COUNTY AFTER COUNTY

Reports Majorities for Geo. E. Chamberlain.

Signed Statements from Men in Position to Know.

Douglas 100 to 500.

(Journal Special Service.)
Roseburg, May 30.—Since receiving your inquiry as to Chamberlain's prospects in this county I have discussed the situation with the leading Democrats. All claim the county, and his majority is estimated from 100 to 500. I think 300 is quite a conservative estimate. I have been campaigning over most of the county, and have found some Republicans in every precinct supporting him, and in some precincts many of them. I will not be surprised if his majority will reach 500. Crawford will get fewer votes than Furnish, but Rely will get as many votes as Chamberlain.

Jackson County 200.

Union County 700.

(Journal Special Service.)

La Grande, May 30.—Some people place Chamberlain's majority in Union county as high as 500, and not one well-posted man out of 50 denies that Chamberlain will at least win out by a big margin. I think he will beat Furnish by several hundred votes in Union county. In the first place, Chamberlain will get practically every Democratic vote. This will be reinforced by many hundred Republicans who oppose the Furnish methods. The nearly 4000 voters in my county are about equally divided into the camps of the Democratic and Republican parties. With hundreds of Republicans outspoken in declaring they will vote for honest George Chamberlain, every one who is not mentally blind can see that Union county will roll up a big majority against Furnish.

Scott Abandoning Furnish.

In its attempt to read Governor Geer out of the Republican party the Oregonian practically admits that Furnish has no chance of election and attacks the governor for not being a loud-mouthed supporter of the "affiliated gang of unscrupulous and corrupt grafters" who have secured control of the party in this state. The governor seems to be remaining at home and attending to the duties of his office and complying with the notice served on him that he was not wanted as a representative of the party.

For twenty years the Oregonian has daily taught the people of Oregon that the very men who are now controlling the Republican party are "unscrupulous and corrupt," unworthy of public confidence, having no regard for decency or honor in the public service, and declared its own independence of party and that it rejoiced in being a "professional bolter." It should not, therefore, be surprised if some of its most conscientious pupils hesitate to follow its example in bowing down to the shrine of Jack Matthews.

This notification of the Oregonian that in its judgment Governor Geer is a "party wrecker," and that, in substance, Mr. Furnish's friends do not intend to support him for U. S. senator, although he was nominated as a Republican by 2000 citizens, while Furnish was nominated by a much less direct method, again takes its position as a "professional bolter."

If Governor Geer's friends accept this notice as it was plainly meant, retaliation will begin at once. The ring master, Jack Matthews, has publicly said that he would not put the governor's name on the tickets he is having printed in the papers of the state, because he "is not on our side," and therefore not entitled to any consideration. The Oregonian seems to think that the governor should sup-

port Jack, nevertheless, in stentorian voice, although it has bolted Geer's nomination from the first by never printing his name with the rest of the Republican ticket.

If the governor's friends do not accept this challenge to scrap the head of the ticket, then they are less wide awake than they are generally supposed.

Everybody knows that Furnish is bound hand and foot to Fulton for U. S. senator, although he is not on the ticket. Geer on the stump anywhere, yet some people pretend to think Geer should be shouting for Furnish! Great scheme, that.

BETTING ON CHAMBERLAIN

Only Half of Salem Purse Taken at Portland.

Upon investigation, the great amount of talking that has emanated from alleged Republican sources advertising an abundance of money in sporting circles to be placed on Furnish for governor, has been found to consist almost entirely of "hot air," that is not backed up by the coin. The Oregonian has been boasting of available money on almost any kind of a proposition, to the amount of \$5000 in \$1000 installments, that had been deposited at a Portland cigar store on Furnish, and for which no takers could be found. This week F. W. Durbin, D. J. Fry, F. W. Steuhalff and others made up a purse of \$1000 and sent J. R. Linn to Portland Wednesday evening to place that amount on Chamberlain's election. Mr. Linn visited the much-talked of cigar store depository for Furnish money, and also the Republican headquarters and sporting circles, but could succeed in placing only \$500 of the amount at even money. It is the general belief that if the real truth were known, but very little money has been bet on the election of Mr. Furnish.

