STATE GUARD IN CAMP

Albany Preparing to Loyally Entertain Militia Boys

In treating of the annual encampment of the State Guard to be held at Albany July 17-27, the Democrat says:

The annual encampment of the soldiers of the Oregon National Guard, which will be held this year at Albany, will be a bigger thing than many imagine. 1400 officers and men will be in camp eight days from July 17 to 28. The encampment will be held in Hackleman's grove adjoining the city, where excellent grounds will be afforded.

"The attendance will represent militiamen from all parts of the state, besides many visitors. It is estimated that the expenditures by the state alone on account of the encampment will be \$25,000 so it will be seen that it will be a greater affair financially, as well as numerically than several Fourth of July celebrations.

"Arrangements should and will be made to entertain the visitors loyally, so the soldiers will feel glad that they came to Albany and the reputation of this city for hospitality and courteous treatment will be maintained. To this end it will be necessary to provide the grounds with lights, stables for the 100 or more horses of the regiment, and to provide proper entertainment. Something in the nature of a reception is being planned by the Alce club. Some money will be required to carry out these things, and it will be well to consider the matter and be ready to meet the finance committee in a liberal spirit to the end that Albany may entertain the boys in blue and the large number of visitors in a manner becoming an enterprising city."

GRAND LODGES WORKMEN

Given the Freedom of the Webfoot State

Preparations for a Grand Lunch At Salem Monday

The supreme lodge delegates of the Ancient Order of United Workmen arrived in Portland Monday evening. They were welcomed at Huntington, at 2 o'clock by Governor Geer and a special committee of the A. O. U. W. The special train bearing the delegates was 18 hours late. At 3 o'clock the train pulled out of Huntington. Early Sunday morning Gov. Geer and party were serenaded by a band, followed by nearly the whole population of Huntington. Mayor Ishophor introduced the governor, who delivered the earliest Sunday address in Oregon.

The delegation took breakfast at Huntington, after which Governor Geer extended the hospitality of the state of Oregon. A. C. Hardwick, of Butte, also responded in an appropriate manner, following which C. C. Hogue, grand master of Oregon, welcomed the delegation in the name of the A. O. U. W., and Mrs. Wilda Belknap, in name of the Degree of Honor, W. Varne Wilson of Michigan, and Mrs. Ella Manter, superior chief of honor of the United States and Canada, responded in behalf of the delegation.

At The Dalles, a large crowd of about 1000 people awaited the delegates to the Supreme Lodge, who arrived at 1 p. m. Mayor H. S. Rowe welcomed them in the name of the city of Portland, after which the guests immediately embarked on the Bailey Gatzert for Portland. When the steamer passed Vancouver the Portland fire bells were rung and whistles blown.

The party arrived at 8 o'clock Monday evening, when an informal reception was tendered at the Hotel Portland.

The convention of the supreme lodge A. O. U. W. will be held in the Hilbert Hall, corner Sixth and Washington streets.

Thursday: Daylight trip on the steamer Potter to Astoria. Steamer leaves at 7:30 a. m. and returns at 7 p. m.

Friday Evening: Memorial services in Taylor street church.

Saturday: Parade and celebration in the evening.
Monday, June 16th: Excursion down Willamette valley.
Lunch at Salem.

The lunch to be served to the Supreme and Superior lodges of the A. O. U. W. will be an affair that is intended to reflect credit not only on the members of this order, but to the City of Salem and Marion county in general.

The members of this order propose to serve this lunch through their own efforts, and now have committees out soliciting donations from their members only, and a cheerful and generous response is given by all as they have the pride to do this on a proper scale.
