Let us have a business legislature, as well as a business governor.

Oregon has other men of senatorial dimensions, and any one of them would shine up to the average of the material found in that august body. George would reflect credit on the state, and his tallness would make the state conspicuous in one respect, at least.

With all due respect to the gentlemen named, there is a principle involved in the selection of a senator from Oregon that we cannot get away from—the direct vote of the people.

No man is too good, but the people are good enough to be listened to.

Below is given a letter from the Montezuma Copper Co., of Nacozari, Sonora, Mexico, relative to the death of Amos Strong of this city. The letter is to Mrs. Strong, written by J. S. Williams, Jr., assistant superintendent of the mine, and bears date of June 4th:

"Dear Madam: Yesterday morning we sent you a telegram, notifying you of the serious illness of your husband, Mr. Amos Strong, and in the afternoon sent another advising you of his death."

"From all we can learn Mr. Strong had been ill at his camp several days before coming here, and was in Nacozari a day and a half before he sent for a doctor, he having arrived here at noon on Saturday, and not sending for the doctor until Sunday evening."

"The doctor informs us that Mr. Strong was suffering from a complication of diseases, severe dysentery and inflammation of the bowels, but that the immediate cause of death was uric acid poisoning. He was given the best attention possible, our company doctor, who is a very able physician, being in attendance, and there was a nurse with him both night and day. As we thought it probable that you might wish to remove the body some time in the future we had a metal lined coffin made and the body sealed up in it. According to the laws of Mexico you cannot remove the body from this country in less than two years from the date of burial, without a special permit from the state government, and you generally have to pay quite a large sum to get the permit."

"All of your husband's effects that he brought here have been taken care of, including two watches, \$10 in Mexican money, and \$1.05 in U. S. money, being placed in our store vault, a rifle, a small valise containing letters, toilet articles and his old clothing, being left in charge of the manager of the boarding house where he died."

"While we have no ordained minister here, one of our men read the services for the dead at the grave, and all the men here who were off duty attended the funeral. We also dressed the body in a new suit of clothes and did everything in our power to give him a Christian burial."

"It will perhaps be necessary for you to send a representative to Mexico to settle up your husband's affairs, and if so we will be pleased to do all that we can to assist him, and in the meantime do not hesitate to write us for any information you may wish."

Marion County Circuit Court. The jury in the case of James Finney vs. W. H. Egan, a damage suit for \$225, the result of a land suit, last evening returned a verdict for plaintiff for only \$20.

Emery Sharp, of Scio, who was held to the circuit court on a charge of rape, has been discharged by District Attorney J. N. Hart.

Docket entries were made as follows: Mary J. Shaw vs. J. E. Ferris, ejectment; defendant's demurrer to supplemental answer of plaintiff argued and sustained.

Studebaker Bros. vs. Joseph Schell, for money; defendant's motion for judgment on pleadings overruled, and plaintiff's motion for leave to reply sustained.

Colonel James Jackson, inspector-general of the Oregon National Guard, conducted the quarterly inspection of Company F, Fourth Regiment, in this city Tuesday evening. The boys were dressed in camp uniforms, and were complimented by Colonel Jackson upon the very creditable appearance they made. In her death the neighborhood loses one who was held in the highest esteem by friends and neighbors, one who was ever ready to lend a helping hand to the afflicted, with a pleasant smile and a cheerful word for every one; a loving wife and mother, and a true friend.
