DELIVERY BUSINESS DEMORALIZED

**General Strike of the
Chicago Teamsters**

**Ten Thousand Make Rush for
Packers' Wagons**

**Police Charge the Crowd and
Riot Ensues.**

Chicago, June 3.—Every department store driver in the city struck today. The delivery business of the big stores is completely paralyzed. Rioting, as a result of the stockyard drivers' strike, was resumed this morning, when the packers sent a number of wagons up town to deliver several tons of meat. The wagons were escorted by 50 police who were later augmented by 50 in reserve when the outbreak took a serious phase. Shortly before the wagons reached the downtown district, several thousand gathered and followed them, jeering the drivers. Later a rush was made for the wagons, with the intention of upsetting the contents into the streets, but the policemen charged upon the mob, using clubs freely, and making several arrests. They succeeded finally in getting the wagons to one big department store, where delivery was to be made. Here a crowd of 10,000 gathered, and made another rush for the wagons, but the police beat them back until the wagons had delivered the meat. The wagons then returned to the yards, followed by the jeering crowd.

WHEN MARRIAGES FAIL.

Mrs. Bolter Said That There Is Usually Another Man or Woman in the Case.

Mrs. E. P. Bolter, who is still filling the pulpit at the Franklin-avenue Congregational church in Cleveland, Ohio, took for her subject "When a Failure and Why?" The audience was unusually large, and Mrs. Bolter said in part:

"I will first consider the question as to whether marriage is really a failure. According to a minister, three out of every five marriages result in divorce, and if this be correct over 50 per cent. of marriages are lamentable mistakes. If business concerns resulted in such disaster they would soon be quoted in Duff and Bradstreet as unreliable.

"Marriage is serious, however regarded; not only till death do us part," but during life it has a great influence on life and a profound influence on the soul for eternity.

"According to my idea many failures in marriage are due to selfishness. This is shown on the part of man by his always wanting his own way. He never wants his comfort interfered with. But his wife is a partner, and they together should share the home making. If she is to be queen she must have a scepter and a realm.

"Man also shows his selfishness by fault-finding and whining, which to him is far from creditable.

"Regarding woman, however, I want to say that her selfishness generally takes the form of discontent. If she marries a mechanic, often she grieves because her husband is not a professional man. If she is allowed \$50 per year for pin money, she is discontented in this that she is not given \$250. She is also in a moody, unpleasant disposition because she cannot dress as the wife of her husband's employer.

This woman regards motherhood, not as an honor, but a burden. She neither cares for what she can give her loved ones; what she can get is all that concerns her. She reckons as wealth, not heart's treasure, but what she can get from the cotton plant, the flax or the silk worm's perfume. And for just such women there are plenty of traps, which have their sequel in divorce, broken hearts and tarnished homes.

"As a solution I would recommend simplicity, in other words plain living and high thinking."

Mrs. Bolter also said that when marriages are a failure there is generally another man or woman in the case.

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FATAL IOWA CLOUDBURST

Sweeps Everything Before it.

Loss of Life and Great Damage to Property

Storm General Throughout Middle States.

Joliet, Ill., June 3.—A cloudburst struck Joliet and vicinity at midnight, causing the loss of at least three lives, and immense damage to property. Almost every railroad track entering the city was washed away, and railroad traffic was completely suspended for several hours. People were asleep when the raging waters poured down upon the city, and before they could be aroused were penned in their homes. The alarm was quickly given, and the work of rescue begun. Hundreds were taken from their houses in small boats, but many were still prisoners at daylight. Business in the city is practically suspended, and mills and factories closed. In some places the water is five feet deep. Several houses were washed away, and many residences uninhabitable. Scores of railroad cars are completely submerged, many cattle drowned, and thousands of dollars' worth of merchandise ruined. The dead are: Eddie McGovern, Mabel Ford, Lizzie McGraw. The damage is roughly estimated at \$200,000.

Chicago, June 3.—Late dispatches indicate that the rain and electrical storm that culminated so disastrously at Joliet is general throughout Northern Illinois, Wisconsin and portions of South Dakota. Outside of Joliet the most serious damage was done at La Crosse, where several buildings were reported partially destroyed. Near Rockford, Ill., one man was killed by lightning. Of DeSoto and Brownsville, Wisconsin, considerable damage was done, and one life lost. Heavy hail fell in South Dakota, badly damaging the crops.

Des Moines, June 3.—A cloudburst five miles south of here yesterday afternoon washed away several acres of corn, undrained six miles of track on the Burlington route, blockading all traffic on the Keokuk branch, and drowned many cattle and sheep.
