EASTERN PEOPLE FAVORED

In Management of Deaf Mute Institute Oregon People Have Only the Obscure Positions

The proposition to select another Eastern man for superintendent of the Oregon deaf mute school is not meeting with favor, because there are several competent persons who have been taxpayers and citizens for many years, who are likely to give better satisfaction than some import.

This is no reflection on the candidates from the East, but is based on the proposition that persons who have lived here all their lives have a better practical knowledge of the needs of the children and their parents or guardians than some one who has just come to the state.

Administration by people direct from the East has not always proven successful. In some cases it has been a flat failure, and has caused the state officials humiliation and public scandal. Some of the Eastern people are all theory, and spindle out so thin and impractical that they can't stand the impact of Western conditions.

Governor Geer and Superintendent Ackerman will do a good thing to draw the line for some practical executive head of the deaf mute school who belongs to Oregon, and if they can agree on some man who has had practical experience with the school work, so much the better.

There is no objection to the employment of competent persons from other states in our state institutions, but certainly when Oregon people can be found who are just as competent, or more so, they should have consideration.

AMERICANISM A FAD.

Germans Affect a Preference for Yankee Music.

If the Kaiser intended Prince Henry's visit as an advertisement of Germany to the remarkable wave of Americanism that is now spreading over the country is realizing his desire. Unparalleled numbers of American tourists are registering at the leading hotels in all parts of the empire. In Berlin 97 per cent of the guests are Americans.

Every phase of German life is affected by the mania for things American. Troops parade to the music of Sousa marches; half the music played in the summer gardens is rag time; and at first-class vaudeville entertainments the most popular feature are the American tunes. The most fashionable sailor hat for girls is decorated with the German and American colors. Children wear miniatures of the emperor wreathed with the stars and stripes.

American jockeys continue to win, and Berlin is on the "qui vive" over the reported intention of J. Pierpont Morgan to visit the Kaiser.

CHRISTIAN SCIENTISTS.

Remarkable Cases Reported at Their Testimony Meeting.

Boston, Mass., June 20.—At the annual meeting of the mother church Tuesday, which taxed the capacity of Mechanics' hall to its utmost, a somewhat startling proposition was made in the motion offered by Edward A. Kimball, of Chicago, that the Christian Scientists pledge themselves as willing to pay any portion of \$20,000,000 to pay the expenses for the enlarging of the mother church to a seating capacity of 5000. This motion was ably seconded by Judge William G. Ewing, who stated that if his knowledge of arithmetic taught him anything it was about time that a church with nearly 75,000 members should have seating capacity for more than 800, the present status of the mother church. The motion was unanimously adopted by the 7000 members present.

Herman S. Hering, who a few years ago resigned his chair in Johns Hopkins University in order to practice Christian Science, was elected first reader of the mother church. Judge S. J. Hanna, who retires from this position, has held it for upwards of seven years. The report of the treasurer shows a balance of \$33,756 in the treasury, the expenditures for the last year amounting to more than \$88,000. William B. Johnson, who was re-elected clerk of the mother church, in his report today stated that 150 new churches had been organized during the past year, and that the branch churches had made a gain of nearly 8000 members. The feature of today's meeting was a loving message adopted by the members unanimously and telegraphed to the leader of the Christian Science movement, Rev. Mary Baker Eddy, of Concord, N. H.

The Christian Science testimony meeting this evening was opened by the retiring first reader, Judge Hanna, with an address of welcome to the vis-

itors and introduction of the gentleman newly elected to the office, Mr. Hering. After the usual opening exercises, the meeting was opened to the congregation for testimony and experiences. These were given in great profusion. A gentleman from the Pacific coast told of the healing of a case of violent insanity in one absent treatment, at a time when the combined efforts of her entire family were necessary to restrain the patient. This was followed by a similar case related by a Harvard student. A New England woman told of the healing of a woman who had been confined to her bed for 20 years. After three weeks' treatment she was able to walk out with her boy, who had almost grown to manhood, without ever having seen his mother walk. A gentleman in the gallery then told of his own healing of consumption, and the manner in which his voice penetrated to the remote corner of the vast hall proved unmistakably that he does not now suffer from weak lungs.

Selecting Prison Guards. The Pendleton East Oregonian: The fact of the matter is, a prison guard should be selected regardless of his political relations, strictly on his merit as a cool-headed, brave man and a dead shot with a revolver or rifle. This was a demonstrated fact at the recent session of the national prison congress in Kansas City. Wherever the system has obtained of making prison positions the spoils of office, there some tragedy like that at Salem has occurred.

Guards should be selected solely upon merit, proven, if need be, by actual demonstration in shooting straight, those failing to use shoot-straight irons effectively to be turned away, regardless by whom recommended or what ticket they voted at the previous election. A little reflection will convince anyone that penitentiaries should be placed upon a civil service basis along with other institutions, if the state is to be better served and the politicians less so.
