TWO IMPORTANT OFFICES.

Beyond any question of doubt the two most important county offices to be filled at this election are sheriff and clerk. They are the two positions of greatest immediate responsibility to the people, and the posts of honor which require competency and executive ability. For these two positions the Republicans of Marion county have placed in nomination two men who are of unquestioned character and integrity. They are competent, and their reputation in the county is such that every voter, even those among their political opponents, will admit that they are the right men for the place. John Stelwer, for sheriff, is the right kind of timber for the place, a well-to-do farmer, and, in fact, in many respects just such a man as the present incumbent. He should receive the hearty support of all taxpayers who are interested in good government. Mr. Roland, the candidate for clerk, will also satisfy the demands of every good citizen and taxpayer. Give these gentlemen your votes, and you take no chances.

GODFREY OR WHITNEY, WHICH WILL IT BE?

In the din of battle for the governorship and local county tickets there is one office in the state of Oregon that has not received the attention that its enormous disbursements of finances merits, the state printing office being the one referred to. First, the office costs the state \$40,000 a year. Second, there are two candidates seeking the office—J. E. Godfrey, Democrat, and J. R. Whitney, Republican.

Now let us see what the claims of these two men are to the position they seek.

J. E. Godfrey, of Salem, is one of the oldest members of the Typographical Union in the state; has been foreman of the state printing office, is a practical printer, a union man, believes in living wages and a decent number of hours as a day's work; is thoroughly competent to run the office and handle the large number of men necessary to turning out the work promptly and in a satisfactory manner; is a plain working man, not a politician, and his selection on the Democratic ticket is a recognition from that party of the typographical union.

J. R. Whitney, the Republican candidate, is merely, like hundreds of other good citizens of Oregon, the publisher of a small country paper, with no experience in the management of such institutions as that to which he aspires, and experience is something that costs money in a printing office. Do the people of Oregon want to pay for the acquiring of this experience? He is not, or has not until very recently been, a member of the typographical union. In fact two members of the union were turned down to give the position to this country politician for certain influences in the state convention. Mr. Whitney is entirely unfitted for the position. Last, but by no means least, an effort was lately made to form a typographical union in Albany, the home of the Republican candidate, and his paper was the only one that opposed it.

The state printing office is a union concern from top to bottom. Now we ask, can any member of a union, no matter of what organization, vote to put over members of a typographical union a boss who is a "rat," a believer in long hours and small pay? This is the situation: One a believer in union; the other opposed to union, as shown by his actions. J. R. Whitney. And, though he may capitulate, owing to election demands, and to catch the labor vote, yet his actions have already spoken louder than words. In the name of organized labor, you are asked to vote and work for J. E. Godfrey, the Democratic nominee, and an upholder of unionism, and a member of one of the greatest labor organizations the world has ever seen.

Again, the cost of the state printing office, as stated, is \$40,000 per year. Too much money for the actual necessities of the office. This is acknowledged by Mr. Godfrey, and he makes the proposition to the people to accept the office on a flat salary. Can there be anything fairer? Again, we ask organized labor to stand together and recognize one of their brothers in the ranks.

Look out for all kinds of rosbucks, eleven-hour confessions, campaign lies, anything-to-win falsehoods. Such are liable to be sprung on Monday in the interest of corrupt politicians. All voters should be on their guard. Remember the polls close at 6 o'clock.

The Statesman this morning truly voices the sentiments of hundreds of Marion county Republicans in denouncing the flight of the Oregonian against Mr. Geer, and other Republicans in the interest of Furnish. If Mr. Furnish is obliged to bolt Mr. Geer, and otherwise traduce good Republicans, he does not deserve to be elected. The rebuke is a just one, and should be borne in mind by Republicans when they vote.
