INGRAM RECEIVES REWARD

Has Been Granted Full Pardon by Governor Geer

Brave Act in Aiding Unarmed Guards

As a reward for his model record as a prisoner, and the aid given the unarmed guards in the recent penitentiary outbreak, Frank S. Ingram was granted a full pardon by Governor Geer late Thursday afternoon. The news of his pardon was not conveyed to Ingram until this morning, and his joy was unbounded. While the pardon dates from yesterday, Ingram will probably remain at the penitentiary until he becomes stronger, and is able to be removed without fear of interrupting his recovery from the operation by which he lost one of his legs. He is improving nicely, and it is thought will be able to leave the institution in a few days.

Ingram was known as prisoner 2737, and the following history of his case appears on the prison record: Murder in second degree, from Linn county; for life. Committed March 22, 1892. Born in Oregon, was then 33 years old. Height 6 feet ¼-inch, weight 170; hair dark brown, eyes gray, complexion dark, shoes 10, single, no creed, reads and writes, by occupation a farmer.

Speaking of Ingram, Superintendent Lee this morning said:

"Since his incarceration, he has worked in the shops, and has learned the blacksmith trade. A very nice specimen of his handiwork may be seen in the governor's office. It is a paper weight, made in the form of an anvil. In fact it is a miniature anvil."

"He has been a model prisoner, industrious, attentive and diligent. His Linn county friends have been in the habit of calling and seeing him. Some have volunteered to assist him in getting a pardon. Quite a strong effort was made in his behalf at one time, but a part of his relatives took sides against him, and rendered work in his behalf very difficult."

"The killing of a brother is a terrible crime, even when there is the strongest justification for it. Ingram claims that it was to save his own life that he took his brother's. Whether he was fully justified is a question that will probably never be solved. We only know the action of the court and jury."

The pardon sets forth reasons for exercising executive clemency as follows, that: "during his ten years' of

Incarceration he has been a model prisoner, and for the further reason that during the recent outbreak in the penitentiary he risked his life in the defense of the unarmed guards, by which act of bravery he had the misfortune to lose one of his legs."

Many are acquainted with the heroic act of Ingram at the time of the escape of Tracy and Merrill. There is no question but the timely act of Ingram, the life of Frank Girod, another of the shop guards, was saved. After shooting Ferroli, the two convicts took after Girod. They were following him down a long corridor in the foundry building, and were rapidly gaining on him. Tracy, who was in the lead, had raised his deadly rifle to his shoulder, and in another instant would have sent a bullet crashing into the body of Girod, who was a splendid target, when Ingram sprang into the corridor, dislodged Tracy's rifle from its sure aim, and himself received, from Merrill's gun, a bullet in the knee that required the amputation of the injured limb. By this time Girod had reached a place of safety, and the murderous convicts transferred their deadly work to without the foundry building.
