YOUNG
MEN'S
CLUB

Holds a Rally at the City
Hall

Speeches by Frank Davey,
Claud Gatch and Others

The Young Men's Republican Club
opened the campaign Monday night,
with an enthusiastic meeting at the
police court room, in the city hall.

Stirring addresses were delivered by
some of Salem's prominent Republi-
cans and members of the county legis-
lative ticket. Claud Gatch, president
of the Salem Republican Club, was the
principal speaker, and delivered one
of his characteristic political speech-
es. W. J. Furnish, Republican nomi-
nee for governor, and other Demo-
crats, who came to the aid of the Re-
publican party when silver was the
issue, were praised and eulogized as
patriots, whose love of country sur-
passed their partisanship. Mr. Gatch
concluded his address by eloquently
paying a tribute to the memory of Lin-
coln and Grant. His remarks were fre-
quently interrupted with applause.

E. M. Croisan, candidate for state
senator, was called for, but spoke only
briefly. He said young men made no
mistake in affiliating with the Republi-
cans—the party that always took a
positive stand on the great questions,
and was always right.

Frank Davey, candidate for repre-
sentative, expressed great interest in
any project undertaken by young men
of any community, for any political ar-
rangement having the intelligent back-
ing of the young men must be in the
right direction. The young men had
always been a factor in the preserva-
tion of their country. After discussing
the silver issue, Mr. Davey waded into
the expansion question, and said it
was ill-advised for young men to ally
themselves with a party whose record
was "black with treason, and ever
showing a disposition to tear down."

Mr. Davey defined the initiative and
referendum, and explained the opera-
tion of these two powers of legisla-
tion, proposed to be vested in the peo-
ple. He said he did not believe the
measure would bring to the people the
amount of good that was expected of it.
Some good would come of it, and, be-
ing a question of general interest,
every elector should vote upon the
constitutional amendment that has been
proposed. The speaker continued by
saying if the people are corrupt, any
power placed in their hands might be
wrongly used. If the people can be
corrupted along one line, the speaker
argued that they could on other lines.

He concluded his remarks by advising
the young men to stand for purity of
politics.

"Senator" Farrar was called for, and
responded with a brief, business-like
and pointed talk, in which he credited
the present position of the Republican
party and its successful record of the
past 45 years to the policies that had
been adopted and advocated.

T. B. Kay, also of the legislative
ticket, in a few minutes' talk, ex-
plained that the reason he was a Re-
publican was because the principles
and policies advocated by that party
had always been for the best interests
of the country. He gave a rattling
good Republican talk, and surprised
many of his friends, who had some
how formed the idea that Tom Kay
could not talk. Mr. Kay will prove a
valuable speaker for the Republicans
on the joint canvass. He makes no at-
tempt at oratory, but, for a straight
business talk, he is an interesting and
forceful speaker, and is capable of di-
recting more hot shot into the ene-
my's camp than can be received with-
out consternation.

The Marion county central com-
mittee presented the club with a large
picture of Banker Furnish. The same
will be framed, and the club passed a
vote of thanks for the photo. An ap-
preciation of the addresses of the eve-
ning was framed and passed.

At the business meeting of the club,
it was decided to organize both a flam-
beau and cymbal club. Committees
were appointed as follows: Flambeau
—W. E. Richardson, J. L. Patton, Peter
Grabner, Fred Fontaine; cymbal—C. A.
Hort, J. H. Campbell, Jr., W. D. Ev-
ans and E. H. Lampert.

Committee on program was named
consisting of C. M. Inman, C. L. Mc-
Nary and H. C. Epley. The club will
hold meetings every Monday evening
during the campaign.

CITY'S
FUNDS
GROW

Larger Receipts Than for
Years Past

The financial condition of our city
is growing better and better as time
rolls around, and reports from the city
recorder's office show that the receipts
from that department this year already
nearly equal the total of last year's
income. The total receipts for 1901,
from the recorder's office, were \$9847,
while up to date this year there has
been received \$9720. This, of course,
includes the \$5000 bond forfeit, but it
is the judgment of City Recorder Ju-
dah that receipts from this source
will aggregate \$10,000 this year, over
and above this bond money. All city
warrants are called to date, and there
is cash on hand to meet this month's
bills.

In the Marion County Cam-
paign

Private Circular Issued by
L. H. McMahan

A circular has been issued for pri-
vate circulation by L. H. McMahan,
candidate for senator on the Demo-
cratic ticket in this county, in which
he exploits the alleged record of E. M.
Croisan, Republican nominee for
state senator, when Croisan was sher-
iff in 1888 to 1892.

The McMahan circular contains cop-
ies of bills that Croisan got allowed by
the county court each month, under
the then existing fee system, that Mc-
Mahan claims was worked as a graft
against the county to the amount of
hundreds of dollars.

Mr. McMahan indicts Mr. Croisan
generally for being a thrifty official
and taking all that the law allowed him
to take, and charges him taking some
besides, although Mr. Croisan can
show the law under which he took all
that he received while he was sheriff.
The fee laws of fourteen years ago
allowed a great deal that has been
wiped off the books since then. What
seemed right in 1888 seems to be a
clear steal at present. Mr. Croisan
and his friends will doubtless be heard
from in the campaign and the question
of who will make the better senator,
he or Mr. McMahan, will be fully
aired.

SATURDAY

Experting of Marion Records
About Completed

County Court Has Much Busi-
ness To Transact.

Experts Clark and Buchanan, ex-
pert accountants, who have been ex-
amining the records of the Marion
county officers, have practically com-
pleted their work on the records, and
are now preparing their report to the
county court. The gentlemen expect
to have their report completed in time
to submit to the county court on Sat-
urday, when that body will be in ses-
sion. During the past week, Miss Es-
telle Holmes, of this city, has been
assisting the experts in completing
the work. Nothing of the contents of
the report will be made public until it
has been completed and given to the
court.

The county court will convene in
regular monthly term Wednesday, and
will probably be in session for a week,
since there is a large amount of work
awaiting consideration. Several judges
and clerks of election have failed to
qualify, and those places will have
to be supplied. The court expects to
be visited by the members of the Polk
county court, when the steel bridge
at Salem will be inspected, and ar-
rangements made for its immediate
repair. Early next week the Marion
county court will go to Gates, where,
in conjunction with the Linn county
court, a site will be determined for the
location of the partnership bridge
across the Santiam river. In addition
to these matters and the consideration
of the experts' report, there will be
the usual amount of routine work to
be acted upon.
