OREGON STATE GRANGE

Concludes Its Sessions at State House

Adopts Demand for Flat Salary System.

This body will conclude its sessions and adjourn Thursday evening. The installation of the new officers took place this afternoon. Several candidates will be initiated into the sixth degree at a meeting to be held in the Holman building tonight. The initiation services to be followed by the serving of an elaborate banquet, after which adjournment will take place. The attendance the past two days was large, over 200 being present, and good interest was manifested in the work of the convention. After considerable discussion, the selection of a place of meeting for next year was left to the executive committee. In the election of officers Wednesday afternoon, the Grange re-elected B. G. Leedy, of Tigardville, as master. The other officers elected were as follows: Overseer, Mrs. Clara H. Waldo, Macleay; lecturer, A. T. Buxton, Forest Grove; re-elected unanimously; steward, C. L. Shaw, Albany; assistant steward, W. J. Edwards, Mayville; chaplain, Oscar Eaton, Oswego; treasurer, H. Hirschberg, Corvallis; secretary, Mrs. Mary S. Howard, Mullin; re-elected; gate keeper, S. G. Schoonover, Verona; pomona, Mrs. A. F. Miller, Sellwood; flora, Mrs. Louis Bond, Halsey; cerea, Mrs. C. M. Winecoff, Amos; lady assistant steward, Mrs. Bertha Hibbs, McMinnville; member of executive committee, C. Paulsen, Garden Home; members of legislative committee, J. Voorhees, Woodburn, and W. M. Hillery, Turner.

The committee on legislation submitted the following report, which was adopted:

"First—We favor the adoption of the initiative and referendum method of law making in nation, state and county.

"Second—We favor the election of president, United States senators and supreme judges of the United States by direct vote of the people.

"Third—We favor placing all state officers on a stated salary and allow no other recompense for their services.

"Fourth—We favor postal saving banks.

"Fifth—We favor a reduction of railroad fare to three cents per mile.

"Sixth—We favor an amendment to the constitution to regulate and control all corporations and combinations preventing monopoly and the exercise of their corporate power to restrain trade or arbitrarily establish prices.

"Seventh—We favor a law to elect precinct assessors, and they constitute the board of equalization for their respective counties.

"Eighth—We recommend and endorse that part of the worthy master's address relating to legislation.

"Ninth—We favor the enactment of a primary law whereby the candidates for all public offices shall be placed in nomination by a direct vote at the primaries.

The same committee favorably reported the following resolution, which was adopted:

"Whereas, The recent labor trouble in the city of Portland has cost the laboring class of that city thousands of dollars, and

"Whereas, The city has sustained an irreparable loss in the stopping of many improvements that had been contemplated for this year, therefore be it

"Resolved, By the Oregon State Grange that the coming state legislature be asked to pass a law providing for a court of arbitration, to which all such questions may be referred, whereby labor may get its just share of profits, without resorting to a strike.

The committee on assessment and taxation reported recommending the re-enactment of the mortgage tax law, but the Grange refused to adopt the recommendation. The same committee recommended that property be assessed the first day of April; the adoption of a graduate income tax and an inheritance tax.

The committee on legislation further reported favorably on the following: Equalization of taxes and taxing franchises of corporations, for state salary for state officials, with-out perquisites; for postal savings banks and parcel delivery; requiring railroad companies to pay for stock sold within 30 days; to tax corporations, express, telegraph, telephone, surety and sleeping car companies in the same manner as insurance companies. The same committee reported adversely on a resolution for reduction of railroad fares from 4 to 2 cents per mile; increasing salaries of free rural mail delivery carriers; for compelling railroad companies to pay for stock on schedule time; for asking the legislature to appropriate money for publishing reports of the Dairy Association.

Salem Justice Court.

Two years ago, after a hard fight, J. O'Donald was elected justice of the Salem district, and John Lewis constable. These officials were pledged to run no unnecessary fee bills on the county, and they have kept their pledges. In two years the fees drawn by the justice have been \$735, and the constable has drawn \$548, or about one-half what any predecessor has ever run the office. The figures are taken from the records and show these gentlemen have kept their pledges to reduce the business of the justice court to a minimum, and yet not deny justice to any one who has a worthy cause of action. Justice O'Donald has a reputation for treating all cases with fairness and consideration, and at the same time protecting the public interest. The people of this district can do no better than continue officials who have made such a record. As the office is a non-political one, people of all parties should see to it that these two excellent officers are continued another term, to make the same kind of a record.

A Suit to Clear Title.

