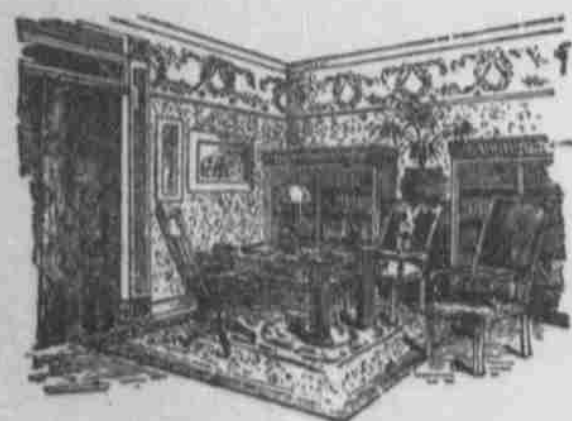

BALLOT TO BE PRINTED

Clerk Hall Awards Contracts
at \$49.50

Arrangement of Names on
County Ticket.

County Clerk Hall this morning awarded to Brandt Bros., of this city, the contract for printing 26,000 ballots—13,000 each of the genuine and sample ballots—to be used at the June election. The contract figure was \$49.50. Two years ago the county required about 50,000 ballots, and got the printing done for only \$75. Other bids submitted for the printing this year were: Henry Pape, \$59.50; R. E. Moore, \$57.50; Salem Sentinel, \$130; C. Hughes, \$57.

County Clerk Hall has completed arrangement of the names of candidates on the county ticket for Marion county, to be voted for at the June election. Candidates are arranged in the following order: Joint senators, senators, representatives, county commissioner, sheriff, clerk, recorder, treasurer, assessor, surveyor and coroner. These will be followed by candidates for justice of the peace, constable and road supervisor. The groups of legislative candidates are arranged in the following order: Republican, Democrat, Prohibition, Socialist. Single groups of candidates for various offices are arranged alphabetically, as required by law.

Clerk Hall says he has not decided whether he would adopt the names on the state ticket as in the form sent out by Secretary of State Dunbar. The matter of placing names of state candidates on the official ballot is optional with the county clerks of the various counties, as they may interpret the law. The principal contention will be the position to be given the names of the candidates for United States senator.

LONG FAST CAUSES INSANITY.

Man Leaps from Train Near Huntington, But Escapes Injury.

BAKER CITY, May 7.—A man was examined here this morning on the charge of insanity, whose name the county officials decline to divulge. He fell from the westbound passenger train the other side of Huntington last night, landing on a sand pile. He was not injured by the fall, so far as the train men could ascertain. A fellow passenger saw him fall, and notified the conductor. The train was backed up and the man taken on board again. Soon after he was taken on the train he developed symptoms of insanity. He was brought here for examination. The officials learned that he had a through ticket from Denver to Walla Walla, but was out of money. He evidently tried to take the trip without food, and, becoming faint from his long fast, fell from the train. The county physician says he will be all right in a day or so. His wife has been notified, and will arrive here tomorrow to take him home.

SALEM CITY COUNCIL

New Fire Alarm is Ordered
Installed

Aldermen Declare for Immediate Repair Steel Bridge

Tuesday night the Salem city council ordered the installation at the Salem electric light plant of a three-chime siren whistle, to be used for sounding fire alarms. Fire Chief Johnson and City Recorder Judah submitted a plan showing a division of the city into five fire districts, and recommended a code of signals to be used in case of fire as a measure of definitely locating the fire, and of assisting the fire department in reaching the scene.

Signals and Districts.
The city is divided into two districts for convenience in giving alarms. Summer street is the dividing line of the east and west districts. That section of the city north of Marion and west of Summer streets, and extending to the city limits on the north, will be Ward 1, district 1, and the alarm will be one long whistle, followed by a short one. If fire was in the district east of Summer and north of Marion, which will be known as Ward 2, district 2, the signal will be one long whistle and two short whistles. The other districts are as follows: Between Marion and Court, west of Summer, Ward 2, district 1; between same streets east of Summer, Ward 2, district 2; between Court and Ferry west of Summer, Ward 3, district 1; between same streets east of Summer, Ward 3, district 2; between Ferry and southern limits of city and west of Summer, Ward 4, district 1; between same streets east of Summer to Oak street on the south, Ward 4, district 2; all that section of city east of Summer street between Oak street and southern limits of city, Ward 4, district 3. The code of signals, as adopted, in case of fire, will be as follows: Number of ward sounded in long whistles, to be followed by short whistles, indicating in which district the fire is to be found. The matter of installing the system was left to the committee on fire and water.

In connection with the city's fire department, the council last night empowered the chief to suspend any member of the department for cause, subject to reinstatement by the council. This was done as a means of promoting discipline.

Building Permits.

The application of the Church of God to erect on the City Park a tent for purpose of holding a two-weeks' service was referred to Mayor Bishop. M. L. Hamilton was given permission to erect a corrugated iron building on the north side of State street, between Liberty and Commercial streets.

The New Alley Ordinance.
The alley ordinance was read a second time and referred to the ordinance committee. Upon suggestion of Stolz, this committee was directed to frame and amend providing for the uniform establishment of curbs in the city. Committee on streets and public property was ordered to take immediate steps in conjunction with the Marion and Polk county courts for the repair of the Willamette river steel bridge in this city.

No Outside Fire Service.

Some discussion resulted from a motion of Griswold to the effect that the Salem fire department in the future be not allowed to go outside of the city limits to attend a fire. Some of the councilmen thought the proposed ruling would be a little severe, but Burroughs thought such a decision on the part of the council would be effective in obliging people to come into the city, if they desired the protection and advantages of city government. The matter was finally referred to the committee on fire and water, to report at next meeting.

STRONG HAND OF THE LAW

May Confiscate Trust Shipments of Meats

CHICAGO, May 7.—That the present program of the government attorney in the proceedings against the alleged beef trust contemplates the filing of a bill for an injunction on Friday was learned this morning. It may contain a prayer for the confiscation by the government of all goods shipped in violation of the anti-trust law. If such a prayer were granted it would be a severe blow to the packers' combination. It would act as practically nullifying the agreements that have been made.
