National Municipal League in Boston

BOSTON, May 7.—The eighth annual meeting of the National Municipal League and the tenth national conference for good city government was begun here this afternoon. Secretary Clinton Woodruff made a long address reviewing the municipal reforms during the past year.

"Constitutional conventions and charter revision committees," he said, "are coming along with remarkable frequency. Indeed there is a general feeling of unrest with the present municipal conditions and existing forms of government."

that occasion, and he answered:

"I told the people of Eugene that if I were elected governor I would not be a partisan governor, but would attempt to administer the duties of the office fairly with due regard for the rights of all the people."

Mr. Chamberlain will repeat this promise everywhere he goes, and those who know the man, know that he will make the promise good. For, it is characteristic of the man that he keeps his promises, and the fact that he holds the confidence of the business men of this city is in proof that he does this.

The Philippine Question.

It is contended that the state election is not "per se" relative to the Philippine question. The campaign is essentially one involving the state government, and the governor will handle issues pertaining to home affairs.

However, it is falsely to argue that the Democratic party of Oregon holds a policy of "scuttling" for the platform explicitly declares that the United States should move towards independence only when the Philippine people are prepared for it. This is precisely what the Roosevelt administration believes to be the true American policy, as proven by utterances of United States Senator Beveridge at Indianapolis the other day, when he was announced by the Associated Press as speaking authoritatively for Roosevelt, and the latter has since the speech taken the pains to endorse what Beveridge said. The senator said without reservation, or without qualification, that the Republican party proposes to give to the Philippines independence so soon as they are prepared. H. W. Corbett, in his letter to the Oregonian in August, 1900, declared for independence for the Philippines in even more explicit terms than are used in the Democratic platform this year. Furthermore the last national utterance of the Republican party regarding the Philippines pronounces what the Democratic platform does this year.

Hence, when the Republican papers of Oregon represent the Democratic party of this state as standing for a "scuttling" policy, they are—well they are lying. That is good, old Anglo-Saxon, but it expresses the truth.

Mr. Chamberlain, in his campaign addresses, has stood for these principles, which he authorizes as a correct expression from him:

What He Holds.

The United States holds valid title to the islands.

The business interests deserve to be recognized by the inauguration of free tariff relations between the islands and this country.

The people of those islands deserve to be treated according to the same principles that obtain in the treatment of all territories of the United States.

When, and not before, they are fitted for self-government, they should have it.

Displeasing as this may be to certain Republican newspaper men of this state, it remains that it is in keeping with the business sentiment of the country, and therefore has their endorsement. It also coincides with the views of the rank and file of the citizens, and therefore has their endorsement. With the endorsement of both the business men and the average citizen, it would appear that Mr. Chamberlain has a rather good following throughout the state.

That one or two papers in Oregon do not like him as a candidate, in view of these citations above given, merely shows that they are lonesome in opposition to the Multnomah statesman on the Philippine question.
