WANT BIGGER REWARD

For Capture of the Escaped Convicts

Eola, June 26th.

Ed. Journal: The people in this community believe that a reward should have been offered of not less than \$500 each for the capture of the murderous convicts, Tracy and Merrill, by the governor when he first learned of their dastardly deeds and escape, and would now, I believe, approve a reward of \$10,000 each. The opinion has been freely and frequently expressed that the reward first offered and approved by the governor was a disgrace to the fair name of our state, and that it is still not enough. The reward should be large enough to not only arouse the interest and desire of criminal detectives in all parts of the world, and keep them on the alert for years, if necessary, to capture these desperate men, but also to induce them to take desperate chances to accomplish this object.

CONVICT HUNTERS RETURN

Think the Escaped Murderers Will Be Taken

Bloodhounds Not Much Better Than Fox Chasers

Captain Walter Lyon and Deputy Sheriff Skipton have returned from several weeks spent with the posse in pursuit of Tracy and Merrill, and both express themselves as being confident that the escaped murderers will yet be taken.

Captain Lyon says the men will soon be located and as there have been rains the dogs can track them better and they will be brought to bay. He expressed the opinion that the alleged Cuban bloodhounds were in reality not much better than ordinary good fox hounds, that can follow a trail just as well.

Deputy Skipton talks. J. L. Skipton says there is no question but that Tracy and Merrill are in the vicinity of Castle Rock, Washington. The fugitives, at every point they visited, left some article by which their course was traced from the time they crossed the Columbia. The convicts are now in a wild and unsettled country, and Mr. Skipton thinks their capture, under present conditions, can only be accomplished by accident. The roads, bridges, rivers and every possible avenue of escape from one place to another has been carefully guarded, but with their nerve and the good luck that has attended every move, the escapees have avoided detection. The people of Cowlitz county have shown a marked indifference in assisting to run to earth the murderers, but, in explanation of the feeling, Mr. Skipton says the citizens do not fear Tracy and Merrill nearly as much as they do the gang of ex-convicts and criminals with which the district is infested, where the convicts are supposed to be in hiding. It is generally believed that the ex-convicts who are at Castle Rock either have direct communication with Tracy and Merrill, or have means of notifying them of the progress and plans of their pursuers. At any rate, their presence has the effect of terrorizing the community, and discouraging the citizens from an active participation in the search for the men.

Outlaws at Silver Lake

Portland, June 27.—The convicts are known to be in the vicinity of Silver Lake, Cowlitz county, Washington. The posse left Portland today to attempt to find the trail again.

Let the people of Oregon contrast the views of these crimes in the states wherein they were committed, compare rewards, and then think where our state stands in comparison of reward.

Fellow citizens, it is a duty we owe to ourselves, to society, to the management of the penitentiary, and the widows and orphans of the deceased guards, that we do all in our power to bring the escaped convicts to justice, and if we fail to force the reward to a just and liberal amount we will fail to do our duty. Pioneer Physician Dead.
Dr. J. C. Shelton, the venerable and pioneer physician of Salem, died this morning at 6 o'clock, after an illness of two months. Dr. Shelton has been confined to the home with paralysis for twenty years, and for the past two months has been attended by his brother, J. W. Shelton, of Rutledge, Sherman county. He has been a long and patient sufferer at his home on Marion square, and death has come as a release in his case. He has resided at Salem for 35 years, and was once one of the most successful practitioners of the regular school. His wife died about six years ago, and he is survived by a daughter, Miss Beatrice Shelton, the music teacher of this city, and Roscoe Shelton, of the Capital Milling Co. The funeral will be held from the residence on Sunday at 2 p. m. Deceased was a member of the Christian church.

HOOD RIVER BERRIES.

Records of Shipments Broken the Past Week.

The last week's Glacier says: The record for strawberry shipments from Hood River was broken Monday night, when six carloads and 500 crates by express went out. The yield of berries is more than was anticipated by the most sanguine. The fruit is of the best quality. Tuesday evening about six carloads were sent out, besides a number of crates for local points. At about 7 o'clock Tuesday evening the stream of wagons loaded with berries on their way to the shipping agencies at the railroad station got blocked on Third street, when sixteen wagons were counted between State and River streets. By another year, when the acreage of strawberries will be doubled, better facilities for delivery at the station and loading of cars will be needed. The railroad company will need to extend the side track and give the union at least 200 feet of covered platform.

