PETITIONS FOR SPECIAL SESSIONS.

Since Saturday hundreds of names have been signed to the petitions for a special session of the legislature to enact flat salaries and put direct legislation into effect.

The Journal went out Saturday with several thousand blank petitions, and this week will see greater results than the present week's work. The citizens who sign these petitions can say they did the proudest act of their lives, and one that will bear good fruit for all time.

New petitions are in from Woodlawn, Multnomah county; Eola, McCoy and Hickory, Polk county; Salem and Pratum, Marion county; Woods, Tillamook county; Astoria, Clatsop county.

The people who think at all in the line of good government reforms are heart and soul for the special session, and can see nothing personal in the matter, for or against Geer, or any other man.

Every state official, and every county and any other official and every member of the legislature who helps put our state government on a business footing will feel proud of it as long as he lives.

Those who have manfully stood by the flat salary reform from the beginning, and will stand by the fight to the finish, will be remembered by the people as public benefactors. Those who help prevent or delay this reform, promised in all party platforms, will regret it for life, as it is a practical matter of dollars and cents to the taxpayer.

THEY VISITED PORTLAND.

The Portland papers will please let up on crying down Marion county officers and posers and militia for not capturing the escaped convicts.

Latest reports are that Saturday night and Sunday night the Tracy-Merrill show was seen all over the suburbs of Portland, and held up a number of persons.

The wonderful Portland police department and still more wonderful sheriff's office and high priced detective system were not in business when they called.

The patronizing airs that have been put on by the municipal professionals over their country cousins did not enable them to get as close to the notorious bandits as their much-heralded country cousins of Marion county.

No one imagined that Tracy and Merrill would set foot in Multnomah county, without being ridden with bullets by such men as Chief McLaughlin or Holy Terror Cordano.

But such is life. It is easy to laugh at the other fellow when he falls. But Marion county officials are likely to have their laugh last.

A telegram from Chicago in this paper some days since stated that at a minister's banquet a minister took a stand for more liberal treatment of public amusements.

In justice to that church it should be stated that it has never officially relaxed its ban upon theater-going, card-playing and dancing, and the Chicago man spoke without authority.

The Pacific Christian Advocate prints the following explanation of the matter:

"Perhaps some of our readers have seen in the secular papers comment on a recent alleged discussion in our Chicago preachers' meeting concerning the amusement question in which a bishop and other prominent men took strong ground against our rule concerning dancing, the theater and the like. The whole thing is, as we supposed, the creation of a vivid reportorial imagination. There was no preachers' meeting, there was no discussion, and nothing was said by any bishop touching the amusement question. The papers have had their hysterics over nothing. There was a banquet of the Methodist union and some after-dinner speeches in which

each man said what he pleased. A layman deprecated the rule concerning amusements. Nobody replied to him, nor was controversy in order. The brother expressed his personal opinion and that was all there was of it. The ability displayed by the average reporter in finding more's nests, if expended in worthy pursuits would make our daily papers if less "spicy" more valuable for newspapers.

About the Special Session and Senatorship

Would Geer have called an extra session of the legislature to put state officials on a flat salary had he been the successful nominee, and the choice of the electors? Well, hardly!

An Idaho exchange talks about a "sweeping Republican victory" in Oregon. And yet it is a Democratic new broom that will purge the state house of the rubbish accumulated through eight years of unbroken Republican rule.

When Mr. Furnish was nominated in Portland last spring he promised to make a campaign that the Republican party would not be ashamed of. The impression has gotten out in this part of the country in the last few days, that the gentleman from Umatilla county didn't keep his promise.

(Cottage Grove Leader.)
The Eugene Register has begun to have fits already for fear Governor Geer is going to call an extra session of the legislature for the purpose of making a law placing all state officers on flat salaries. Evidently the Register man has been taught that party platforms were made to get in on, and not to fulfill.

(Woodburn Independent, Rep.)
What's to be gained in kicking at certain prominent Republicans because Furnish was defeated? What in the name of common sense was Furnish, poor fellow, put up for any way, if not to be knocked down? Multnomah politicians should have learned through experience long ago that a Republican nomination is not always equivalent to an election.

The Guard can see no reason why any one, especially a Salem man, should oppose a special session simply because that special session will be called to place state officials on flat salaries, according to the promises and platforms of both Republican and Democratic state conventions.

The "hurt" comes from another point of view, one very dear to Capital City hearts. A session of the legislature distributes no small sum among the people of Salem. There you have it. The "stand-in" with excessive official salaries, on whatever pretense they may be abstracted from the treasury, and on the other hand the good dollars that would be distributed among the Salem public.

A special session of the legislature would cost the state more than could possibly be saved in one session by any legislation cutting down salaries of state officers. The new legislature will save the state the cost of an extra session, and will also accomplish all that can reasonably be accomplished in reducing the cost of state government. The state cannot afford to donate \$25,000 toward Geer's aspirations to become United States senator.

(Oregon City Courier-Herald.)
Governor Geer is trying in a spectacular manner to close his term of office and is endeavoring to get public sentiment in favor of an extra session to place all state officers on flat salaries. The people are already in favor of this proposition, but the politicians seem to object. Governor-elect Chamberlain states his position as follows:

"I am in favor of flat salaries for state officers, and have advocated them during the campaign. I am also in favor of the special session for the purpose of enacting the salary law before the new officers begin their administrations. A special session would be necessary in order to make the law effective, for the salaries cannot be changed after a man has begun his term of office. Yes, I am in favor of putting the state printer on a flat salary also, and let him get the public printing done as I get mine done—at the usual union prices."

Politicians seem to want the state printing office left untouched, probably on account of the large campaign fund expected therefrom.

Geer's offer to call a special session is a roaring farce. He pretends to want a flat salary law enacted, in accordance with the platform of both parties, in order to save a few thousand dollars to the state out of the reduction in the salaries of the state officials. the public school fund. It was in Geer's power to break up that school ring, by hiring a clerk for \$100 to dig up all the lieu lands, and make them public. At the same time his board should have advanced the prices of school lands to \$2.50 an acre, at which the minimum price of \$1.25, at which the school board sold them. He would in this manner have put \$100,000 in the state school fund.

If Geer shall call that special session, the cost of which will equal the saving on salaries, it would be a good idea to have an investigation of the school land ring. It would be well to find out if there was any truth in the charge made against our honest governor, who is so anxious to save at the subject, while he ignores the waste at the bung.

So far as the initiative and referendum amendment is concerned, it needs no legislation to make it operative. The people can begin to legislate now, at once. The amendment is self-operative for direct legislation, and as a veto both on the legislature and the governor.

A special session would be a folly. It would not be a crime, however, if it unearthed those school land speculations, and traced the loot to the grafters.
