WIPE OUT THE STAIN.

Among the victims of the Oregon penitentiary outbreak was a prisoner named Ingram. He had been sentenced for life. No fate more somber than this could fall to human lot. The man of ordinary instincts would choose death were it not that even in the breast of the felon there is ever a ray of hope. The man dreams, if not of forcing a way to freedom, of the chance of pardon. In the latter case he becomes tractable and often useful. When the prisoners in their rush past the guards began their work of death, Ingram sought to intervene, and his limb, and possibly his life, was the penalty. It may be that he was in such mood that the privilege of paying the penalty seemed sweet. Perhaps he thought to win the favor of the authorities. No matter what he thought, he performed an act that was essentially brave and generous. Such an act will go far to wipe out the stain upon his name. It cannot win him pardon, but it should win for his memory a kindly thought. It is customary for the prisoners to hate with a deadly hatred the men who, with loaded guns, stand guard over them. When one of the prisoners can bring himself to understand that these guards are but the necessary instruments of the law, and that they are performing a duty, such a prisoner has in him an element of sanity and good. The guards were there sworn to be faithful to their trusts. This life prisoner was not sworn to be faithful, and he had no trust, but he rose to the occasion, for the moment not a convict, but a man and a hero.

THE PHILIPPINE BILL.

The Philippine bill which has just passed the House is an excellent measure, but in the matter of the civil government of the islands the House entertains views widely at variance with those of the Senate, and when the house acts upon the measure just passed by the Senate after seven weeks of discussion, it is quite likely that there will be little left of the original. The bill provides for the continuance of the commission; leaves much to the discretion of the president and the commission; calls for a report from the commission, when the war is over, showing the number of inhabitants, the proportion of illiteracy, the capacity of the people for self-government, places safe restrictions on the granting of franchises to individuals and corporations; gives to the Philippines the greatest liberty consistent with prudence; and prepares the way for the development of the Philippines and the Philippine Islands. Pending the report of the commission relative to the census, the ability to govern themselves, etc., the commission is to establish local and provincial governments, placing Filipinos in charge as generally as advisable.

The House is not in favor of proceeding with so much caution, however, and it would fashion the law so that the Philip will be given much more rope, so to speak. Its bill outlines a broader scheme of representative government, and besides making provisions for the appointment of provincial governments, it includes a general legislature in its scheme, the upper house of which shall be composed largely of the commission, and the lower house to be elected by the natives. The law, when it does finally pass, is not to be considered as a final law for the Philippines, nor a final definition of the policy of the Republican administration. It is a step in the direction of permitting the Philippine to work out his own salvation, and with that object in view the best thing the House could do would be to approve the Senate bill. This it will hardly do, however, and we fear the debate over this subject is only in its infancy.

SOCIAL PULL IN ENGLAND.

Some of the charges made against the official personnel of the English army are most surprising. Nevertheless, these charges come from official sources, and must be regarded as based on facts, rather than prejudice. The allegation is made that young army officers are totally unfit for the responsibilities of their positions, and these easily may be believed. The recent campaigns against the Boers demonstrated the absolute lack of capacity on the part of certain subordinates. They did not understand the nature of war. It seemed to them that war should be a picnic, only a trace more strenuous than golf. They made on almost every occasion a display of their silly and expensive lack of practical sense. Nevertheless, it was believed that the social pressure able to get a place for incapables was exercised for the benefit of men of average intelligence and education. It did not seem reasonable that men deficient in these particulars could command the necessary pull. Nevertheless, the military committee reporting as to the condition of the army avers that some of the favorites not only do not possess any military

knowledge, but are lacking in elementary education, and are unable to make intelligible accounts of their own failures. It is here the surprise appears. In the army of the United States men are advanced from merit alone, and for an ignorant person to pass the required examination would be as impracticable for him to pass an examination for admission to the bar. Favoritism is always bad, but in England seems to have been worked to a superlative degree.

AS OTHERS SEE US.

