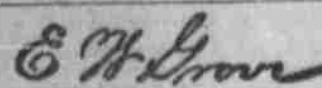

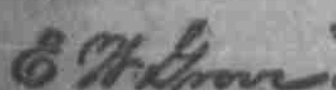

NOW FOR THE FOURTH

**Goddess of Liberty Contest
Has Opened**

**High Class Attractions Se-
cured for the Day**

Based on actual conditions, such as available finances and the complete absence in detail of every attraction and feature that has been secured, the prediction may be made that the Salem celebration this year will be a "bummer." Practically everything is well in hand, and the outlook for a big celebration is very bright.

The committee on outside attractions reported that contracts had been closed with Prof. William McClelland, the celebrated aeronaut; the Trask sisters, in cakewalk and dances; Prof. Vaughn's troupe of colored jubilee singers and campmeeting shouters. Prof. J. J. Christian, in his electric skating act on a high pedestal, will be one of the leading features. For the last few weeks his was a feature act at the Orpheum theatre, of San Francisco. This act is the only one of its kind in the country. Watt Ship will also be seen in his terrific bicycle ride on rollers, the same as produced at the "Elks" hall.

C. L. McNary, of the committee on street sports, said a program of seven events would be duplicated on two of the principal streets of the city during the afternoon. Suitable prizes will be offered by the Salem merchants for these events.

Among the street sports will be races of all sorts for the younger generation. These will include slow bicycle race, cracker eating contest, egg and spoon race, three-legged race, sack race, potato race.

All boys wishing to enter the Fourth of July races should call on C. L. McNary or Patton Bros.

C. H. Hinges, of the transportation committee, reported that a river steamboat excursion would be operated all day between this city and Independence.

From the committee on floats, Dr. M. S. Skiff reported that many of the business houses had been consulted, and wanted to be represented in the street procession.

F. E. DePaege, chairman of the committee on window decorations, said a partial canvass had been made of the business houses, and indications were very favorable for the more general decorating of places of business than ever before.

Verbal reports were received from various other committees, all indicating good progress in the work. The committees are all actively at work, and are leaving nothing that will add to the success of the Salem celebration.

The contest for Goddess of Liberty is now on. There are already three candidates in the contest, which promises to be a most exciting one. The candidates are Miss Jeanette Brown, Miss Mollie Bernard and Miss Maud Morrison. Other names will probably be introduced into the contest, which will close at 9 p. m., Monday, July 1. The general committee has appropriated \$40 for the successful candidate, with which to appropriately costume herself for the occasion. Ballots sell for 5 cents each, and electors should call at the polls and vote several times. A committee, consisting of C. H. Hinges, H. D. Patton and C. L. McNary, to canvass the vote daily and cause the result to be published from day to day until the contest closes.

CLIMATE CROP REPORT

**Weekly Bulletin by the Ore-
gon Weather Bureau**

Portland, Or., June 24, 1902.
The past week has been dry; its first days were unseasonably cool and light frosts occurred in many sections of the state. The frosts did no harm to the staple crops, but some tender garden truck was slightly injured by them. During the middle of the week it was unseasonably warm, especially in the western half of the state, and the soil dried out rapidly.

Correspondents generally report that while the weather made rapid advancement, and have not yet been injured by the drouth, more rain is needed, and the indications are that the showers in the Willamette valley, which began Monday, (after most of the correspondents had mailed their reports), will spread to the eastern sections of the state by Tuesday, and be of great benefit to spring grain and all late crops.

The maximum, or day temperature during the week in Western Oregon ranged between 62 and 88 degrees, and the minimum, or night temperatures, between 42 and 70 degrees. In Eastern Oregon the maximum temperatures ranged between 58 and 83 degrees, and the minimum temperature between 36 and 70 degrees, and the week, as a whole, while the warmest one of the season, was not sufficiently hot to injure wheat.

Pull wheat continues filling nicely, and the bulk of the crop is now too far advanced to be injured by hot winds. Spring-sown grain is making excellent progress. The grain injury is reported as having done some injury to fall wheat in portions of Linn county, but all crops, so far, this year, have been unusually free from insect pests. Oats are heading rather short in some sections of the Willamette valley. Barley is beginning to ripen and turn yellow.

The first crop of alfalfa has been harvested, and the second crop is growing nicely. A large amount of clover was cut and safely cured during the week. Pastures and range grasses are drying up, but the condi-

tion of stock is excellent. Corn, hops, potatoes, onions, gardens and sugar beets continue doing well.
The weather has been favorable for fruit of all kinds, and the only complaints this week are from Douglas county, where it is reported that peaches are dropping badly. Strawberry shipments from Hood River have nearly ended.
