## OBJECT TO SHINGLE ROOFING

### Lively Discussion Had At Council Meeting

### Fire Department To Be Confined to City Limits

The question of granting permission for the placing of shingle roofs upon buildings within the fire limits of the city precipitated a lively discussion at the regular meeting of the council Tuesday evening.

**Shingle Roofs Not Wanted.**  
Application of J. A. Simpson and E. S. Lamport for permission to place a shingle roof on their proposed livery stable, to be erected on High street, west of the Court house, was discussed at length, and finally referred to the committee on streets and public property, with instructions to report to the council at next regular meeting.

The council was petitioned by Messrs. Lamport and Simpson and 23 other taxpayers to grant the application, but the protest that had been filed by the members of Chemeketa Lodge, No. 1, I. O. O. F., won out, and the members of the council, after considerable discussion, refused to grant the prayer of the petitioners at this time. John A. Carson appeared for the petitioners, and addressed the council, soliciting favorable action.

Stolz moved that petition be granted and, in order that the question might be made debatable, Griswold seconded the motion, and then the trouble began. Griswold spoke in opposition to the petition, and said the materials to be used in construction of roofs within the fire limits was provided for in an ordinance previously passed by the council. He was opposed to the substitution of combustible materials for roof purposes in the business district of the city. Burrows thought petitioners were entitled to some consideration, and Stolz gave his opinion acquired from personal experience, to the effect that properly treated shingle roofing was not as dangerous in case of fire as was corrugated iron. Pohle and Walker were non-committal on the subject. Mr. Carson again addressed the council upon the matter under consideration, and spoke rather warmly upon the apparent indisposition of that body to take any action at all on the petition that had been presented. After some further discussion the matter was referred to the committee above indicated.

**About the Fire Department.**  
The committee on fire and water reported verbally, recommending that the city's fire apparatus be confined to the city limits. Adopted. The same committee reported favorably upon the keeping of both engines in the fire department heated all of the time, but the report was not favorably acted upon. At the suggestion of Griswold the officers of the department were instructed to provide for the transfer of the heating apparatus from one fire engine to the other, so that when the engine that is regularly employed is called out, the reserve engine may be placed in readiness for action, in case of an emergency.

W. E. DeLong was appointed chief engineer, to have charge of the city's fire department, during the month's absence from the city of Mr. Campbell.

**Sewer Remonstrance.**  
A remonstrance to the construction of a sewer in block 88 was received from Mrs. S. A. Ramp et al, for the alleged reason that the ditch was not necessary. Referred to the committee on streets and public property.

**Alley Ordinance Passed.**  
A general ordinance providing for the cleaning, repairing and grading and graveling of alleys at the expense of the abutting property, or at the general expense of the city, was read third time and passed unanimously. Unpaid assessments become a lien on the property served, and at the expiration of six months, unless paid, will carry a penalty of 10 per cent.

A jury in Justice O'Donald's court Tuesday afternoon found Harry Clark guilty of assault and battery on Eli Mortenson on last Sunday evening. Clark was fined \$20 and costs, and will appeal the case to the circuit court. Frank Holmes is his attorney. The fight resulted over some petty jealousies over some West Salem belles.

**Supreme Court Sustains the Foot-Ease Trade-Mark.**

Justice Laughlin, in the supreme court, at Buffalo has ordered a permanent injunction, with costs, and a full accounting of sales, to issue against Paul B. Hudson, manufacturer of the Salem L. P. & T. Co. foot powder called "Dr. Clark's Foot Powder," and also against a retail dealer of Brooklyn, restraining them from making or selling Dr. Clark's Foot Powder, which is declared, in the decision of the court, an imitation and infringement of "FOOT-EASE," the powder to shake into your shoes, now so largely advertised and sold all over the country. Allen S. Olmsted, of Le Roy, N. Y., is the owner of the trade-mark "FOOT-EASE," and he is the first individual who ever advertised a foot powder extensively over the country. The decision in this case upholds his trade-mark, and renders all parties liable who fraudulently attempt to profit by the extensive "FOOT-EASE" advertising, in placing upon the market a spurious and similar appearing preparation, labeled and put up in envelopes and boxes like FOOT-EASE. Similar suits will be brought against others who are now infringing on the FOOT-EASE trade-mark and common law rights.

**Salem Postoffice Aspirants.**

Petitions are in circulation and letters are being written in behalf of Wm. Manning for postmaster at the Salem office. The office is soon to become vacant, and Edward Hirsch is also asking reappointment. Mr. Manning is a retired capitalist, an old resident, was once a member of the legislature, and for a time kept store at Canyonville. Both are competent to fill the place, and it is generally conceded that Mr. Hirsch has made an obliging official.

## To Raise Salary.

Griswold moved that the salary of the street commissioner be raised from \$40 to \$50 per month, and that the city exact of that officer more work than was now being performed in that department. City Recorder Judah informed the council that in making the levy for the city's incomes for the year 1902, the salary of the street commissioner was figured at \$40 per month, and any increase in the salary of that official now would require an amendment to that ordinance. Further consideration of the proposed salary increase was abandoned.

**Miscellaneous.**  
Upon petition of W. A. Moores and 45 others, the street commissioner was instructed to clean up all debris and place in immediate repair the sidewalk on the north side of Leslie street, between Twelfth and Capitol streets.

The street commissioners were also directed to notify the contractors who are erecting buildings on State street that a passageway for pedestrians must be maintained on that side of the street, as was agreed upon when the city accorded to the builders the use of the sidewalk and a part of the street during the building operations.

15. Are its crank bearings practically dust-proof?
16. Can you honestly recommend its hanger as being constructed on absolutely correct principles?
17. Isn't any piece of machinery that has its pull on the outside of its bearings a mechanical error?
18. Are its sprockets cut with danges on either side the teeth to prevent the chain from jamming?
19. Are the front and rear hubs on the best and latest models of this machine equipped with dust-proof magnetic self-oilers.
20. Are the spokes the best grade Diamond "E"?
21. Is the fork crown a solid forging doubly reinforced?
22. Can your factory truthfully say that not one of their 1900 or 1901 forks went down or were broken?
