CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS

Will Be Held in Salem on the Following Dates.

The U. S. civil service commission announces that an examination will be held for engineer, bureau of chemistry, in the department of agriculture, in Salem, on July 8th; for deck officers, coast and geodetic survey, July 8, 9, 10; for laboratory assistant, national bureau of standards, July 10; for assistant in road material laboratory, July 15, 1932.

Persons who desire to compete should at once apply to the U. S. civil service commission, Washington, D. C., or to Miss Zadee Palmer, at Salem postoffice, for application forms, which should be properly executed and filed with the commission at Washington, D. C.

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SHOT HIS WIFE.

Then Attempted Suicide by Taking Poison.

Vancouver, Wash., June 18.—James Hickey, of Fourth Plain, shot his wife yesterday afternoon at her home at Fourth Plain, and then attempted suicide by taking poison. Hickey, who separated from his wife some time ago, went to the house, and, entering the door, fired five shots from a pistol at his wife, at a distance of only a few feet, the shots taking effect in the woman's back. He then swallowed the contents of a vial containing poison. Neighbors were attracted by the shots, and were soon on the scene. The woman will die, but the man will live.
