THE REASON FOR IT.

The Salem school board had good reasons for changing the present system of superintendence of the public schools. Prof. Yoder, who was principal of the "East Salem" schools, was also city superintendent, and was as paid extra for his work of superintendence.

He advised a meeting of conservative citizens that he could teach as principal, and also serve as city superintendent, and that no other kind of supervision was necessary. On that basis the conservatives put up Dr. Byrd, and made a campaign for him, hiring carriages, and getting out a large vote.

They did that as a measure of economy, on the strength of Prof. Yoder's statements, and they opposed Mr. Tuttle for school director, because they believed he would favor real city superintendence.

Now that the question of efficient superintendence has been raised by Prof. Yoder, let us see what the superintendent has announced to. If the figures of attendance at the different schools can be secured they will tell the story.

These figures would surprise the people, as they would show that principals getting \$70 a month have been putting in time for two years teaching a dozen or fifteen to twenty children in their respective rooms.

All efforts of citizens to change this systematic running down of the higher grade work in all the schools, but the East school, was rendered futile. All efforts to fill these rooms up was nullified.

"superintendence" all the children above the seventh grade would drop out of our public schools, except the East school, where nine grades are taught.

There may be enemies of the public schools who approve of this, with the purpose of next raising the cry that no principals are needed, and only primary grade teachers should be employed.

Now that is one of the reasons why the board of education decided to make a change in the superintendence, and it is certain that if the grades are rearranged, and the principals given 50 children each in their rooms, fewer teachers will be needed, and the saving will be more than the city superintendent's salary, and the schools will build up, instead of running down.

As the question has been raised, let all the facts of Prof. Yoder's superintendence come out, and let us see whether it is not possible to improve on the system.

WHO ARE FIGHTING A SPECIAL SESSION?

So far we have heard of but three persons who favor the idea of holding a special session of the legislature next spring—Col. E. Hofer, the promoter; T. T. Geer, the governor, and Geo. E. Chamberlain, the governor-elect. Col. Hofer, as usual, is after notoriety; the governor is after the United States senatorship, and the governor-elect is after a flat salary of \$5000.—Corvallis Gazette.

Eliminating the first alleged reason, it might be pertinently asked what advantage a special session would be to Governor Geer's campaign for the senatorship. Can any reason be given for these childish feelings, other than petty spite? Can no credit be given for a good motive on the part of a public officer by a certain class of our papers? Another up-valley paper declared the other day that an extra session was about to be called by "our disgruntled, retiring governor," but gave no reason why he should be called disgruntled, or why an extra session would be of any benefit to him, if it were. When a state convention so far ignores the popular will that some 7000 Republicans vote for a Democrat, why not be flat enough to declare that the convention made a flat mistake, and put the blame where it belongs, to-wit, on the shoulders of those who are now trying to unload it onto some of the party's most stalwart leaders, who were crucified by that act of stupidity on the 2d of April?

The Oregonian, which, when it cannot write anything against Governor Geer, will quote what it can find, copies the above statement that Governor-elect Chamberlain favors an extra session, because he wants a flat salary, and three days ago copied, with apparent approval, from the Gervais Star, a fling to the effect that if Governor Geer was to be his own successor he would not be found wanting an extra session to regulate state salaries.

But if Chamberlain is favoring an extra session because a flat salary would be to his benefit, why should not Geer want one for the same reason, if he was going to be his own successor? Gentlemen, can't you see that you are showing more spleen than good sense, and that you are not going to fool the people very much, nor very long by these exhibitions of inconsistent petulance?

Nothing pays in the long run better than fairness, and merely because you have some favorite for United States senator, who refused Governor Geer's public invitation to go on the ballot and let the people decide the senatorship at the polls, while the governor was willing to risk the whole matter with the people and as a result, has been nominated by them by an overwhelming vote, you cannot afford to go against the trend of events, for it will not succeed.

If the governor was the only man in the state who was not afraid to appeal to the popular judgment on the senatorship, give some good reason why he should not receive the reward. In the meantime, the people are quite likely to be found demanding an extra session, for many good reasons.

Has resigned Salem Pastorate

Henderson goes to South Bend, Washington, where he has accepted the pastorate of the First Congregational church. Rev. Angry Mobs Threat to Lynch

Vincennes, Ind., June 19.—Great excitement was occasioned early yesterday morning by the report that a mob was on its way to the jail to secure possession of William Edison, who has been in custody on the charge of assaulting 3-year-old Irma Prohl, June 1. For several days there has been talk of lynching among the irresponsible element, and it has only been through the efforts of cooler heads that the feeling against Edison has been kept in subjection. Yesterday those who were the most outspoken quoted down, and no further trouble was looked for, but at an early hour this morning a crowd of 50 or 75 men and boys assembled, but without apparent leadership.

Vincennes, Ind., June 19.—The lack of leadership is all that saved Wm. Edison from lynching this morning. It was 5 o'clock when the mob that had surrounded the jail all night dispersed. They had two street car rails with which to batter down the doors. The local militia are now guarding Edison.

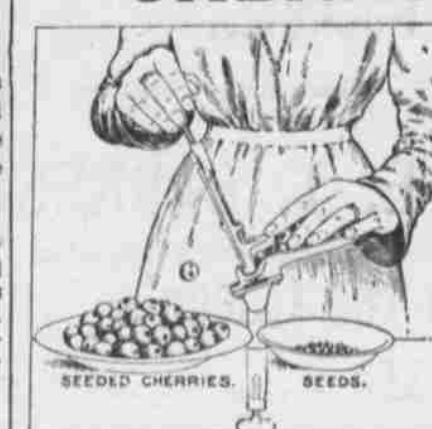
