WORKMEN LAVISHLY RECEIVED

Salem Lodges Banquet Members Supreme Body

Magnificent Reception Tendered—The Speechmaking

Salem Workmen have the right to feel proud of the magnificent reception they tendered the members of the supreme lodge A. O. U. W. in this city today. The local fraters were deserving of the many complimentary words of praise showered upon them by the visitors, who declared that it was the grandest reception of the entire trip.

The excursion train consisted of 10 coaches and the party numbered 600. The train reached Salem shortly before 11 o'clock, having made a brief stop at Chemawa, where some splendid music was given by the school band. The supreme officers and members of the excursion party were met in Portland by S. A. McFadden and Frank L. Willman, as a special reception committee from the Salem lodges, and escorted to Salem. The general committee on reception and entertainment, to whom is due the credit for the immense success of the affair, consisted of G. Stolz, W. T. Rigdon, Mrs. M. L. Hamilton, Mrs. John Darr and Mrs. Kibbe.

The excursion was given from Portland under the personal supervision of R. L. Durham, of Portland, H. E. Lowinsbury, traveling freight agent of the Southern Pacific Company, accompanied the excursion party, and did all in his power to make the trip enjoyable.

The train was backed down to Commercial street, where the Salem Military band played an air, and the excursionists were escorted direct to Marion Square, where tables had been arranged, and a delicious lunch served. The finest of cake, large luscious strawberries, such as only Oregon can produce, cream of the richest quality, and delicious coffee, constituted the bill of fare. The visitors were served by a coterie of Salem's charming belles, and the service and banquet certainly left a favorable impression on the guests.

The feast finished, Frank Davey mounted an improvised platform and introduced Governor Geer, remarking the visitors could judge from the stature of Oregon's chief executive, "the kind of men our state is capable of producing."

Governor Geer, who is himself a Workman, extended a cordial welcome to the distinguished visitors, in a fraternal and also in a civic sense. Response was made by A. C. Harwick, supreme master Workman, of Buffalo, N. Y., who thanked the Salem Workmen for the beauty of the fraternal spirit evidenced, and the kindly hospitality with which they had been received.

Hon. Web McNeil, of Topeka, Kansas, who will on Tuesday be elected to succeed Supreme Master Harwick, was presented, and responded in a humorous vein, voicing the gratification of the party at the grandness of the reception, which he pronounced unequalled anywhere, and said no other lodge jurisdiction could "troit with Oregon in the matter of entertainment."

He also devoted some time to words of praise for the Workman lodge, as the greatest fraternal organization in existence. McNeil is the Populist legislator in the state of Kansas who came into great prominence a few years ago by the legislative fight he made against certain Kansas insurance companies. Fifteen years ago he was driving an ox team and transporting freight across the plains of Kansas.

Mrs. Ella H. Mantor, of Wolmar, Minnesota, supreme chief of honor of the Degree of Honor, responded to the address of welcome on behalf of the ladies, and gave assurance of a full appreciation of the gracious reception. Sam Booth, an aged singer, of California, sang a humorous selection, involving names and facts pertinent to the supreme lodge. The program of speech making concluded with some complimentary remarks directed particularly at the ladies by W. M. Sackett, supreme recorder.

C. R. Matson, of Illinois, supreme overseer, was the tallest man in the crowd. Matson was sheriff of Cook county, Illinois, in 1886, and officiated at the hanging of the four anarchists who figured in the Haymarket assassination.

The reception was a big success, and the visitors will carry with them fond recollections of Oregon, her beautiful flowers and scenery, matchless strawberries, unlimited resources and handsome women.

Now they rejoice over the election of candidates whose success they never doubted, and assume that the election of the man against whom they directed all their energies and misrepresentations does not cut any figure!

AN ASTORIA VIEW.

It was due, in fact and chiefly, to Republican dissatisfaction with the nomination of a man so lately a partisan Democrat. If Mr. Furnish had been a Webster or a Grant, the Republican masses would have willingly accepted his being put at the head of the party. Commanding talent would have excused the turning down of established party leaders. But Mr. Furnish had not any superior ability for the leadership. Every community has his equal in every respect, and the party's substantial men were offended at his being in the lead. This, and not Chamberlain's popularity, caused the defeat of a worthy man whose election would have been an object lesson for thousands of Democrats to join the G. O. P.

In selecting Mr. Furnish, it was thought his conservatism in quitting his party on a great vital issue would give him a prestige equal to superior talents of statesmanship.

The expectation was not well founded. Chamberlain's luck stood him in good stead. Yet the Republican masses feel that his election has not jeopardized any public interests.

Twenty-seven military prisoners confined at Fort Leavenworth, Kan., and Alcatraz Island, Cal., are to be released at once under the recent decision of the supreme court, which held that the trial of volunteers by courts-martial composed of regular army officers was illegal. Orders are now being prepared at the department commanding the release of 300 additional prisoners who are confined in the Philippines and Porto Rico.

