**CHAMPOEG
SHOOTING
AFFAIR****John F. Markley Fatally
Wounds Former Partner.****John D. Fain Receives Con-
tents of Shot Gun.**

At 6 o'clock this morning, John F. Markley shot and probably fatally wounded his former business partner, John D. Fain, at Champeog, in the north of Marion county. The sheriff's office was notified of the probable murder, and Deputy Sheriff Colbath left for the scene of the shooting.

There are probably two sides to the trouble, but only one version was received with the first news of the shooting. Fain, who was shot, claims that no trouble existed between himself and Markley. He reports that he went to the barn at the rear of the store, which is located just west of the town of Champeog, to attend to his stock at the usual hour this morning. When he had completed the work he started for the store building, and as he left the stable, he says Markley, armed with a shotgun, came out of the back door of the store and waited until he (Fain) was but a few yards distant, when he raised the firearm and deliberately discharged the weapon, the contents lodging in Fain's stomach. Fain's partner says he is to the effect that Fain is dangerously wounded, and will probably not recover. Fain is 39 years of age, while Markley is 69 years old. Fain further alleges that not one word passed between himself and Markley this morning, and that the latter deliberately shot him without a word of warning or of explanation.

The men were formerly engaged in the general merchandise business at Champeog, but it is understood that the partnership was dissolved last spring. Markley continuing the business, and it is supposed the trouble that culminated in today's shooting was probably the result of a conflict over business affairs.

Wound Proved Fatal.
Fain died about 10 o'clock, four hours after the shooting took place. He has no relatives on the coast, his kinship residing in Missouri. He has resided at Champeog about 15 years, where he was engaged in business with Markley ago, and when the stock was disposed of to A. Jette, the Champeog merchant. It was over a settlement of the partnership that the shooting resulted.

Markley Arrested.
Markley, who is a single man, was taken into custody by Deputy Sheriff Colbath, who started for this city. He had not arrived with his prisoner when this report closed.

Coroner Lane Goes to Champeog.
Coroner Lane has gone to Champeog, and will probably hold an inquest over the remains of Fain.

F. Markley was brought to Salem by Sheriff Colbath about 3 o'clock this afternoon, and a Journal reporter talked with the prisoner in the county jail. Mr. Markley says he was sleeping in his store, as usual, and that morning about 5 o'clock, he was aroused by the report of a gun. He says he dressed at once, and as he went out of the store he met Mr. Jette, who remarked to him: "Why did you shoot Fain?" who was the first that Markley knew of what happened. He says that he had not seen Fain since the night before, when he passed the store without speaking to him. They were partners for years, but dissolved about a year ago, since which time they have not been intimate, and he says that Fain has not spoken to him for a month. He attributed this to the fact that Fain was in poor health and irritable. Markley says that Fain was a good man and not quarrelsome, and has no idea who could have done the shooting, unless it was some one intent upon robbing him, as he had recently sold one and had considerable money. He says that Fain is not a bad man, and seemed surprised at the state of affairs. Fain was carried into the house where he lived, by Jette and his sons, and Markley didn't go to see him, for the reason that Jette immediately accused him of the shooting. Markley says Fain is about 40 years of age, that his father lived in California, and that he was a bachelor, and lived together for years. They had lately differed, but had had no trouble. Mr. Markley brought Fain up with him, money he had in the store. He seems composed under all the circumstances, but says he would like an examination as soon as possible. He sent for his attorney, Mr. J. A. Carson, and is now consulting with him.

Markley stated that Fain had lately been in the habit of shooting rabbits to eat, and that he shot a gopher the other day. When asked whether he thought the gunshot sounded like a rifle or a shotgun, he said he could not tell, for the reason that he was in the closed store, and the sound was necessarily muffled.

DIED.
GORMAN.—In Salem, Oregon, June 22, 1902, Thomas Gorman, aged 71 years.

Deceased was a native of Donegal, Ireland, coming to Salem in 1878. After ten years' residence here he removed with his family to Portland, where two years later he received injury to his head, by being thrown from a cartage, and from which he never entirely recovered. He is survived by three children, viz: John W. Gorman, Mrs. Robert Pfeil and Mrs. Elizabeth Kennedy, of Millan, Idaho.

