B. B. Colbath, Democrat, is elected sheriff by a majority of 65 votes. He received 2583 as against 2518 for Stetson.

A Trumpet Blast for Salem.

Ed. Journal: Having just returned from a two months' visit to Everett, Wash., I would like to say a few words to the public of Salem in regard to the immigrants arriving there daily from the east, the majority of whom are Scandinavians from Wisconsin, Minnesota and the Dakotas. I have been in close touch with these people over thirty years; have served them officially as town clerk and justice of the peace eight years and can claim a very fair knowledge of their character. Of them I will say I've

failed to meet any more industrious people than they, and if you want them you will have to show them some inducement in the shape of employment, to get them. They are seeking homes, farms at a reasonable figure. Ten or twenty acre tracts, and places near a wide-awake city, where they can find a market or work at a pinch in need. Salem, are you that kind of a city? They think not; Portland will draw on them, as may Oregon City, but there is a "curtain sleep" well blanketed by moss-back usurers that is sapping the life out of the rest of the valley, and they seem to know it. Oregon has been thoroughly advertised, its fine natural possibilities and its most miserable failing. If Salem wishes to receive those people, she has to make some practical demonstration of the fact—wake up, run your business, open every street to the corporate lines and when they are completed (and not till then) extend your lines through the suburbs. This is the only way you can expect recognition from them, for they would stifle, die, without employment. This also is the way to build up Salem and make a city of 12,000 inhabitants of it and would show some inducement to the people that are passing you by every day. Are you blind? They are gradually leaving the Sound. Land is too high, and many of them talk of settling in North California. Gentlemen, I have talked with hundreds of them within the past two months, and the general impression is that the Willamette Valley is a good home for a dead man. Salem, wake up! throw off the infernal lethargy that has sent so many of your dear ones to their last resting place within the last five years. On Decoration Day I stood on the City View Cemetery and as I looked eastward to the mountains and towards Mt. Jefferson, I thought I had seen no landscape to be admired more, and what might be made possible for such a city as Salem, with the most beautiful site on this western coast the lethargy that has despoiled you of the very flower of your youth, from your schools, your colleges, your workshops, that has driven your children from the public school? To work in the god yards at 75 cents per day. Think of it, but don't let the immigrants.

The Immigration Record Broken.

The old record of immigration for one month, that of May, 1895, when 73,900 people came, will have been broken by the first five months of 1902, and that for May being a close estimate, are as follows:

January, 18,243; February, 29,519; March, 56,175; April, 73,667; May, 88,500; total, 267,104.

While it is not likely that the enormous total of 788,992 in 1882 or 623,984 in 1892 will be this year equalled, immigration for 1902 promises to be far greater than that of the last six or seven years. It is the unwritten statistical law that the flood reaches its highest mark in the first three or four years of each decade.

Immigration Commissioner Williams states that 53 per cent of the people now coming hither are non-producers; that is, they have no trades, although they may find casual occupation. Of these nearly all stay in the North Atlantic cities, and especially in New York. Of the 47 per cent classed as producers more than half, or a quarter of the whole number, are farmers who go immediately inland; but this needed element is proportionally far smaller than it was twenty years ago, when nearly half of all the immigrants were destined for the Middle West alone.

How insufficient present laws are to shut out the undesirable immigrant is shown by the fact that out of the 50,000 who according to Commissioner Williams promise no worth-while addition to American citizenship there will be this month less than 1000 deportation.
