REVEREND ELIOT ON JAILS

Made Too Much a Pleasure House

Leniency to First Offenders Is Objected to

The theme of the Sunday morning sermon of Rev. W. G. Eliot, Jr., pastor of the Unitarian church, was: "Thoughts Suggested by the Outbreak from the Penitentiary."

In the course of his sermon he spoke substantially as follows: "Criminals, in all but exceptional cases, should be thought of as men like ourselves. Heredity is sometimes an adverse factor, sometimes the dominating factor. And so of what may be more generally termed environment or circumstances. But we err if we do not hold the criminal to be the victim of circumstances. To say that the criminal is purely the victim of circumstances is a false sentimentality. To say that he is to blame is genuine, a tribute to him. For to blame him is to hold him responsible, and to admit his responsibility is to admit all the ground there is for any hope of his betterment."

The speaker discussed the criminal class, and the agencies by which a reformation of the prison authorities is accomplished. Any one cure was insufficient. The solution of the problem required a leveling up all along the line, and the exercising of every influence bearing on the human soul.

"The fundamental idea as to the purpose of imprisonment is that it is for the protection of society. Protection of society is the primary purpose, and this must be compassed at any cost. The prison is not for vengeance upon the prisoner. Some men are so wicked that society could never get even if it tried. Nor is it primarily for justice to the criminal. It is primarily for justice to society."

"The indeterminate sentence" (under which a prisoner is kept so long as in the judgment of the prison authorities to let him go, and let go as soon after the minimum of time served as is deemed safe) is at once most just to society and to the prisoner himself."

A rogue by nature, a man's roguery is multiplied by education. In 1850 there was one man in incarceration to every 3442 of population; in 1890 the proportion was one to every 1000 of the population. First education is not a cause of crime, and secondly, it is not a cure for crime. Back of education there must be the fortifying and edifying influence of the church.

"It is a kindness to the prisoner and a prudence and economy for society, if every wise and sensible means is employed to better the prisoner's moral nature, and more nearly fit him for citizenship."

There is no one cause of crime, and no one cure. It is a problem of infinite complexity.

There must be greater convictions in religious morals, since happiness and social welfare depend on virtue. The competitive system has been held to be solely responsible for criminal classes. Crimes due to cupidity, however, can never be avoided by a mere change of the economic system.

Criminals should be treated as men; the jail and penitentiary should be considered a social necessity, not an instrument of public vengeance. A prison, if it is to do justice to society, should be conducted upon the principle of indeterminate sentences. In justice to society, criminals should not be released until they deserve freedom. The causes of crime are many, but crime is largely a question of opportunity, heredity, environment. The environment of the reform school and the penitentiary is not good. The jail, which is often nothing more than a county club house for the criminal class, is one of the causes of crime. There should be more like houses of correction. There should be removed from the county jail the privileges of collusion, social life, conspiracy and criminal education of and among the criminal class.

The customary practice in the courts of granting leniency upon conviction for the first offense was severely criticized and pronounced a weakness. Rather than the first offense it was probably the thousandth one, but the first time the culprit had been caught. The first conviction should be punished with a severity that would have a permanent moral effect. Men are not punished out of justice to the criminal, but in justice to society.

BURNED TO THE GROUND

"Half-Way House" and Adjoining Residence Destroyed

Tenants Lose House Effects With No Insurance

The celebrated and semi-notorious resort, the "Half-Way House," and an adjoining residence, on North Liberty street, were entirely destroyed by fire at 5 o'clock this morning.

The "Half-Way" house was the property of Felix Lafranche, who estimated its value at \$3000. The building and furniture, which are a complete loss, were insured for \$1000 with the Sun Insurance Company. Frank Osburn, who lived in the building and conducted the resort, lost practically all of his household goods, upon which he had no insurance.

The fine residence, just north of the "Half-Way House," that was also destroyed, was the property of Circuit Judge R. P. Boise, who places his loss at \$1000. Mr. Boise had the building insured for \$650 with the Lower Columbia Fire Relief Association.

The Boise residence was occupied by C. L. Smith and family, recent arrivals from Iowa. Mr. Smith is employed on the construction force of the Salem Light, Power & Traction Company. He was successful in saving the bulk of his effects, but most of the clothing of the family, particularly the wearing apparel of four young children were entirely destroyed. Contributions of clothing in this relation would be thankfully received. Mr. Smith had no insurance on his goods, and his loss is severe. He is said to be an honorable and industrious man, deserving of the assistance of charitable people.

Origin of the Fire Unsolved.

The fire was first discovered about 5 o'clock, and the inmates fled in haste. It was in ashes. Mr. Osburn, the tenant, says there had been no fire in the building since Friday noon. Mr. Lafranche believes that the fire started from a lighted cigar outside of the city limits. The city's fire whistle did its duty, but the fire was too far advanced when it reached the city.

Some censure was made of the fire department for not attending the fire.
