## GOOD WORK BEGUN

### The Capital City League Organized

### Campaign for Improvement of City Inaugured

The meeting of the general committee on organization of the local improvement league Monday evening was attended by about one-half of the members of the committee.

In the absence of G. G. Bingham, president of the league, Prof. J. S. Graham acted as chairman. Oscar Muelhaupt was appointed secretary. The committee adopted "The Capital City Improvement League" as a name for the organization.

The constitution and by-laws of the Town Improvement Association of Mt. Clare, N. J., were adopted, with a slight modification, for the government of the Salem organization. Desirable features were also incorporated from the rules governing a Wichita, Kansas civic improvement league.

Under the constitution, as adopted by the committee, all persons are made eligible to active membership, upon the payment of annual dues, as follows: Men, \$1.00; women, 50 cents, and minors under 18 years of age, 25 cents. Officers of the league consist of president, first and second vice-presidents, secretary and treasurer, to be elected annually. The league will hold regular meetings on the third Tuesday of April, June, October and January, the annual election to be held in April. No debt shall be contracted by the executive board beyond the available means of the league to pay. No request shall be presented in the name of the league for the official action of public officers, unless endorsed by a majority of the league membership.

The committee found the by-laws of the St. Clare association were not adaptable to the needs of the Salem league, and, upon motion of H. A. Thomas, a committee of five was named to formulate a set of by-laws for the government of the league, to report at the next general meeting of the association, when the constitution will be submitted for adoption. Stolz moved that the committee be instructed to arrange for the districting of the city for the purpose of carrying on a campaign for renovation and improvement. Mr. Graham named the following committee: H. A. Thomas, H. C. Epley, G. Stolz, Mrs. Mary R. Davis and W. T. Rigdon. The committee will map out a plan of work, to be carried out by the districts. Upon motion adjournment was taken to report at the next general meeting of the association, which will be held at the call of the president.

ready favorably disposed. There were cheers for each climax and general good feeling between the speaker and the audience.

**Fairness Toward His Opponent.** Mr. Chamberlain exhibited courtesy and fairness toward his opponent, Mr. Furnish. He took pains to accord him the attributes of an estimable gentleman, and said that he had to do only with Mr. Furnish's record as a public official. In this connection, his fundamental proposition was this:

"Any man who has held office should be judged by the extent of his effort to administer his duties efficiently and to remove from the people the burden of taxation."

Predicting his discussion upon the foregoing sentiment, Mr. Chamberlain proceeded to assert:

"The man who serves the people owes it to them to get the most results at the least cost—that is, the most results to the people, not the most results to himself. And, if any man has, through office, secured from the taxpayers more than was necessary to compensate legitimately for the service rendered, he cannot conscientiously appeal to the voters as a business man promising a business administration."

**Mr. Chamberlain.** The splendid record that Mr. Chamberlain has made is known here, and, if the voters in their conversation since the meeting speak their sentiments, they propose to see to it that the man of all men in Oregon who has not made public office a private graft is installed in the governor's chair next January, if the assistance of the people here can accomplish such a result.

**Fulton on Fees.** Regarding the abuse of the fee system and the violation of the law on the part of state officials in drawing greater salaries than provided for by the constitution, Mr. Fulton tamely defended it and hinted if Chamberlain should be elected governor that he would be in a horrible position himself, and, if the constitutional limitation as to salaries is, as Chamberlain claims it is, only apparent and not real, he would like to know what the devil Chamberlain was ranting about. He does not seem to have any party, any platform, and is having a hard time of it. Mr. Fulton sandwiched the Philippine question into all parts of his speech, and argued that the islands were irrevocably lost to the United States should Furnish be defeated as governor of Oregon and Judge Williams falls to become mayor of Portland.

## ALBANY WAS CHOSEN

### O. N. G. Encampment Will Be Held Up the Valley.

The encampment of the Oregon National Guard will this year be held at Albany, July 17-24, such decision having recently been made by Adjutant-General C. U. Gantenbein.

The Greater Salem Commercial Club, through its secretary, N. J. Judah, had extended an invitation to the guard to hold the encampment at Salem. In a letter in reply to the invitation, Mr. Gantenbein notifies the club that Albany had been chosen as the place for holding the encampment before the club's letter had been received, and, in speaking of the selection, says:

"This decision was not the result of any dissatisfaction with the camp site at Salem, as the encampment held there two years ago was eminently successful, and the courtesy and generosity of the people of Salem were greatly appreciated. It was felt, however, that, other things being equal, the citizens of Albany were entitled to consideration this year. Thanking the members of the Commercial Club for the invitation extended, and for their interest in the National Guard, I am, etc."

## REVENUE SERVICE CADETS

### Examination of Applicants Held June 17-18-19.

An examination of applicants for appointment as cadet in the government revenue service will be conducted by the local civil service commission on June 17, 18, 19. Applicants must be not less than 18 nor more than 25 years of age, of vigorous constitution, physically sound and well formed, not less than 5 feet 3 inches in height, of good moral character and unmarried. The marriage of a cadet will be considered as equivalent to a resignation. Applicants are advised that cadets may be commissioned by the president as lieutenant after two years' satisfactory service. The salary of a cadet is \$500 per annum and one ration per day.

There are in the revenue cutter service commissioned officers, as follows: Captains, about 26, at a salary of \$2500 per annum; first lieutenants, about 26, at a salary of \$1800 per annum; second lieutenants, about 26, at a salary of \$1500 per annum; third lieutenants, about 12, at a salary of \$1400 per annum.

As the result of this examination, it is expected that about eight or ten appointments will be made some time during the coming summer to the position of cadet.
