A FEW WORDS WITH YOUNG MR. DOLLIVER.

This young Republican from Iowa, who is making speeches in Oregon comes of an illustrious family of politicians. His brother Senator Dolliver of Iowa is one of the greatest platform speakers in the country.

The young man tells the people a great deal about how much the people loved McKinley, and how much they love Roosevelt, and how we all love the flag and what we owe the Philippines and the Republican party.

Let honest and earnest Republicans who do not want their party to go entirely into the hands of a spurious and black-flag scuttles leadership not be deflected to the true interests of the people and of the Republican party by his siren songs at so much per song.

The battle for good government and honest party management must be fought in spite of the splendid abilities and mistaken zeal of the Dollivers.

What he tells us about national issues and affairs does not come to a people entirely ignorant of those matters. People in Oregon read the daily papers and get the telegraphic news reports and read the reviews and magazines.

They are as capable of forming correct opinions of those matters as anyone from the Eastern states, and Mr. Dolliver will admit that on the broad line of national interests we are less apt to be provincial than residents of New England or a country where they raise almost nothing but hogs, cattle, corn and politicians.

Mr. Dolliver comes to a city like Salem and makes a plea ostensibly for good government. But we doubt if the state of Iowa or any state in the Union can show a city or a county as economically and as well governed as Salem and Marion counties.

He comes to a state where a people are engaged in reforming abuses and improving their commonwealth, where the leading and most intelligent Republicans are engaged in overthrowing or at least keeping in check a spurious leadership that has fastened upon the neck of the party.

Young Mr. Dolliver has no relation to these matters. He has never fought these battles in his own state and comes here and throws his influence against the people in their efforts at reformation of abuses that are acknowledged to be monumental. He is helping the wing of the party that sneers at the necessity of these reforms.

The Philippine Cruelties.

President Roosevelt writes a letter on the subject of the alleged Philippine cruelties to Bishop Lawrence of Massachusetts. In this letter he says:

"In reference to these cruelties, I agree with every word in your address. No provocation, however great, can be accepted as an excuse for the misuse of the necessary severity of war, and above all for torture of any kind or shape. Long before any statements had been made public and before any action had been taken by Congress, the war department had ordered a rigid investigation of certain of the charges, including the charges against Major Gardner, the orders of investigation as regards these particular charges having gone out over three months ago. The investigation will be one of the most thorough and sweeping in character and if necessary will be made by the civil as well as by the military representatives of the government in the islands. I have directed that the court martial shall be held under conditions which will give me the right of review."

Oregonian Versus Oregonian.

(Pendleton East Oregonian, May 22.)
The Portland Oregonian is not improving in the reliability of its political news reports. According to that paper the Republican spellbinders continue to "play to crowded houses," and the Democratic speakers only to empty benches. It is a great pity that a great paper like the Oregonian cannot report political news fairly and rise above narrow partisanship in printing the news for its family of readers of every political belief. There appears to be no paper in Oregon so unreliable in this respect as the Portland Oregonian. In politics its influence is greatly lessened because of its one-sided political news.

Chas. Johns Compliments Both.

Chairman Johns, after the music of the band, introduced the Hon. W. J. Furnish, Republican candidate for governor for the state of Oregon.
