ELECTION IN POLK.

An independence special to the Portland Telegram says:
As the campaign draws to a close betting on the results occupies to a great extent the attention of the street corner loungers. On the results of the state ticket there seems to be an abundance of Furnish money at odds of 2 to 1. The same odds are given on Polk county going for Furnish. On the county ticket, however, the "sports" consider everything doubtful, from representative down, and what little betting is done is made without odds. The greatest interest seems to hinge on the outcome of the contest for sheriff, as both the Democratic and Republican nominees are considered strong men. Contrary to general custom, the legislative ticket is considered as secondary importance, though both sides are claiming victory for their representatives.

The election locally is not attracting as much attention as elections have in past years, and it is predicted that a light vote may be cast.

STRUGGLE FOR NINE-HOUR DAY.
A general strike of organized labor is about to be precipitated at Portland by the unwise action of a few planning mill owners, who resist a nine-hour day.
A nine-hour day has come to be recognized as a very reasonable demand on the part of labor. It should be established in Portland at all hazards. Harry Gurr, president of the Portland Federated Trades Council, says: "We are ready and willing at any time to meet the millowners and settle the matter. We have so informed business men. When they signify their wish to discuss the matter we shall be willing to take it up immediately. The test of union strength comes at a critical time, perhaps, but it is necessary."

LINCOLN SCHOOL LIBRARY.
The Lincoln public school, in South Salem, has maintained a library for the children of that school by the public spirit and enterprise of the teachers and parents, for a number of years. Committees of the Public School Union have been appointed to hold an entertainment in the city some time next month, to be given entirely by the pupils of that school, to help the library fund.

The plan to raise a fund to make needed additions to the library, to be ready for the schools when they open in the fall. The Public School Union will also take steps to beautify the grounds.

Public Officials Records a Fair Test.

When a man essays to serve the people in the capacity of a public official, his record becomes properly subject to inspection. It is just to predicate upon them prophecies of what he will do in the future. What he did is likely to indicate what he will do. His past record of official conduct is an earnest of what his course will be hereafter. While it is petty always to be unearthing the past, and playing upon the prejudices of people by citing the smaller mistakes that all young men commit, yet if a man offer himself for the suffrages of the voters, he cannot object if his official record be subjected to the severest tests of examination, and he cannot complain if the citizens judge of his promises for better things to come by the extent of his former efforts in behalf of better government. In the present campaign, there are two men who ask the votes of the people of Oregon for the office of governor. Both have been in public positions. Both have been public servants. Both have had abundant opportunity to demonstrate the manner in which they conceive the duty of an official. Both have records that may be inspected. It is rational for the voters to make close examination into those records, with the determination to search out the points in favor of each.—Astoria Budget.

Joseph A. Sellwood.
J. A. Sellwood, the Democratic nominee for county recorder, was born at Mendon, Ill. He came to Oregon with his parents in 1856, by the isthmus, and settled in Salem. He has lived here almost continuously since. He graduated from Willamette University in 1886 in the class with Henry Gilkey, reading clerk of the U. S. Senate, Sam Simpson and others—the largest class in the classical course that ever left the university. He commenced teaching in October, 1886, across the river in Polk county. He taught at Oregon City one year; also at Milwaukie, Clackamas county. In November, 1874, he commenced a select school in Salem, teaching this for four years. He commenced as principal of the South Salem public school in 1878, and has since taught continuously in the public schools of Salem, except from December, 1885, to June, 1887, when he was principal teacher at the Chemawa Indian school. He has taught longer in one district than any other teacher in Oregon, except I. W. Pratt, superintendent of schools of Portland. Prof. Sellwood was married Oct. 11, 1871, to Miss Laura A. Earl, and they have five children. Prof. Sellwood, being a leading Democrat, is a candidate for county recorder of Marion county. He served four years as assistant postmaster in this city, and is in every way qualified to fill the position for which he is a candidate.

