GOV. GEER INVITED TO A BARMECIDAL FEAST.

That was a shrewd move of the Finnish managers to ask Governor Geer to preside over their campaign rally at Salem Friday night. The governor, as a lifelong Republican, and as a Republican candidate by petition for United States senator, could not well refuse to attend such a meeting.

But it will be an illusory advantage to Governor Geer, a barmecidal feast, at which all that is dished up will be found vanishing when he attempts to place it to his lips for his own enjoyment.

If Geer was wanted in this campaign why was he not nominated, so he could have gone before the people and answered the charges these very Republicans made against him as a citizen and as an official.

He could have made a campaign of the state that could have annihilated every slander against him and his administration, including the H. Plummer forgery. He would have been elected without spending a dollar improperly, and without the help of the Jack Matthews fraternity.

Many a staid old Republican says: "It has never been explained to me why Geer was turned down? He was a Republican from birth. He was the ablest campaigner in the party. His voice was always heard when Republicanism was on trial. He made a good governor, and by rights he was entitled to a second term. Why did they turn him down?"

Another old Republican writes this office: "They turned Geer down for a man who fought the Republican party hammer and tongs until he wanted an office. I do not know how I am going to vote. I won't know until they explain to me how Furnish got the nomination, and Geer didn't."

Of course, Geer was only a farmer, and made a cheap hayseed campaign. None of the men nominated can go out and make a canvass. Furnish reads a schoolboy speech, and Fulton is the real man who speaks for the party. He could do much to reconcile old-line Republicans to his candidate for governor by giving some cogent, plausible reason for not re-nominating Geer.

That is the way to get a home endorsement for Furnish among the friends and neighbors of Governor Geer, if an endorsement is wanted.

The Republican campaign managers can get any quantity of endorsements for Furnish from congressmen and United States senators or other states. What they lack is the endorsement of the ablest and cleanest Republicans here at home, who have not yet got it through their heads why so clean a man as Governor Geer was turned down and kicked out of the convention to make room for a man whose Republicanism is of such recent and "business" origin.

Of course it would be indelicate to ask Mr. Fulton to explain why he assisted in turning down Governor Geer, when he comes to Salem and asks Governor Geer to preside at a barmecidal feast, where he is to help entertain

guests who are eating him out of house and home, politically—men who will not even respect the expressed will of the people, if a majority should happen to vote for Geer for senator.

The same senators and congressmen who are sending advice to the people of Oregon to assume the burdens of Finnish politics for four years, will no doubt urge that a senator be chosen by the same old hodgepodge methods that elected themselves. The same influences will be set at work to defeat the will of the people when the next legislature meets.

WHAT CARNEGIE SAYS ABOUT TRUSTS.

Carnegie says in his new book on business:

"The only people who have reason to fear trusts are those foolish enough to enter into them. The consumer and the transporter, not the manufacturer and the railway owner, are to reap the harvest."

The consumer has already reaped a harvest of high prices for all the trust products he buys.

The truth is that Andrew Carnegie has hundreds of millions of bonds of the great steel trust. While not a stockholder, he is vitally interested in its welfare. The greater its profits and stability the more valuable his bonds and the greater certainty that his five-per-cent a year will be regularly forthcoming.

Carnegie is not a disinterested adviser on the trust question.

When he endowed his new university at Washington with bonds of the steel trust he was putting an anchor out to windward for the security of that great consolidation. He is shrewd enough to know the public are disinclined to attack anything which might jeopardize the interests of a free educational institution.

Carnegie is certainly entitled to credit for the good use he is making of some of his vast wealth. But it is well to remember that philanthropy comes easy when it means nothing more than snipping off a few coupons from an armful of bonds. The famous iron-master has given away some millions, but the bulk of his wealth is still untouched. He has yet hundreds of millions at his command.

Let us not be dazzled by mere figures. There are many thousands of unknown men more truly generous, more benevolent and public-spirited, than Carnegie ever has been or ever will be. Men or women who deprive themselves of something they need or desire for the sake of others or for the public good—each of these is superior in giving to Carnegie, who retains for himself infinitely more than he can ever use.

It is a weakness of human nature to exalt the rich, who give an insignificant fraction of their wealth above the poor widow who gives the mite that is her all.

SAY BOERS WILL WIN.

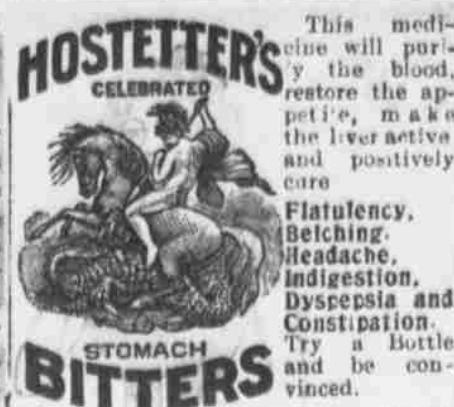
It will be worth while going to the city hall to see "Little Doc Smith" and Governor Geer on the same platform.

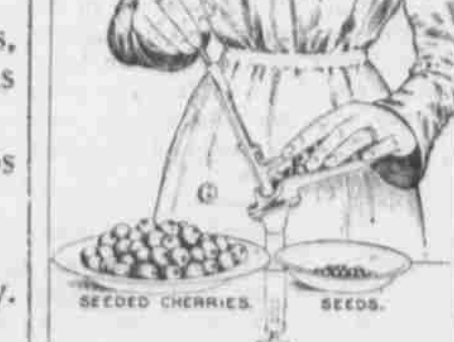
