SOLD ROTTEN BEEF

How the Packers Worked the Scheme

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., May 6.
At the beef trust inquiry here today, one attorney was here to represent all of the packers when the proceedings began. One of the first witnesses, J. F. Sulter, a cooler man for the Swift's St. Joseph plant, gave damaging testimony against the packers. He testified that when he was a retail butcher he received a barrel from Swift; that the prices of meats were fixed by the packing house managers at a meeting held a week in advance, and that when any of the packers held a meeting meat a meeting of the managers was held, and a concession made for the one holding such meat to get rid of it at any price he could get.
