ENGLISH INSURANCE.

English insurance companies are hard hit by the failure of the corporation to take place—probably \$5,000,000. In April last insured the corporation for 12 to 15 percent, but a week ago the rate had gone down to 5 percent. What kind of people are they over there—what must be the public sentiment that is causing the company to change its mind?

Another curiosity about English insurance companies is that anyone may insure the life of another, without his consent or without existing relationship. Should the king die the life insurance companies would lose probably \$20,000,000 of this kind of insurance. The king himself carries the enormous sum of \$2,000,000 in insurance. In this country no policy will be issued on life, unless it be shown that the insurer has an insurable interest, as to a wife, husband, father, son or daughter.
