MR. FURNISH'S ONLY ARGUMENT FOR ELECTION.

The Journal has printed Mr. Furnish's campaign speech, and what single point does he make that any one should vote to make him governor?

When he was nominated he made a speech consisting of three sentences: "I will give you a clean-cut, business administration."

"I am going to be elected."

"I will give you a campaign of which you will not be ashamed."

He did not forget to thank, from force of ordinary business habits gained behind the bank counter.

But he did not utter one word of eulogy of the grand, historic past of the Republican party—the principles of which he spent all but the last five years of his life in combatting.

Not a word of compliment for the state administration he is seeking to become the head of, and in which he will be the whole thing, in his own estimation, if he succeeds.

What an opportunity there would have been for a Republican leader, such as the state has many of, to have made a speech pregnant with the possibilities of victory and suitable to the demands of the times.

Instead the grand assemblage of the party got a schoolboy's "I-I-I-I" performance, from which they have not yet recovered.

That was Mr. Furnish's introduction to the party as the brilliant young leader of Jack-Matthews-Republicanism.

A man absolutely without ability to express Republican sentiments, an absolute blank as to what constitutes Republicanism, following the party only along the graft lines of profitable officialism.

Such a man would leave men who express themselves along the lines of genius possessed by Harvey Scott, Charley Fulton and Jack Matthews, the great heroes of the party.

His campaign speech at Ashland, printed in full in this paper, was an absolute blank, so far as any reform, any progress on the line of reducing the burdens of the taxpayer.

The relief the people will get must come from the great leaders of the Furnish faction—and you know who they are, and what to expect.

What Are Mr. Furnish's Arguments?—Since he has no ground for any man's support for his Republicanism or his associates—and has proven recreant to his Democracy?

Read that speech again if you are a Republican, for on no other living soul has he a ghost of a claim for a vote for governor of Oregon.

He says: "I am not here to discuss the political issues that confront us." He is going to talk "business."

What does his business talk amount to? We challenge any man to call from that speech a single sentence that makes a plain, flat proposition of a business character aimed at a single abuse.

Those abuses in excessive salaries

and grafts are admitted in the Republican platform, where it says of state officials: "They shall receive no compensation as fees or otherwise."

Will such a governor have the heart to fight these grafts here so tenderly referred to, when he dare not mention them in his campaign speech? Would he send in a special message to put the secretary of state on a salary?

McKinley and Roosevelt and the Philippines are important matters, but on these matters he only stands on the Republican platform—has no personal opinions.

In these strenuous days no progress is made in state government without nerve, determination, resolute clearness and convictions—has Mr. Furnish any of these qualities? He carefully conceals them if he has.

On the occasion of his visit to Salem Mr. Furnish saw no newspaper men and gave no interviews. The Journal sent old and tried Republicans to him to draw him into expressing himself in accordance with the Republican state platform on state salaries. Not a word could they get.

Has such a man any argument to put up for any honest man's vote under all the circumstances—a man who only says he stands on a platform—who has confidence only in the argument of his wealth?

Would Mr. Furnish be the nominee of the "associated gang of grafters," as the Oregonian has called the Jack Matthews faction?—would he, if it were not for the argument of his wealth.

"THERE'S NOTHING IN IT." That was the Oregonian's first declaration, on the flat salary plan of the Republican party platform.

"There's nothing in it for the boys," like Jack Matthews et al., to abolish fees, perquisites and grafts.

It has a second editorial saying, "for the twentieth time," there's nothing in it. Now it says the constitutional salary only can be paid, when, as a matter of fact, all kinds of salaries are being taken, in spite of the constitution.

It says for forty years "we have had no governor willing to serve" for the constitutional salary. Did not Gov. Thayer confine himself to \$1500 a year? It has always been so stated.

"Don't take too seriously utterances of politicians" about the flat salary reform, says the Oregonian. Not of a certain unreliable kind of politicians, to be sure. "There's nothing in it" for them to take.

Do the people know what it takes to get such a reform adopted? It has taken six months of persistent agitation to get it into three state platforms, and nearly all the county platforms of all parties.

It will take a hard fight in the legislature to get the bill passed. If there is the usual deadlock over the senatorship the bill will never pass.

Already the Oregonian has singled out this one platform promise to have it repudiated. Candidate Furnish is silent about it. It is a pledge he never intends shall materialize.

The hints are thrown out that if a salary law is enacted it cannot go into effect until after the term of the officials who are now to be elected.

The Republican state platform is so cunningly worded that it means almost nothing, and certainly does not mean immediate and prompt action. Read it:

"We demand that a law be passed by the next legislature placing all public officers of this state upon reasonable salaries, which shall not be increased during the incumbent's term of office, and beyond such salary they shall receive no compensation as fees or otherwise."

If the bill is not strangled in the senatorial fight, efforts will be made to have it delayed so that it will not go into effect for four years. The officials will fight to have it carried into the courts.

The people will be justified in demanding a special session of the legislature to pass a salary bill before the regular session, and before the new state officials are sworn in.

Until a salary bill is passed the secretary of state should issue no warrants above the constitutional salary limit, and force a judicial interpretation and construction of the constitution.

The people have got to make this fight independent of the politicians of "the nothing in it" stripe.

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FURNISH ORGAN THREATENING TO DEFEAT REPUBLICANS.

The Salem Sentinel led in the fight in this county to down Gov. Geer for renomination. It is supposed to speak for Mr. Furnish's managers directly. It says:

"It now devolves upon the candidates for the legislature in Marion county on the Republican ticket to declare themselves. If they are for Geer, the people want to know it. If they are opposed to him it should be known in ORDER THAT THEY MAY BE ELECTED."

The editor of the Salem Sentinel is about the only Republican newspaper man in the city who wears a Furnish button, and the above is a plain way of saying to the legislative candidates you will have to declare against Geer or be defeated.

Geer carried the primaries overwhelmingly in this county, and the anti-Geer people were not shut out of the Republican convention, but nominated part of the ticket.

This new declaration of Furnish's Republicanism, from its official organ at Salem, will come pretty near accomplishing the opposite from its purpose. It will drive men to support Geer for United States senator.

In a free country and in a party that has always spoken for liberty and freedom you cannot drive freemen in to or out of a party at the beck of a tyrannical faction—no matter if it is on top for the time being.

The above ought to prove that the Furnish faction mean to rule or ruin the Republican party, and it has no future but in the annihilation of such bossism.

Will the Republican party be brought closer to the people by the success or by the defeat of Furnish methods?

Study it out for yourselves, you who love the Republican party.
