other. He is the true leader of the party.'

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ANOTHER OPINION OF THE PHILIPPINES.

A soldier who has seen service for a year or two in the Philippines writes of the islands less glowingly than do some who have never been there. Two of his paragraphs read as follows: "The principal exports of the island are rice, hemp, silk, soldiers and contagious diseases. The principal imports are American soldiers, ammunition, arms, warm beer and tobacco. Malaria is so common that on numerous occasions the islands have been seized with a chill. Manila, the capital and principal city, is situated on Manila bay, a large land-locked body of water, full of filth, sharks and submarine boats which the United States government has forgotten to raise. Cavite, the next city of importance, is noted for its natural facilities, its naval station, its large number of natives and Chinese. The town is an aggregation of sharks, full of filth, dogs, cats, pigs, monkeys, bedbugs, lice, lice and family all sleep together on terms of equality. "The Philippines would be an appropriate present for a deadly enemy. The natives are friendly at the point of the bayonet. The climate is pleasant and healthy for tarantulas, roaches, scorpions, centipedes, snakes, alligators and lizards. The soil is adapted to raising foul odors and breeding disease, and the islands in general are a God-forsaken, cannibalized, Aguinado-infected blot on the face of God's green earth. "This is a side of the Philippine question that we are not getting from the politicians, but it is a side which ought to be known. It is easy for one who has been in tropical countries, and has seen how at least some of 'the other half lives,' to believe that this soldier tells more truth than is told by ordinary visitors to the islands.

AGAINST LEASING RANGE LANDS.

Candidate for Congressman Williamson is out strong against leasing range lands. This is a leading and plausible feature of the Republican platform. It is a notorious fact that if leasing public lands to cattle monopolists is the abuse it is now claimed to be, the faction in control of the party at present are the fathers of it. Mitchell, McBride, Hermann, et al., have enacted the laws, controlled the administration of it, and their friends have reaped the benefits of this un-American fraud.