The Oregon Packing Company, of Portland, today began foreclosure proceedings against the Allen Packing Company, of this city, to recover \$14,000 and \$1400 attorney's fees, alleged to be due on a promissory note for \$45,233.33, executed to plaintiff by defendant corporation on September 2, 1901. The foreclosure of a mortgage and the sale of the canning plant, located in Salem, that was given to secure the loan, is asked. Carey & Mays, of Portland, are attorneys for the plaintiff company.

SOCIALIST PROHIBITION FUSION

Rocky Rooster Ryan Has Lost His Voice

Three Ministers Made Political Campaign Speeches

The Prohibitionists and Socialists of this city effected a temporary fusion Wednesday evening, to the extent that a joint political meeting was held at the city hall.

O. S. Jory, a local Prohibitionist worker, was chairman of the meeting, and introduced R. R. Ryan, Socialist candidate for governor who briefly announced that he would not talk, in fact he could hardly articulate above a whisper, vigorous campaigning having tried his vocal chords badly. Rev. F. J. Wilson, of Chicago, a traveling Socialist, was the next speaker, and for an hour discussed the fundamental principles of Socialism, basing his argument on the statement that the supreme object of life is to promote a greater possible happiness among his fellow creatures.

Rev. A. J. Hunsaker, of McMinnville, candidate for governor on the prohibitionist ticket, concluded the speaking of the evening, and delivered an address on temperance, from a Prohibitionist point of view.

The meeting was not held by any prearranged plan. The Prohibitionists had engaged the hall for the evening, while the Socialists had intended holding an open-air meeting on the street. The weather was unfavorable for a street meeting, and the Socialists about persons of the cold water people to share the hall and time for discussion. The Prohibitionists gave in, and the meeting was proceeded with about 8:30 o'clock. The discussion was in the nature of a joint debate, each speaker being allowed to present his own views as to the proper remedy for the correction of existing abuses in the social and industrial world. It was not learned which party made the largest number of converts.

Lots of Eggs. Forty thousand steelhead eggs were received at the United States Clackamas fish commission station from the Rogue river, which will be closed early in June, and the eggs remaining in the hatchery will be shipped to the Clackamas station.

A big free-flowing well of high grade petroleum has been discovered in a remote section of the Clearwater river country, a short distance above the Quiltsuit Indian reservation, and only about half a mile back from the Pacific coast, by two timber cruisers who were working in that section.

GREATER SALEM CLUB

Some of the Results of This Live Organization

The regular meeting of the Greater Salem Commercial Club had some important business before it Wednesday evening. The officers of the club think they should be encouraged in the work by a good attendance of the members at all meetings. The next meeting of the club, unless a special session is convened, will be held on the evening of June 10th.

The extent to which Salem and the Willamette valley is being advertised through this commercial organization, may be judged from a letter that has been received by Secretary Judah from E. V. Killett, of Lakon Lampang, Siam, Asia, acknowledging the receipt of the 34-page pamphlet, 6 1/2x2 1/2 inches, envelope size, for advertising purposes, that were recently ordered, will be delivered to the club this week. Five thousand of the pamphlets have been published, and they are finely illustrated. The cover design is unique. It is printed in a shade of red with a center piece showing the big Willamette river steel bridge and steamers in the act of passing under the structure. The cover bears an attractive inscription of the following text: "Adam and Eve, Lost Paradise. We have found it." City Record-Journal is responsible for the writing, which is surrounded by a cut indicating some of the products of the valley. The arrangement of the cover page is such that the source of the pamphlet is not revealed on the face of it, and will require an investigation of its contents before the curiosity of the recipient can be satisfied.

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SALEM ENTERTAINS AGAIN

Portland Federated Trades Excursion on Sunday

Arrangements have been completed for the big excursion of the Federated Trades Council that will be run from Portland to Salem on Sunday, June 1st. The excursion will consist of two sections, and will probably reach Salem about 11 o'clock.

Both trains will stop at the fair grounds for the accommodation of those who do not care to go into Salem. The train will then run to the Salem depot. Special street car service will be provided to handle the great crowd between the city and the grounds. At 1:30 p. m. the sports will take place on the race track in front of the grandstand. A place for those who wish to dance has been arranged in the pavilion. After the racing, etc., a baseball contest will take place on the fair grounds diamond between a select team from the unions of Portland and those of Salem. Arrangements have also been made for the opening of the insane asylum and the penitentiary between the hours of 2 and 4 p. m. These institutions can accommodate 1000 persons during that time. The state house will be open to the sightseers all day. On the return trip the first train will leave the Salem depot at 5 p. m., followed shortly afterward by the second section.

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