L. B. McClain, of this city, has been carrying \$120 in his pocket for several days in quest of a bet on Marion county. McClain is anxious to wager that Chamberlain will receive a majority in Marion county, or would bet on general results, but can find no takers on either proposition. John O. Estes, deputy sheriff, also has \$100 he desires to place that Furnish will not carry Marion county.

THE MUTE COULD NOT READ IT

An Amusing Incident in the Police Court This Morning.

A sentence to the city jail offered no attraction to a transient mute, who was arraigned in the police court this morning for drunkenness. The man was arrested Thursday night, while in an intoxicated condition, by the police officers, who were unable to learn the stranger's name, or his destination. When the fellow had sufficiently sobered up, and realized that he was in jail, he spent the night weeping, and his grief was not assumed, either.

When brought into court this morning, City Recorder Judah wrote upon paper requesting of the stranger his name. The mute gazed at the handwriting for an instant, and in reply wrote a sentence insisting that the questioner should print the sentence outlining the desired information. Now this should not be construed as a reflection on the genial city recorder's penmanship, for he has always prided himself upon writing a legible hand. The recorder evidently did not appreciate the inference that might be taken from the man's query, and in large letters printed the following sentence: "You had better leave town at once," but before he could produce the last word, the fellow walked hastily to Chief Gibson, whom he caressed, and, with eyes raised heavenward, he wildly gesticulated his arms, as a supposed expression of gratification for the lenient sentence. He then approached City Recorder Judah where the same exhibition was repeated. By this time the police judge had finished the sentence by the addition of the word "once," and having underlined the last two words, he directed the attention of the mute to the admonition. Without another gesture the man hastened from the court-room, and when last seen was making remarkable time towards the city's northern limits.

Salem Team Plays Eugene

The Willamette University baseball nine, accompanied by Manager L. A. Kerr, went to Eugene this morning, where they will play a match game with the U. of O. team this afternoon. The local nine has little hopes of winning the game, since it goes to Eugene in a crippled condition. Unruh, the team's effective catcher, was unable to accompany the boys on account of sickness, and Craig, the substitute man in the battery, is also indisposed, so the Methodists will devote their efforts toward keeping the score reduced as much as possible.

HONOR SOLDIER DEAD

All the Salem Cemeteries Visited.

Graves Generally Beautified and Decorated.

The nation's soldier dead was honored at Salem today when annual Memorial day exercises were held. The day was cool and pleasant, and hundreds turned out. Business houses, public buildings and residences were more generally and elaborately decorated than usual. Business houses were closed at noon, and all Salem devoted the afternoon in honoring the nation's heroes.

At 10 o'clock members of the Union Veterans' Union and the ladies of the G. A. R. assembled at their hall on State street and proceeded to the Lee Mission cemetery, where the graves of deceased comrades were decorated.

The procession, headed by the G. A. R., to City View cemetery, wherein are buried the deceased members of that organization, was formed at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon under the direction of Captain J. Q. Barnes, as chief marshal, and aides. The Salem Military band was in attendance, and to martial music the line of march, previously published, was followed, and the pageant moved to the cemetery, where the G. A. R. ritualistic services were conducted, and the graves of the dead soldiers in the G. A. R. plot decorated.

A squad of the Oregon National Guard fired the usual salute over the graves.

There was a continuous stream of people, laden with flowers, going to the cemetery during Thursday evening and Friday morning, and the graves were well decorated. A deferred season has resulted in a scarcity of roses, but there was this year a greater profusion of other flowers than last season, and the decorations were very general, and more elaborate than usual.

The appearance of all the cemeteries has been much improved the past two weeks, and they never looked better at this time of year.

Upon returning to the city, after the exercises, the old veterans were served dinner by the ladies of the W. R. C. in the Turner building.

Tonight's memorial service will be held in the armory at the city hall, beginning promptly at 8 o'clock. The members of the G. A. R. Post and the ladies of the W. R. C. will meet at their hall in the Turner building, corner of Commercial and Ferry streets, at 7:30 o'clock, and march to the hall in a body.
