Two Good Musical Programs Presented Monday

The final program, consisting of the graduating exercises of the second annual commencement of the Northwest Normal College, was given at the First Baptist church. The presentation of the diplomas was made by Prof. A. J. Garland, president of the college, and the address to the class was delivered by Rev. H. L. Boardman, president of McMinville college.

Vocal solo—"Over the Ocean Blue," Petrie, Dr. Z. M. Parvin. Recitation—"Tom's Little Star," Miss Beatrice Short. Vocal solo—"Rejoice Greatly," Handel, Miss Della Osborn. Address to class—President H. L. Boardman, McMinville college. Presentation of diplomas—President A. J. Garland, N. W. N. C. Piano solo—"Valse Brillante," Moszkowski, Mrs. Jas. Batt. Monday's Recitals. The following review of the two recitals of the College of Music, given on Monday, was prepared by a spectator: The closing recitals of the N. W. N. College of Music, at 3 and 8 p. m. Monday, at the Baptist church, were entertainments reflecting credit on both teachers and students. The juniors, in the afternoon, both the singers and players, showed fine taste and expression, rendering their pieces in such manner as to receive the generous applause of the audience. Those taking part beside those who helped in the evening, were Dora Williams, little Florence Cunningham, Nellie Hoover, of Brooks; Ethel Burkholder, Minnie Conley, Miss Stockton, Jannette Booth. In the evening was the crowning entertainment of Dr. Parvin's work. Every number was highly appreciated by the large audience present. The program opened with the famous "William Tell" overture, with two pianos, given in fine tone and finish by Mr. Batt, Mrs. Brown, Mrs. Berger and Miss Draper. Miss Mary Payne played "The Bell of Chandon," by Sudds, in a charming manner. This was followed by a chorus, "Hope," by eight young ladies, which was sung in fine harmony and vocalization. Miss Kimsay, of Albany, played Leybach's difficult fantasia on the airs of La Sonnambula. The phrasing was good, bringing the melodies clearly through the maze of scales and chords. Miss Short, in "O. Light of Hope," by Donestri, sang in fine style, being called back, responding to an encore. Mr. Batt probably excelled any amateur performance ever heard in Salem, playing in a masterly manner Beethoven's great sonata, "Sonata Appassionata." He received an ovation from the audience, and responded by playing the "Witches Dance," "The Nightingale's Trill" was sung sweetly by Miss Nina Johnson. The execution of the trill and the runs were easily made. Misses Byars and Short sang a humorous duet, "Beware," that was much appreciated, and received a recall. The recitation, "Flying Jim's Last Leap," by Miss Schilbrede, was well delivered, making all feel the touching sentiment of the poem. Miss Longbottom, the only graduate this year, gave two pieces, "Allegro," from Beethoven's Sonata Pathetique, and "The Two Larks," by Leschetzky, demonstrating that the honors given were fittingly placed. Miss Della Osborn sang "Ernani Fly With Me," Verdi; the great aria from the opera Ernani. Her effort was highly artistic. Miss Byars sang "The Carol of the Lark," by Bartley. This was a fine effort, showing clearly a good prospect for future success. Dr. Parvin presented the diploma to Miss Longbottom, with some appropriate remarks, the program closing with the grand duo, "Norma Fantasia," arranged by Thalberg, given successfully by Miss Draper and Mr. Batt. After the exercises there were many congratulations offered on the success of the recital.
