WILL KEEP POLICE

Council Fails in Attempt to Reduce Force

No More Shingle Roofs in Business District.

An attempt to dispense with the services of Larry Murphy, as special night policeman, and return to the one-man night police service, formerly in operation here, was defeated by the decisive vote at the regular meeting of the council Tuesday evening. The proposed reduction was suggested by Riggs, who said he thought the city might economize some in the department since the nights were growing shorter, and the services of one policeman could readily be dispensed with. Public seconded the motion of Riggs that the services of a special policeman be discontinued. The council considered the proposed action an impolitic one. Public qualified his seconding of the motion by saying he supported the movement because he thought the city could spare the extra man, and he believed now his salary. Burrows said the police question had always more or less agitated the council. He had always been opposed to the employment of a second night policeman, and he believed now was a good time to reduce the force. Stolz said the economy that was expected to be practical in reducing the city's already limited police department was mere mockery. It was during the summer months above all seasons of the year when the transient class was so numerous, that the city required adequate police protection. After some further discussion Riggs' motion was put to a vote and defeated. Upon motion of Griswold, the members of the fire department were given the use of another room on the second floor at the city hall, and adjoining their present quarters. The room will be used by the members in case a member becomes sick. In their present quarters the boys have no accommodations for nursing indisposed members, other than in the general quarters.

The city council last night refused to grant E. S. Lamport the privilege of erecting a livery barn in the block and south of the L. O. O. F. temple, the roof of the building to be formed of shingles. The lodge members protested to the granting of such a permit, and Mr. Lamport filed a lengthy petition, bearing the signatures of owners of adjoining property, in his behalf. The council refused to grant the privilege. The council desires it understood that it has placed itself on record as opposed to the granting of any building permits within the business district of the city, wherein the roof shall be of combustible materials.
