Catholics and Legal Divorce

At San Francisco very Rev. J. J. Prendergast, the vicar-general of this archdiocese, as a prelude to his sermon, defined some of the points of doctrine and discipline of the Catholic church relating to the subject of divorce. He said in part:

Inasmuch as divorced persons are sometimes married in the Catholic church, many people are perplexed, because they understand that the Catholic church does not recognize divorce as a dissolution of the marriage tie. Hence not a few find themselves unable to reconcile what they consider the discipline with the practice. In reality there is no conflict between the church's disciplinary laws and the church's acts. The explanation of the apparent conflict is very simple. The church never accepts the divorce decree as a ground of justification for the second marriage; but, if upon investigation, it is clearly established that the first marriage, though legal and so far honorable, was a marriage which would not stand in her courts, as being open antagonism to her laws, then that first marriage is declared null and void before her tribunals and a subsequent marriage may be allowed. For example, under the discipline of the church, a marriage contracted before the civil authorities or Protestant pastors between a baptized Christian of any denomination, and an unbaptized person, does not hold good before the tribunal of the church, consequently the parties thereto, if divorced, are free, if not debarrd by some other cause than the divorce, to contract a new marriage. In this and all similar cases, the second marriage is permitted not on the grounds of divorce, but on the ground of invalidity or nullity of the first marriage, as judged by the disciplinary legislation of the Catholic church. This is not casting a stigma on a marriage, which the church recognizes as good and true in law, although lacking the character of permanency according to the laws of the church. In fact, nowadays, there seems to be a growing tendency to recognize marriage as simply legal and binding only so long as the law allows.

The perplexity of so many people, upon discovering that divorced persons are sometimes married in the church, would be much less if they bore in mind that under the church discipline there are altogether eight or ten conditions, or as they are technically called impediments, which bar marriage, unless these impediments are, for good reasons, removed by former dispensation. The marriage between a baptized and an unbaptized is one of these; another is constraint, depriving one of the contracting parties of the liberty essential to all contracts; solemn religious vows also constitute one of the impediments. Close relationship is a fourth.

There is a prevailing idea that dispensations are granted by the church in consideration of social influence, or what is worse, money power. This notion is absolutely false. It arises from the circumstances that a dispensation which is sometimes given in high life is discussed by the papers. It is frequently given to persons in humble stations. Such a dispensation is given by the local authorities. It is given here without the expense of one cent to the applicants, whether rich or poor. It is only in the most extraordinary and complicated cases that application for dispensation has to be made to Rome.

Change in Postal Clerks.

Several changes have lately been made in the run of railway postal clerks. Joe Wertz, who has been running on the Albany local, has been transferred to the long run between Portland and Dunsmuir. Wilson Flagg will be transferred to the helper run to Roseburg, and Geo. T. Bradshaw of this city, who has been having that run, takes the run vacated by Mr. Wertz on the Albany local. Fred W. Smith is now running with Lester Leland, in the place of John Butterworth, who started for St. Michaels last week.

Shots Twenty-One Miles.

Arrangements are being made at Ft. Hamilton for mounting the new 10-inch gun which has been in course of construction at the Watervliet Arsenal for the past four years. The gun will be placed at the fort as soon as it has been officially tested at the Sandy Hook proving ground. The test is awaited eagerly by all the gun makers of the world. It is claimed the gun will hurl a shell twenty-one miles. In order to discharge the gun it will require 1000 pounds of powder and a 2000 pounds projectile. The weight of the gun is 150 tons.

Single Tax in England.

It is interesting to note the growth of ideas. Who would have believed twenty years ago that Henry George's idea of taxation of land values would develop as it has done in this country? It is the ground of quarrel between Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman and Lord Rosebery. But the idea will triumph. Most of our great municipalities have declared in favor of it. The latest testimony to its vitality is contained in a very valuable report prepared for the London county council by a local government and taxing committee. The report recommends, amongst other things, that provision

No more charming article on angling has appeared in years than, "Trout and Philosophy on a Vermont Stream," illustrated by full page drawings. Among other good features are a history of the English derby, an account of the early days of baseball by an old-time player, and "Watchers of the Campfire," an animal story of the Canadian woods, by Charles G. D. Roberts. In the "Sportsman's View-Point," by Caspar Whitney, the reader may get a view of amateur sport, the country over, as it appears to the greatest American sporting critic.

The Criterion for June, 156 Fifth Avenue, New York, contains the "Love Affairs of Great Musicians," "A Paper on Personal Recollections of William Cullen Bryant." The poems and dramatic criticisms in this superb monthly are above the average of the monthlies.

The staid old Atlantic for June has unusually attractive list of papers. Among them reviews of international affairs, articles on education, politics, and literature. These are short stories and disquisitions on a variety of topics that make up an elaborate bill of fare.

The Broadway Magazine, 129 West 42d street, makes up in color and multitude of pretty faces what it lacks in dignity and literary effects. But good bright writing is not missing from the pages. While the heroes of the matinee and the heroines of the footlights shine forth on every page.

The Ten-Story Book, 263-269 Dearborn street, Chicago, has a bright collection for June. It includes with a chapter on home lessons in millinery, \$1.00 a year.

The M'Call Co., 115 West 31st st., New York, furnish a monthly fashion magazine at fifty cents a year. The July number is full of interesting matter and illustrations.

Frank Leslie's Popular Monthly has three features of unusual interest—"A Sketch of John Alexander Dowie," "The Chicago Elitjah," "Man-Killing Horses" and "Student Honor in Paris." This has become one of the really great ten-cent magazines.

The Pacific Monthly for June has a great paper on the "Oregon Forests," by the naturalist, John Muir. It is, as usual, devoted to the literature of the Pacific Northwest. Wm. M. Wells continues to be editor and is well fitted for the task.