Doing Business at the Old Stand.
The Oregonian stated that the rally for Hon. Geo. E. Chamberlain and the other Democratic nominees in Salem Saturday was a "frost," meaning that there was but a small attendance at the meeting and no enthusiasm. The Salem Statesman, one of the most radical Republican papers in the state, and a Furnish supporter, says the new grand opera house "was crowded to the doors long before the hour set for the speaking." Also that "Judge Bonham, introducing the afternoon's programme, announced that on account of the large crowd that was unable to enter the opera house, the gubernatorial candidate had agreed to return to Salem later, and address the people in Marion Square." This shows how rankly the Oregonian is trying to deceive its readers, but the truth is becoming known. Such deceit is disgusting in what pretends to be an honorable newspaper and will be rebuked on election day.—Roseburg Review.

Tell the Truth and Shame Harvey Scott.

They Heard Mr. Chamberlain.
La Grande, Or., May 20.—The ovation last night was the biggest ever seen here. Eight hundred torches were in line and the whole city was illuminated with red fire. Stewart's opera house was full, and over half of the people could not get in. Music was furnished by the Elgin Military Band. Turner Oliver presided, and both Chamberlain and Wann spoke. They made the best efforts of the campaign, and were received with wild enthusiasm. State Treasurer Moore, F. I. Dunbar, Marion Butler and Sheriff Huntington, of Baker City, were in the audience and listened attentively. Henry Blackman has arrived here from the interior with the most flattering reports, and it is assured that Chamberlain will carry this section of Eastern Oregon by big majorities.

Opposition in Umatilla.
Pendleton, May 23.—It was thought by many that the wave which brought such strength and enthusiasm to our state ticket would spend its force here June 24, but the contrary has proved true. When we look around and see the rank and file of Democracy lining up, spurred on by more than 600 Republicans (and the best Republicans of this county) it is impossible to calculate its force.

Among the prominent Republicans in this county we find seven ex-Republican members of the Oregon legislature, lawyers, doctors, laborers, grocers, bankers, farmers, millmen and all other classes of the best rank and file boldly standing out against the methods used in securing his nomination in the manner employed by the Republican candidate and his boosters.

They openly state that the high office of governor of the great state of Oregon must not be filled in such a manner, and thus rob the office of all dignity.

A majority of the voters of this county will not be parties to any such job, especially when the opportunity is offered them of casting their votes for a clean, honest, competent man.

There is not a day passes that reports from Weston, Athena, Milton, Adams and other parts do not come in of the best men openly bolting the Republican ticket, and especially the head of the ticket.

The party lash has no terrors for them. Another very noticeable thing is the distrust with which the reports of the campaign, as given through the Oregonian, are read. The people read Furnish's speeches with a broad grin.

Republicans Against Furnish.
La Grande, May 23.—A careful poll has been made of the voters of the city of La Grande by the organized dissatisfied Republicans, with the result that it has been announced officially that the entire democratic vote of the city may be eliminated and Furnish cannot carry the city. In other words, the dissatisfaction in the Republican ranks is so great as to defeat their leader without the aid of Democratic votes. This is not street talk, neither does it emanate from Democratic sources, but from the organization of Republicans who are opposed to Mr. Furnish. This condition of affairs is said to exist in either and all of the four wards of this city.

On the other hand, the Democratic party of La Grande, as of Union county, is thoroughly united, and, besides working for the success of the entire Democratic ticket, is particularly active for the defeat of J. W. Scriber in the county, and of Mr. Furnish.

Coming down on a train, Marion Butler, of Baker City, a law partner of Senator Mitchell, said: "We admit that in the counties of Baker, Wallowa, Union and Umatilla, Mr. Furnish will not get a majority of the votes."

How Furnish Men Fight the Governor

Corvallis, May 23.—No petitions that Governor Geer's name as a candidate for senator, to be placed on the official ballot, were circulated here, though such petitions were sent here for circulation by the governor's friends. It has leaked out that a friend of the governor asked a certain Republican if he would circulate the petitions. The latter, although a friend of the governor, declined to do so, because it would put him in bad odor with the local Furnish politicians. After laying here uncirculated for a few days, the chairman of the county central committee returned the petitions to those who sent them. If any effort had been made in the county hundreds of signatures could have been secured, as Governor Geer has many friends, especially among the farmers, many of whom still smart under his turn-down.