The Seattle Post-Intelligencer has this of say of the election in Oregon, and the causes that led up to the defeat of Mr. Furnish. Its diagnosis of the case is so apt that we commend it to the thoughtful reflection of our readers: This evil influence in Oregon politics has been faithfully cultivated and reflected by the only metropolitan daily newspaper in the state, the Portland Oregonian. Maintaining a nominal Republican allegiance, it has defamed and defied the party when ever it desired to make men or unmake them. Witness the long and bitter fight against Mitchell who is now restored to favor. Witness the crusade against McBride while in the Senate. Witness the persecution of Gov. Geer, until his friends were driven to rebel. Witness the unrelenting war upon Simon, whom the Oregonian was largely instrumental in sending to the Senate. Witness most of all the reckless attacks on President McKinley that continued to the very day of his death.

Where all are taught that parties exist to reward or punish men according to their attitude toward you, where both men and parties are pursued vengeancefully day after day and month after month because they have not followed dictation, they feel themselves eventually absolved from party allegiance and entitled to their ownings. The result is political disorganization and factional supremacy. Thus the party becomes a secondary affair; and it may be used, as it has been used by one side in the past and used by the other side in this election, to get even.

It is most unhappy, but it is not wonderful that the voters could not be made to heed appeals to party loyalty this year in support of the head of the ticket. You cannot lash men, abuse them, brand the party itself because it has honored them, and carry this policy through three years and eleven months, and then turn around and heal all the breaches by proaching duty to the party for thirty days. That was the experiment in Oregon; and it led to the humiliation of a great party, as its punishment. The cost will not be too heavy if the Republicans of the state place a heavy heel upon the triumph of disorganization, but party above the individual and so place themselves in line with that Republicanism which not only wins its battles at the polls, but scores its mighty successes in the conduct of national policies.

MANY LAWS TO REPEAL.

The Ashland Tidings, State Printer Lee's paper, has the following editorial. Read it carefully:

"Both parties in the recent campaign declared in favor of the passing of a flat salary law by the next session of the legislature, and the members of the legislature and the state officers elected are practically pledged to such a law. All contemplated the passage of such a law at the regular session of the legislature, and the influences at work for a special session are not clearly defined. If a special session is called those identified with the movement contend that it necessarily will have to be convened some few weeks prior to the time of the regular session, that ample time may be given for the consideration of the important matters of legislation to be proposed. It will require several days to repeal the great many existing laws that operate in connection with the present fee system. It is estimated that there are more than a score of statutes regulating the fees of the secretary of state's department alone. It is thought the work proposed to be undertaken will consume the major part of 20 days, the maximum term allowed for special legislative sessions. Special legislative sessions, at best, are usually very expensive affairs for the taxpayers, and when one is proposed to be called so very near the date of the regular session there ought to be an extraordinary occasion to demand it. No such reason is known or announced and the people will scarcely favor a special session."

FAVORS FLAT SALARIES.

The Albany Democrat also makes the mistake of assuming the old legislature will be called on to act: It says: "The Democrat is in favor of flat salaries for the officials of the state of Oregon. It is in favor of making them large enough for the respectable support of the different officials. The governor of Oregon should receive \$4000 or \$5000, and the other officials less, but they should be flat salaries, without any perquisites and extra fees, which belong to the state. The fees should all go into the state treasury. The officers should receive a specified salary, and no more. It is very doubtful, though, whether there is such a demand for immediate change to justify the calling of an ex-

tra session of the state legislature, which would cost the state much more than would be saved in the decreased salaries, taken as a whole. The next legislature can attend to this. The present legislature has already been tried and found wanting. Let the next legislature attend to the matter promptly and efficiently."

DIRECT LEGISLATION.
(Astoria Daily News.)

The adoption of the initiative and referendum amendment to the state constitution was a grand step forward in popular government.

Legislation by representatives has grown to be a great evil. Powerful interests have learned how to corrupt legislators without detection. The popular will could always be thwarted by corruption in legislative bodies. The evil had become a festering sore. It had to be abated and popular government restored.

This amendment to the state constitution corrects that great evil. It gives the people a veto on all laws passed by the legislature and approved by the governor. This veto must be exercised, however, in sixty days after passage of the law. It also enables one-eighth of the legal voters, one-eighth of those voting at the last general election, to propose new laws for popular approval. This right, reserved to the people, is independent of the legislature. It must be exercised four months prior to a general election.

This amendment makes a great revolution in government. It enables the people to inaugurate promptly any great reform that could otherwise be defeated by adverse private interests. Among other laws, it will insure one prohibiting any fishing in the Columbia, except with gill nets.

