WALLOWA WOOL.

265,000 Head of Sheep in the North-

A. B. Winfree, deputy district attorney, has returned to Baker City, after an absence of several weeks at Wallowa and Enterprise, in Wallowa county. He says there are now approximately 265,000 sheep in that county, and that the sheep men have inaugurated the use of machines for shearing. The machines are operated by water power, and from 100 to 110 sheep can be sheared in a day. This is about the same rate the animals can be sheared of their fleeces by hand, but it is argued the machines are worked closer to the hide, and thus more grease is secured, and more weight given the wool. He says one outfit has taken a contract to shear 75,000 sheep this season, and that the shipments of wool from that section will be heavy.

McMAHAN ATTACKS CROISAN

County Canvass Closes with Sensation

The Marion county political campaign closed in Salem Saturday night with a joint discussion by candidates on the Republican and Democratic tickets. The attendance was not large, enthusiasm was lacking, and the meeting was in striking contrast with the close of the campaigns of both two and four years ago.

W. J. Culver, chairman of the Republican county central committee, presided. S. Farrar, J. W. Roland, A. M. LaFollett, T. B. Kay, E. T. Judd, E. M. Croisan and E. D. Horgan were the speakers for the Republicans. Frank Davey concluding for the majority party. A. M. Dalrymple, L. H. McMahon, S. Tomlinson, Lewis Saw, J. R. Dimick and W. T. Slater presented the discussion for the Democrats. J. A. Jeffrey summing up the argument for that party.

Every Republican speaker forgot his own troubles, and spent a generous part of the time allotted him in explaining why Furnish should be elected governor.

The only exciting feature of the meeting was the roasting McMahon administered to his opponent, E. M. Croisan. Of the incident, a Portland paper had the following:

"A scene, bordering on the sensational, attended the close of the Marion county joint political campaign. The McMahon-Croisan controversy reached a climax, when the former, after a complete review of Croisan's official record as sheriff of Marion county, charging him, as such officer, with the collection of illegal, excessive and unconscionable fees, offered a defense to the alleged insinuations that had been made by Croisan that he (McMahon) had obtained money from a questionable source with which to make a tour of Europe in 1897. McMahon charged his opponent with having vilified his good name and reputation, by causing to be published untruthful statements against him that he dared not stand before an audience of Salem people, to whom he had been known all his life, and repeat. Greatly excited McMahon assumed a dramatic attitude, and addressing his opponent, who was seated on the side of the platform, challenged him to show where he had at any time in his life soiled his hands by accepting a dishonest dollar. He appealed to Croisan to stand forth and substantiate the charge against his reputation, and the honor of his family, whom he had slandered and vilified, or forever remain branded as a villainous slanderer. The scene was an exciting one, and the crowd remained in breathless silence. Croisan made no response, and the incident passed without further excitement."

Regular Sunday Excursion

The Sunday excursion from Portland, given under the auspices of the Federated Trades Union of Portland, brought only about 1200 people to Salem. The weather was opposed to a successful excursion, and did much to mar the pleasure such a trip and the spending of a few hours in the Capital City would afford under more favorable weather conditions. Next Sunday Salem will entertain the conductors' annual picnic. The conductors are popular entertainers, and always bring large crowds, and there is every reason to believe that this year's crowd will be considerably augmented.

Labor Meeting Held at Salem

G. Y. Harry, president of the State Federation of Labor, addressed a large meeting of laborers at the city hall Sunday afternoon. Mr. Harry reviewed the success that had attended the organization of labor in the state, only recently begun, and said it would be but a short time until the interests of labor in every county of the state would be united for the mutual benefit that will accrue to the members. Other addresses from a labor point of view were given. The Salem Federal Labor Union now has a membership of over 150, and in addition there are seven separate labor unions.

Suit for Land.

Mandamus proceedings have been instituted against the Oregon State Land Board by J. S. Fish and T. J. Seufert, of The Dalles, as the result of the refusal of the board to accept their applications for a section of school land in Wasco county. The suits have been begun separately, and each involves 320 acres of land, part timber, in Eastern Oregon. Circuit Judge R. P. Bolte issued to the members of the board an alternative writ of man-

damus, requiring the board to accept the filing and applications, and issue the proper certificates for the land to the plaintiffs, or appear in court and show why the same should not be done. The writ of mandamus is made returnable June 30th.

The only issue in the suit is the scope of the authority of the State Land Board in making rules for the government and control of its official in the absence of any statute covering silent on the question of granting extension of time for the settlement of delinquencies, from which the members of the board understood the granting of a period of grace was within the scope of their jurisdiction, and this rule was adopted and always has been adhered to by the board in the sale of school lands.

A case involving the same question, is now pending in the supreme court, wherein Dr. C. H. Robinson, of this city, is plaintiff in a similar proceeding. The decision in this case will determine the ones begun today. In passing upon the case in the lower court, Circuit Judge Bolte held that in the absence of any statute covering the subject it was within the jurisdiction of the board to make such reasonable rules for the government and transaction of its business as the members might deem expedient.

Young Man Arrested

Answers Description of Suspect Who is Wanted

A stranger, giving the name of Percy McDonald, was arrested in this city Saturday afternoon by Sheriff Durbin, by whom he is suspected of being an accomplice of the murder of a Sacramento, California, merchant named Duffy. Local officers do not believe that McDonald is the man's real name, but he answers perfectly the description of the associate of the murderer, sent out by the Sacramento police, and will be held until California officers can be further communicated with.

When arrested, McDonald, who is only 20 years of age, had a Wells-Fargo certificate of deposit on a San Francisco bank for \$349.55, upon which he had drawn \$100 upon a draft from Ashland. When first questioned by Sheriff Durbin, the prisoner said he originally came from Fairhaven, Wash., and explained that he had been working for a smelting company in Northern California, where he had earned the money represented in the certificate of deposit. He was put through a "sweating" process by Sheriff Durbin, and finally confessed that he had come into possession of the deposit certificate dishonestly. The Wells-Fargo officials in Portland were notified of the arrest, and will investigate the case.

If McDonald proves to be other than the man wanted in Sacramento, he will be prosecuted on a charge of illegally drawing money on a certificate of deposit not his own.

Local officials believe the prisoner stole the certificate from a fellow-miner, the property of one P. McDonald, and assumed that name to aid him in realizing money thereon. McDonald arrived in Salem Friday, and the liberal way in which he was spending money aroused the suspicion of the police, who kept him spotted. McDonald was traveling as a hobo, with two associates, and it was partly through information disclosed by one of his companions, who says he came from Sacramento, that the arrest of McDonald resulted.