The union had shipped 10,562 crates up to Wednesday morning. Monday it shipped 2306 crates, nearly all sold on track, the largest shipment ever made by any shipping concern in Hood River.

The large force of men employed in receiving and shipping the berries at the Davidson Fruit Co. and Hood River union were tired out Monday night and thankful when the last wagon load of berries was disposed of.

Among the heaviest shippers among the growers, and who are now shipping over 100 crates a day, are Axtel Rahm, C. Vaughn, Geo. L. Bikel, D. E. Miller, O. W. Butts, Burns Jones and D. E. Miller each picked 152 crates on Monday. They were picked on the O. W. Butts place on Monday 302 crates.

G. J. Gessling, secretary of the Hood River union, estimates that one-third of the berry crop has been gathered. Lower White Salmon has gathered about two-thirds of its crop. J. W. Morton, at Riverside farm, Hood River, is about done picking.

The managers of the Davidson Fruit Co. and the union are both emphatic in declaring that the reputation Hood River has gained for good quality in strawberries is at stake this year. Some few—and we are glad to say only a few—growers have to be watched, that is, their crates must be inspected, and the shipping agencies are not timid about making the inspection. The crates are easily opened, and sometimes have to be packed over and culls thrown out. Sometimes the boxes are found to be not more than half filled. If any dishonest grower thinks he can fool the shipping agencies by giving short weight or by putting in culls, he will find out his mistake when his returns come. All berries packed must come up to the standard in weight and facing, or topping out of box. The men who are buying carloads on track have representatives here and they are rejecting all poor packs, and such poor packs will have to be dumped on some market for what they may bring.

BIG WOOL SALES.

Eastern Oregon Wool Growers' Association Transfer of Umatilla Filices.

(East-Oregonian.)

On Monday 226,000 pounds of wool changed hands in Pendleton at the sealed bid sale of the Eastern Oregon Wool Growers' Association.

The J. E. Smith clip was the largest lot sold. It consisted of 150,100 pounds and brought 12 cents.

The next largest lot consisted of the Chapman, Nelson Guilford Bros. and Mathews clips. The Chapman lot of 38 sacks sold for 11½ cents; Nelson clip, 37 sacks, 11¼ cents; Guilford Bros., 147 sacks, 11½ cents; Mathews clip, 82 sacks, 12½ cents.

R. W. Brigham purchased the Edwards, Salisbury, Smith & Gibson clips. The Edwards clip consisted of 61 sacks and sold for 12¼ cents; the Salisbury lot of 30 sacks sold for 11½ cents; the Smith & Gibson clips of 28 sacks sold for 11 cents.

Chas. Green bought the Rust, Caldwell, Stanton Bros. & Walton clips. The Rust clip consisted of 30 sacks and sold for 11½ cents; the Caldwell Bros. of 18 sacks, sold for 11½ cents; Stanton Bros. & Walton clips of 54 sacks, sold for 10½ cents each.

The Cooper and Wyatt clip, consisting of 57 sacks brought 11½ cents.

Several growers refused to accept the prices offered at sealed bids, thinking they could do better by holding or selling at private sale. These were the Campbell clip of 250 sacks, the Rook clip of 34 sacks, the Rugg clip of 190 sacks, the Doherty clip of 170, and the Walcup clip of 29 sacks.

All of the wool sold was exceptionally good, and especially were some of the clips sought after by the buyers.

Those who refused to sell at the prices bid are perhaps justified in doing so, as the markets are strong, and the indications are that there will be no drop, and is a possibility of being a raise.

These sales cleaned out the larger bulk of the wool in Umatilla county. Careful estimates give the amount already sold in the county at 1,000,000 pounds, and that will only leave something like 500,000 pounds, as the total clip will not exceed a million and a half pounds.

To take it as a whole, the quality of the clip for this year has been above the average, and not only are the growers pleased with the prices they are receiving, but the buyers are pleased with the quality.
