PHILIPPINE ISLAND GROUPS

Only a Portion of Archipelago Organized

Washington, June 6.—A cablegram from Vice-Governor Wright of the Philippines, published today by the war department, says that outside of the Moro country the only portions of the archipelago now organized under civil government are Le Panto, Bontoc, Batangas, La Guna, Principe, Infanta, Mindoro, Samar and the Paragan and other small groups. He says there is no armed insurrection in any of them, and there is no reason why a civil government may not be established in all.

UNCLE SAM'S BLUEJACKETS.

Thirty-five Portlanders Accepted for the Navy.

Thirty-five young, sturdy Americans left Portland yesterday in charge of Lieutenant J. P. Morton to proceed to San Francisco, where they will take the first steps to join Uncle Sam's navy. The boys will go on board the training ship there, while the young men who are classed as yeoman, coal passers, etc., will step on board the United States receiving ship at Mare Island. Nearly 100 applicants were examined in all, but a great many were rejected because of weak heart action, bad eyesight and enlarged tonsils. One boy who appeared at first sight physically sound, was rejected because it was found he had a glass eye.

Ophthalmia is Contagious.
New York, June 6.—Because of the discovery that ophthalmia is prevalent among a large proportion of the pupils in the public schools in this city the board of health has placed it on the list of contagious diseases, and physicians will hereafter be compelled to make reports of each case found in their private practice. Thorough investigations made in two of the public schools, where the eyes of about 2000 children were examined, it was found that at least 10 per cent had the disease. In one of the schools 20 per cent of the children were afflicted, and in the other 15 per cent.

Rome, June 6.—The Pope had a long conference with Cardinal Rampoll to day, with reference to the Taft commission. His Holiness said that he had received the best impressions from the words of Governor Taft at the audience yesterday.

SUPREME LODGE WORKMEN

To Be Fed on Strawberries and Cream at Salem

Local Reception Committee Engages Chemawa Band

The general reception committee from the local A. O. U. W. and Degree of Honor lodges held a meeting Thursday evening and formulated a plan of entertainment to be carried out on the occasion of the visit to Salem of the members of the supreme lodge A. O. U. W., on Monday, June 16th.

The reception committee, on the part of the ladies consists of Mrs. R. D. Holman, Mrs. Ed. Pugh, Mrs. Mary Davis and Mrs. M. L. Hamilton. S. A. McFadden is chairman of the committee, but the members to serve on the committee from the two A. O. U. W. lodges have not yet been appointed. The members of the supreme lodge, on their Willamette valley excursion tour, have allotted Salem about two hours. It is expected the excursion party will reach Salem about 10:30 o'clock Monday morning, June 16th, and leave at 12:30 o'clock, noon, for Albany, returning to Portland via the West Side. The local committee has engaged the services of the Chemawa Indian Training School band for the occasion, and it is proposed to have the party stop at Chemawa, en route to Salem, and spend a half hour informing themselves what the government is doing on the coast for the education of the Indian. The party will be joined at Chemawa by the Indian school band, whose playing will probably be a revelation to the Easterners, and dispel the belief that exists in many of their minds that Oregon and the coast country is inhabited largely by the uncivilized Indian. Upon reaching Salem the party will be escorted to Marion Square, where, if the weather is favorable, the visitors will be served luncheon, which will include Oregon's matchless strawberries and cream. If the weather is unpropitious, luncheon will be served in the corridors of the state capitol building. Everything will be done by the local Workmen and the auxiliary lodges to make the visit of the distinguished party to Oregon's Capital City, a memorable one in connection with its trip to the Pacific coast.

THE HORSE'S FEET.

(D. D. Keeler, in Pacific Homestead.)
I would like to say a few words in behalf of our noble servant, the horse. These words are in regard to the care of his feet. In every stable there ought to be found hanging in the most convenient place a little instrument known amongst horsemen as a foot hook. This hook is made easily by any blacksmith, by taking a three-eighth round rod for the handle, and with the eye at the end, should measure about six inches. For the hook take six inches of a half oval seven-eighths iron—one end should be made like a common pick the other end flattened somewhat resembling a grubbing hoe. This piece should be bent in a half circle, or nearly so. In the center of this should be a square hole punched and from the concave side the handle previously spoken of should be riveted. Now, when filed up good and smooth, our instrument is ready for use, and no team or horse with shoes on should be put away for the night until each foot has been lifted and with this little instrument entirely cleaned out. Leaving the feet packed with mud and the debris that the horse has been compelled to pass through while traveling tends to cause disease and a rotting of the foot.

Every good farmer ought to see to it that his men look after this as much, and even more, than the bedding of the team they work. Gentlemen's driving horses should be looked to in this regard, especially, and in fact a great many of the ailments of the feet of our horses would not exist if some care were taken in this direction. Horses in their native state would clean their feet several times a day by playing or jumping, thus throwing the pads out of their feet where they do not cling very closely, having no shoes to pack in, but we subjugate the horse, put him in a barn, and compel him to wear irons on his feet, and we should do for him as near as we can what he would do for himself if we had left him free. A horse is brought in from a long drive, and he is noticed going a little lame, put away in his stable, and the foot not cleaned out, and who again wanted he is found dead lame; but, when this horse came in had this little instrument been used on his feet it would have been observed that his shoes were out of it, or that there was a stone wedged in between the frog and the shoe, bruising the foot, or that a nail was sticking in just deep enough to lacerate the sensitive tissues of the foot, and it is found that unless attended to by a competent person the poor horse will have the terrible of lockjaw, or some kindred trouble.

ROADS INTO YUKON

Canadian Enterprise Making Valuable Improvements

Tacoma, Wash., June 6.—The Yukon territory has undertaken the building of 330 miles of new roads and trails this summer, including 200 miles from Dawson to White Horse rapids, and other roads along the Klondike creeks. It is just announced that the Dawson-Yukon telegraph lines, built by the Dominion government, from Ashcroft to Dawson, cost nearly \$500,000. Seventy offices are maintained.

FLOODS IN KANSAS.

High Water Doing Much Damage to Property and Crops.

Kansas City, June 6.—Southern Kansas streams are still causing more or less serious damage to crops and railroads. Near Parsons water stands several feet deep in many houses, while at Burlington the bottoms are flooded and water is entering store basements. The Neosho river is said to have broken through the levees at several points in Neosho and La Belle counties, in the southeastern corner of the state, and to have inundated much land and ruined crops.

The Arkansas river is yet very high and much damage to property has resulted. It is thought, however, that the stream has reached its highest point, and that a fall may be expected within the next few hours. The Cottonwood river is far above the high-water mark. The water has overflowed the banks to such an extent as to ruin many acres of corn and down much small livestock on the farms. A wash-out on the Santa Fe near Emporia tied up all the trains on the main line.
