Mammoth Assortment Fireworks for Fourth

Demonstration Will Be Record-Breaker

The crowning feature of Salem's Independence day celebration will probably be the mammoth pyrotechnic display scheduled for the evening. The fireworks will be discharged from a barge in the Willamette river, opposite the business district of the city, it being thought this arrangement will give all an opportunity to witness the exhibition, which will also be grander for being held on the river. Unique, showy, gorgeous, spectacular, wonderful and other similar adjectives will be required for a fitting description of this feature of Salem's celebration, for there is no use discussing the matter—the fireworks display will be the most complete and the grandest ever witnessed in these parts.

The general committee that is arranging for the celebration appropriated \$1000 for fireworks alone, and, under the direction of Chairman John Maurer, of the committee on that feature, that amount has been judiciously expended for a large assortment of explosives. There are bombs that boom, Dewey chasers that chase, rockets that pierce the heavens, etc., etc., in fact every kind of contrivance known to the ingenious mind or the enterprising mind of the manufacturer of Fourth of July goods, is represented in the assortment secured for Salem's celebration.

The fireworks demonstration will not be reserved entirely for the evening. There is in the outfit a quantity of Japanese day fireworks, that will be touched off during the street procession and exercises of the morning.

The main program of Salem's grand pyrotechnic display will include thirty numbers, besides about \$200 worth of other explosives. The bulk of the work of the committee on fireworks was assumed by John Maurer, who has been working faithfully to the end that this feature may be the most attractive one of the celebration, and much credit will be due him for the success of the display.

The initial number will be the discharge of six mammoth aerial maroons, which ascend from 500 to 600 feet into the air and explode with a report equal to that of an eighteen-pound cannon.

A grand opening exhibition device—Welcome—will be the second number. This is a set piece of wonderful beauty. It commences with an illumination of crimson and green, mutuating to the word "Welcome" in letters of variegated lancework, above which is an arch of brilliant colored jets and suns with golden rays, terminating with artillery salutes.

Another feature of the display will be the ascension of six 2-pound asteroid rockets, each releasing mammoth duration stars, suspended from parachutes. They float through the air for a long distance, and change colors several times before entirely disappearing.

The program will also include: Italian sunset, "Flag of America," calopoe or whistling rockets, salvo of Neapolitan shells, which discharge in mid air three different times, displaying alternate red, white and blue stars and gold rain; twinkling star rockets, exhibition device "The Grand Round," bombshell rockets, surprise boxes, willow tree rockets, exhibition device "Revolving Fan," trailing star rockets, two Picols mines, electric shower rockets, exhibition device "Triplet American Star," cornucopia rockets, emerald illumination, devil among the tailors, shooting star rockets, discharge of batteries, exhibition device, "Magic National Star," jeweled streamer rockets, Egyptian whirlwinds, burst of golden clouds, aerial flower garden, diamond chain rockets, prize comet rockets and grand finale exhibition device "Go Home." The concluding number, "Go Home," will prove a splendid and appropriate closing piece. It commences with a hexagonal vertical wheel, mutuating to the words "Go Home," in letters of crimson, azure, emerald and orange, the

Bids invited for Supplies for the Oregon State Penitentiary.

Sealed bids for dry goods, groceries, drugs, shoes, leather and findings, plumbing supplies, hardware, flour, fish, meats, etc., will be received at the office of the superintendent of the state penitentiary until Monday, July 7, 1902, at 3 o'clock p. m., at which time they will be opened.

A deposit of \$200 in cash or certified check, payable to the superintendent, must accompany each bid for meat, and \$75 for bids for flour and fish, all other bids must be accompanied by an amount equal to 10 per cent. of the amount bid.

The right is reserved to reject any and all bids, and to accept or reject any portion of a bid.

On each envelope should be inscribed the nature of the bid. Goods of Oregon manufacture or production will receive preference, other things being equal.

All goods and supplies must be delivered to the penitentiary. Schedules of the various lines of goods will be furnished upon application to the superintendent.

Vouchers will be issued for payment on the 1st of the month following completion of contract, and monthly on continuous contracts.

DEAF MUTE SCHOOL

Change in Management To Be Made

Several Oregon Men Are Being Considered

The fact has leaked out that the state board of education has decided to make a change in the management of the state deaf mute school. It will be several weeks before a new superintendent will be chosen, but that a change has been decided upon none of the state board will deny.

State Superintendent Ackerman has been corresponding with Eastern schools to find an expert, and several Oregon men's names are being considered. It is understood the position was offered to a very competent normal school man, but he declined as not in his line. An executive head will be chosen, who will be able to get along with the children and their parents, if such a thing is possible.

Governor Geer is understood to be making a stand for an Oregon man for superintendent. He says there are some competent men to be had, and sees no necessity of importing a man from another state. Superintendent Ackerman is willing to help appoint an Oregon man, and give him the preference if a competent man can be found, who will take it, but says at present there are no applicants before the board. Secretary Dunbar has no preference but wants efficiency to be considered first.

There are many people who will approve Governor Geer's idea that some good Oregonian will know better how to get along with these children and their wards and parents than any man who does not know how to deal with the conditions. It takes long residence to know the people of any community well enough to get along with them harmoniously, and it is not always possible then. The Journal believes some good man in Oregon can be found who will give the state better satisfaction than anyone brought into the state for the position.
