ARE IN ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT

Veterans of G. A. R. in Session at Astoria

The annual encampment of the G. A. R. and W. R. C. is in session at Astoria, and several old veterans and their wives are in attendance from this city. Speaking of the encampment and the entertainment of the visitors, an Astoria paper has the following:

"The visiting members will arrive in Astoria Wednesday morning by the 11 o'clock train. They will be met by the local Post and the Relief Corps in a body at the station, and escorted to the Occidental Hotel, where they will be served dinner and refreshed after their journey. At 2 o'clock the children of the various schools of the city will collect on Bond street, adjacent to the hotel, where they will be arranged in line of parade, lead by the hoary headed veterans of past battles and ladies of the Relief Corps. The line of march will be extended through all the principal streets of Astoria. In the evening addresses of welcome will be made at Fisher's opera house, followed by a musical concert arranged by Mrs. J. T. Ross. Thursday morning will be taken up by business and social meetings, for members only; but at 2 o'clock an excursion will be given to Fort Stevens and places of interest at the mouth of the river.