Funeral services were held at the Catholic church this morning, and burial took place in the Catholic cemetery.

**EDWARD
HIRSCH
INDORSED****For Second Term As Salem's
Postmaster****Re-Appointment Recommended
By Tongue and Mitchell**

The reappointment of Edward Hirsch as postmaster at Salem has been recommended to President Roosevelt by Oregon's congressional delegation. The news is contained in the following dispatch:

Representative Tongue, with the concurrence of Senator Mitchell has recommended the reappointment of Edward Hirsch as postmaster at Salem. During his past term Hirsch's record has been exceptionally satisfactory to the department. He was inducted for appointment by all members of the supreme court, most of the leading business men of Salem, the chairman of the Republican state committee, numerous members of the legislature and by the state and county officers and prominent patrons of the office. His reappointment will doubtless be made in time for confirmation before adjournment.

Mr. Hirsch took charge of the Salem postoffice on August 15, 1898, succeeding Judge B. F. Bonham, and has served his first term in a most satisfactory manner. He was kept busy today receiving the congratulations of his many friends upon his reappointment, which is reasonably certain.

The first intimation Postmaster Hirsch received of his endorsement for a second term by the delegation at Washington, was when a Journal reporter called his attention to the above dispatch. In event of his very probable reappointment, Mr. Hirsch does not contemplate any changes in the office. Deputy Postmaster R. H. Raymond will be retained at the salary of \$1200 per year.

The balance of the clerical force is governed by the civil service.

Fine Sample of Flax.
R. L. Swartz today brought to The Journal office a sample of flax from his 70-acre field, which he is raising for Mr. Borne, at \$10 an acre. The stalks are 42 inches tall, and just beginning to head out. It is liable to grow about a foot taller before maturity, which will certainly make a superior fibre.

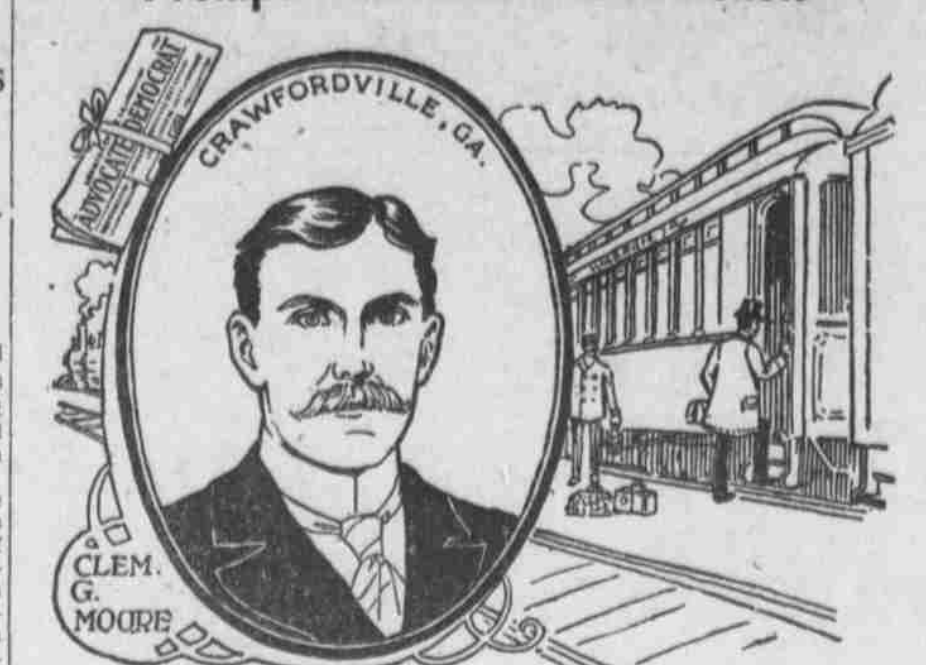
Salt Lake, June 25.—Mercur, one of the richest mining towns in Utah, is burning. The main street is entirely wiped out. The fire is spreading.