There is no reform of greater importance to the entire State of Oregon and of Washington as well. It would stock this river with countless millions of fish, worth hundreds of millions of dollars—public property by the same title as the public lands. This would enable every gill net fisherman to make \$2000 a year. It would afford an overflow for discontented labor in the two states, prevent strikes and fill our borders with a dense population. It would entice the best and most active young men in every family to become fishermen.

This would make the Columbia a grand nursery of the finest seamen on earth. It would supply our navy with heroes. It is a matter of international importance. It requires, it is true, the co-operation of the State of Washington, which is a joint owner with Oregon in the salmon. But an aroused public sentiment could easily secure the co-operation of that state. Let us move along this line without delay. Let us educate public sentiment up to the vast values of this law.

NOT THE FORMER LEGISLATURE.

The Eugene Guard is in error also in assuming that the special session would be by the last general assembly. It says:

"The new legislature is pledged to adjust state salaries, and they will do it. More than that the new state officers-elect will accept these adjustments, and they will apply during their term of office. There is no assurance that the old legislature would touch this question at all, as they were not elected on that issue, and the state would be put to needless expense for nothing. Geer has a big joker up his sleeve, and the people will be wise if they let him keep it there."

STILL ATTACKING GEER.

The push newspapers are nothing but politics in the special session, and charge Geer with all sorts of things. The Eugene Register says it would be the old legislature that would act:

"Geer is now showing his hand in an effort to call a special session of the legislature that would cost the taxpayers at least \$25,000. He claims the principal object sought is to enact a flat salary law, but those who read between the lines can see plainly that the primary object with the governor is to put in force the initiative and referendum before the regular legislative meets, believing this would force the legislature to recognize his claims to the senatorship. His chief claim for the special session is to enact the flat salary law, but this proposition is the veriest farce. The new legislature is pledged to the flat salary system, the old was not. The old legislature is not under obligation to touch the salary system, and if called together there is no assurance that they would care to assume a responsibility that belongs exclusively to the new legislators. As to the initiative and referendum to make that the law of the state is a duty that also belongs exclusively to the legislature-elect."

In view of these facts what right has Geer to call a special session to pass on measures that fall within the province of the regular session. Do the taxpayers of Oregon want to plank down \$25,000 just to satisfy a whim of our disgruntled retiring governor. Because Geer's name went on the ticket by petition from three or four counties, it does not follow that he is really the choice of the people for that office. The petition was signed, no doubt, by Democrats, as well as Republicans. If the petitions had come up from every county in the state it would have been a fair test of the initiative."

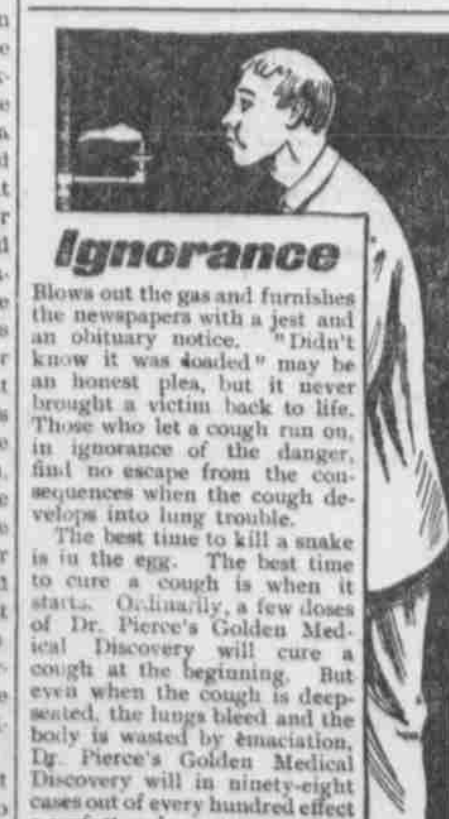

He asserts that an Oxford education is primarily intended to enable the young men acquiring it to enter the class of amateurs and idlers. He thinks that Mr. Rhodes would have done better to found scholarships for English youths to study in the United States, because there, in addition to class-room work, they would learn to feel ashamed to loaf around, or depend upon their fathers for positions.
