Mineral wool, dead air space and charcoal paper combined, so as to obtain the full value of their non-conducting properties are used, such construction being peculiar to this make. The old method of using powdered charcoal is still used by some manufacturers, but is objectional on account of its settling in the walls, also working its way through small openings and coming in contact with food, rendering it unfit for use.

PRESIDENT TO BE ELECTED.

On June 17 for Monmouth Normal School.

The new president of Monmouth Normal School will be named at the annual meeting to be held June 17 at Monmouth, says an exchange. A number of applications have been received by Secretary Butler, but none have as yet been officially discussed.

Among those named for the place are Professor Rossier of the University of Oregon; the president of Tacoma high school; J. M. Martindale, city superintendent of Albany public schools, and several educators of this city. J. B. V. Butler of Monmouth, has been suggested for the place, but refuses to consider the matter at all. He is now secretary of the board of regents and of the faculty and librarian of the school.

The position is considered as one of the best in the state, as Monmouth takes the lead in rank among the normal schools of the state.

At the coming school election the people of Salem will take no steps backward in public school matters. They will go forward to better schools until Salem has the best public schools in the state.