Secretary Moody has furnished the Senate with a statement showing that the expenditures of the government on account of the naval operations in the Philippines from May 1, 1898, to the present date aggregate in round numbers \$20,000,000. The expenditures in November, 1899, were \$5,545,634; for 1900, \$5,512,000, and for 1901, \$6,335,000. The remainder of the \$20,000,000 is estimated for 1902.

ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING AT CITY HALL TONIGHT AT 8 O'CLOCK

The number of immigrants arriving in the United States during the first three months of 1902 was 137,480, of whom 116,481 entered at the port of New York. In April 73,667 immigrants were landed at the port of New York alone, and 82,054 during the month of May. The total immigration for the month of May therefore have reached the 100,000 mark.

The Senate will discuss the canal project this week. The Nicaragua route will have its advocates; the Panama route ditto, and there will be others to favor leaving the selection of a route to the president. Doubtless that overworked official would prefer to have Congress do its own legislating.

Governor-elect Chamberlain will be the fourth Democrat to occupy the gubernatorial chair this year in any Northern state. Colorado, Montana and Idaho are the only states north of Mason and Dixon's line which now have Democratic governors. Nevada has a silverite and populist occupant of the executive chair.

It is said that through an error in compilation the copy of the Bible for J. Pierpont Morgan recently paid \$50,000 does not contain this verse of the beatitudes: "Blessed are the meek; for they shall inherit the earth." This is understood to be the reason Mr. Morgan values the volume so highly.

It is a curious fact that Japan has no millionaires. There is not an inhabitant who would be classed as a rich man by the Americans. There are about 400 men in the kingdom whose wealth aggregate \$250,000. Japan has no paupers, nor any very wealthy men.

According to General Grant "war is hell." We doubt not that after reading the war office figures the British public concurs. The total British reduction of forces in South Africa since the war began is 97,477. This includes killed, wounded, prisoners, death from disease and men sent home as invalids.

The efforts of the striking miners are turned toward the White House at Washington. A new hope has arisen in the breasts of the men that the president of the United States, at the suggestion of the New York board of trade, may take up the task of attempting to bring the miner and mine owner together.

The British government bought nearly eight million dollars worth of American horses and mules and shipped them to South Africa from Charleston, Louisiana, during the progress of the Boer war. There are a good many mules left in this country, nevertheless.

FRATERNAL DEAD HONORED

Salem Lodges Decorate Graves and Unveil Monuments

Hon. J. D. Lee Delivers Workmen Memorial Address

The memory of Salem's fraternal dead was honored Sunday, when three Salem lodges—the Modern Woodmen of America, the Workmen of the World, and the Women of Woodcraft—conducted their annual Memorial day exercises, decorated the graves and erected monuments over the sepulchres of deceased members. The exercises were the largest attended in years and the services were probably the most impressive ever held by the local lodges.

Sunday morning the members of Oregon Cedar Camp, No. 5435, Modern Woodmen of America, assembled, and headed by the Modern Woodman band, marched to Rural cemetery, where the graves of two deceased members, viz: F. S. Dearborn, of this city, and Paul Klingele, of Glendale, were decorated. A memorial address was delivered by F. A. Turner, venerable consul, and the ritualistic service of the order was carried out.

In the afternoon a large gathering of Salem Camp No. 118, Workmen of the World, and Silver Bell Circle, No. 43, Workmen of the World, conducted memorial day services at the graves of deceased members in the Salem cemeteries. The procession marched to the cemetery, the Salem Military band, which played well, serving as an escort. After the custom of the order, monuments were erected over the graves of deceased members, and annual unveiling services are conducted in June. Monuments over the graves of E. E. Harritt and W. W. Stephens were unveiled yesterday, and the graves of the deceased members of the order were decorated, as follows: Geo. M. Beeler, Harry G. Kay, C. H. Simpson, Geo. T. Hallie, E. F. Parkhurst, R. G. Brown, J. R. Willard, Frank B. Ferrell, Ben L. Estes, T. H. Simpkins, Phil Grant, of Portland; and L. L. LaFore, of Turner, also Workmen, are buried at Salem. The memorial address was delivered by Hon. J. D. Lee.

The members of Silver Bell Circle No. 43, Women of Woodcraft, unveiled a monument over the grave of Mrs. E. E. Newman, and deposited flowers on the graves of other deceased members of the lodge, as follows: Mrs. M. N. Chapman, Mrs. A. D. Smith and Mrs. Lydia Wright. Mrs. Martha Henderson, also a member of the Salem Circle, is buried at McMinnville. The memorial poem was recited by Miss Minnie DeLong, and selections were given by a double quartet, consisting of Mesdames Dickey, Scoville, Hutchins and Toews and Messrs. Minton, Wiggins, Rozorth and Muellerhaupt.
