A STAND FOR CIVIC VIRTUE.

That is what this election means so far as governor is concerned. Governor Geer has made an acceptable governor. The "rough house" faction found him too decent and inclined to civic virtues for which they had no use.

In striking contrast with this tendency to the better order of things in public affairs is the record of "business candidate" Furnish, who, as a Democratic office-holder, was called down for bad business.

A simple statement of Geo. E. Chamberlain's clean record in public affairs in every office he ever held, his fearless and faithful discharge of his duties ought to elect him.

His brave challenges at Salem and everywhere he speaks, offering to retire from the canvass if a single dishonest act can be pointed in his public record, ought to elect him.

The fight for Geo. E. Chamberlain's election is a brave stand on the part of the cleanest and most conscientious Republicans against the onslaught of the Huns and Vandals, who break down all barriers of political decency. It is a fight to put a premium on civic virtue within the Republican party, so far as dissenting Republicans are concerned.

People of all other parties know that Geo. E. Chamberlain stands for faithfulness to a public trust under all circumstances.

The question of making a stand for civic virtue is "up to Republicans" because they have the reputation of their party character at stake in downing the worst element of their own party that has got the reins.

The California club women, of Los Angeles, issued a beautiful illustrated souvenir number in honor of the sixth biennial of the National Federation. Club women who have not seen it should send ten cents and secure a copy.

In the hope of reducing the number of saloons in the town one-half, Passaic, N. J., has increased the price of a liquor license from \$250 to \$500. It imposed the same terms on beer wagons from other places as on saloons.

Candidate Furnish in his speech at Oregon City, said, or read, the following: "In choosing a governor, the people should elect a man who has made a success in his own business. I shall not pose like my opponent, as familiar with all matters in the state, but will familiarize myself with all the working details of state affairs."

It depends on what your "business" happens to be. A man may have made a great success in running fee-bills against the county or the state, and not be any the better for that. A woman may have experiences that do not fit her for taking charge of a household. Success and experience do not always count.

Mr. Fulton worked up to a great climax in his Salem speech to prove that Mr. Furnish is not a boodler. He said he had ample convincing proof that he was not. The audience hung breathless. "It is found in the simple fact that he is not being supported by E. Hofer," said Mr. Fulton. One would have thought that the audience would go wild at that, when scarcely an issue of a city paper has not appeared in this city that the editor of this paper was a boodler, and sold himself in every election, but the eloquent Mr. Fulton's thrust at a private citizen fell flat. Does he want to put us in the same class with his man and Harvey Scott?

Hon. Harvey E. Cross and Capt. J. T. Apperson are old Republican warhorses, but they are leading the Citizens' fight in Clackamas county against that magnificent Republican leader who in the last legislature helped appropriate so much money that the state revenues this year run up to one million, one hundred thousand, seven hundred and twenty-eight dollars and six cents. No wonder they revolt.

The Woodburn correspondent of the Portland Oregonian has the following: "A straw vote on governor at Cornwell's drug store tonight proved an agreeable surprise. Result, Furnish 13, Chamberlain 2, Roberts 2, Ryan 1. That is about the kind of a crowd one would find hanging around a drug store in a 'dry' town. The Chamberlain people who drink go to the saloon straight and into the front door."

The parade for Furnish was very creditable, under all the circumstances. The number marching were as follows: In white caps, 27; cymbal club, 4; second cymbal club 26; kids, 22; four bands and persons marching, including candidates and boys from the reform school and Indian school, 162; total, 242.

What's the matter pulling for a mile of asphalt street at Salem this year? Will the country ever be more prosperous than it is now? Will this country ever be more ready for progress than it is now?

REPORT OF THE EXPERTS

Further Details of the Records of Marion County.

The experts' report showed that on January 1, 1902, there remained due the county from Sheriff Durbin the sum of \$2957.32, that had been collected on the rolls of 1893-1900, inclusive. The total sum was made up of amounts on the various tax rolls as follows:

This statement of the report does not imply nor indicate a shortage of that amount. Sheriff Durbin says the amount is practically correct, but says that the bulk of the total amount has been paid into the county treasurer in regular form since January 1, last, up to which time his books were examined. The sheriff is criticised by the experts for not making payments on taxes every 30 days, and regularly reporting delinquent taxes, as by law required.

A typographical error Monday evening made The Journal say in its report of the experts' findings that Sheriff Durbin had, during his four years administration, collected \$70,000 in taxes. The amount should have been \$700,000.

After an investigation of Treasurer Downing's books, the experts make the following reports concerning the true condition financially of Marion county, showing the receipts and disbursements during Mr. Downing's four years term, and the balance on hand in every fund:

For the blankets and flannels there is a sale for even more than the factory can turn out, the establishment being ordinarily from four to six months behind on orders. The output is sold chiefly in San Francisco and Portland.

"Mr. and Mrs. Bishop left yesterday for home. Their two sons, both of whom are famous in Oregon as football players, are now in an industrial school in Philadelphia, and the only one of the kind in the United States, where they are studying textiles under the best masters of the woolen industry. In the school, the course in the study of textiles is three years, but the Bishop boys, who have had practical experience in the factory at Salem, expect to complete their course in two years."
