ALLOWING CRIMINALS TO ESCAPE.

Tacoma Ledger. The authorities both of Oregon and Washington have failed in the case of Tracy and Merrill to make any record that excites admiration. They have not shown speed, address nor courage. At this writing the criminals are still at large. There seems to be no immediate prospect of their capture. They have not been seen since they escaped from the state prison. To be sure, they have a certain advantage in the fact that they are desperate, that they would have no compunction in taking human life. There are many men who would be glad to learn that the fugitives had been captured or killed, but who would not be in the doing of this. Such men, however, have no right to be officiating as sheriffs or to attach themselves to a police force.

There are criminals who work in secret, who keep their identity hidden. The primary difficulty in getting them is to learn who they are and where they are. Tracy and Merrill are known and their whereabouts has never been involved in mystery. They have been seen repeatedly. There is a rumor that a brother of one of them is on his way to join them, probably a false rumor and yet one that might be true. No wonderful astuteness would have been required in keeping an eye on this brother, and to have been in the vicinity to learn the plan of escape. It is useless, however, to form a cordon around men if the cordon is to melt from any spot the men approach.

It is vain to disguise the fact that when these convicts get away from the penitentiary by shooting four men, three of them, guards, being murdered, they are enabled to do so through mismanagement. Possibly there was no way in which they could have been prevented from getting away, but ordinary alertness would have shot them down before they had butchered all who happened to stand in their way. From that time to the present the felons have had the upper hand. They seem to be playing with the representatives of the law, and to throw them off the scent as easily as they huff the hounds. If there had been a single credible incident in the whole procedure, it was the interference by the life convict, and the pardoning of the wounded man by the governor.

That Tracy and Merrill will never be apprehended does not seem possible. Some day they will meet a person as ready as themselves for strenuous work. It is not to be supposed that they can live in the manner of wild beasts for more than a brief period. That they should have been permitted to continue this method so long as they have is a circumstance reflecting no credit on anybody concerned.

STATE PRESS OPINION. (The Dallas Times-Mountaineer.) Gov. Geer says he thinks the reasons for an extra session outweigh those against it. For once the governor is right. A special session does much to lessen the burdens of the taxpayers.

(Coast Mail, Marshfield.) When Governor Geer talked of calling an extra session of the legislature to set a flat salary law, all state officials on salaries and thereby saving the state at least \$50,000 a year the Portland politicians all raised their hands in holy horror. Now they see a hope of getting an appropriation for the Lewis and Clark expo, they are falling over each other in hasty expressions of approval.

(Medford Inquirer.) The very fact of the Oregonian's hysterical opposition to the calling of an extra session of the legislature is conclusive evidence that Governor Geer should call it in the interest of the people. The Oregonian has fallen so low in the estimation of the people that they now believe just the opposite from that the Oregonian advocates. The Oregonian occupied a position to do much for the people, but by its many dishonorable and domineering practices it has ceased to have influence, and paved the way for the establishment of a creditable morning daily in Portland before the 1905 fair.

The Criminal Class. Portland, June 23. Ed. Journal: I notice that one of the ministers of your city, for whom I entertain high respect, had for his subject last Sunday, the "Criminal Class." I know it is a common practice with speakers and writers to refer to criminals as a "class," but the designation always seemed to me inaccurate and misleading. It seemed to imply that we had only two classes of men in the moral world—the good and the bad—the honest and the criminal.

als. If we mean by the "criminal class," those only who have been convicted of crime in a court, that may do, but I do not think it is generally so understood. Men may be classified as to their integrity or moral standing. The difficulty in making such a classification lies in the consideration that taking men as we find them, there is probably not one who is wholly good, nor is there one who is wholly bad. Some, it is true, have more good in them than others, and some have more that is vicious and hurtful in them than others, but speaking generally, human nature is off the same piece everywhere. All are more or less good and all more or less bad. It is simply a question of degree, and Jesus showed his greatness and penetrance when he said to the accusing rabble: "He that is without sin let him cast the first stone," and the rabble, also, showed that it was not wholly vicious, for each accused felt condemned by his own conscience (showing he had such a thing as a conscience about him), and got out of sight as rapidly as he could conveniently. Some day, I think, men will talk about "criminal classes" or the "righteous," but they will talk about "righteousness," and on the other hand, whatever is hurtful to men, and the one will be upheld while the other will be condemned. When we consider, and are considered, and not personality, as the chief thing, we shall have broader and better views of human life and of the responsibilities that grow out of it.

Spain in the Philippines. (Sacramento Bee.)

While the history of Spain's dominion over the Philippines is one of misrule and heartless official plunder, in one respect the Spanish government was a little further than any of our imperialists propose, in the way of recognition of the Filipinos. For two brief periods—from 1810 to 1814, and from 1820 to 1823—the Filipinos had representatives in the cortes or parliament of Spain. And in 1810 the cortes declared the natives and free inhabitants of the Spanish provinces in America and Asia "equal in rights and privileges to those of the peninsula. It is true Spain never lived up to that principle, but it is a question of "dollars and cents" then "it might be as well to look this thing squarely in the face!"

REPLIES TO CORVALLIS GAZETTE. "The plea urged for the holding of a special session just before the regular session of the legislature next spring is, that the new officers will immediately be placed on flat salaries, and the initiative and referendum amendment will be in effect when the new legislature convenes. But the expense of a special session will amount to \$12,000 or \$15,000, besides the mileage to which members will be entitled. The new legislature can make the initiative and referendum just as effective as could their predecessors."

The above dodges the question. What is an expense of \$12,000 or \$15,000 compared to saving \$50,000 a year for four years, and putting the direct legislation club in the hands of the people, to hold over the regular session.

"Flat salaries, as advocated during the recent campaign, means larger salaries so far as taxpayers are concerned. The constitution now provides for a flat salary of \$1500 per annum for the governor. The flat salary in contemplation for that officer is probably \$5000."

The above again dodges. "Flat salaries" means to pay a fair, exact, fixed, reasonable price to each official per annum instead of as at present all kinds of salaries and fees and perquisites, in some instances amounting to \$15,000 to \$20,000 a year, and God alone knows how much more. It means that all above receipts of officers, a certain amount shall go into the state treasury.

The present salary of the secretary of state is \$1500. To be sure, that officer receives far more than this sum each year, but this extra amount does not come out of the state treasury. It is paid by private parties and corporations in the shape of fees. A "flat salary" for the secretary of state will mean a larger contribution from the state treasury, for that officer is entitled to more than \$1500 per year for his services. The state printer is on the fee system, and is paid in proportion to work done. His salary looks large on paper, but he pays his employees union wages, and this item of wages makes a hole in what he draws from the state."

As the editor of the above paper cannot trust his readers with the facts as to the present fees, perquisites, emoluments, compensations and indirect financial grants of over a hundred different sorts and descriptions, what is the use of answering the above? Those who prefer darkness to light should rely on such hired misrepresentations.

Some Figures on the Governor Vote. (Eugene Guard.) How was Chamberlain elected? Whoever took Furnish out on the canvass was responsible for the result. He would have been easily elected had he staid at home.

Let us do some figuring! In 1900 McKinley had 19,141 plurality over Bryan in a total vote of 79,911. McKinley got 46,828, and Bryan 33,855. Now the vote is practically divided evenly between Chamberlain and Furnish. Considering the presidential vote a party one, and allowing Furnish 1000 Democratic votes, Chamberlain was voted for by 7,570 Republicans, about one out of every six who voted for McKinley.

Of course factional differences were

largely responsible for the vote in Marion and Umatilla counties, while Chamberlain was popular at home—Portland. But those counties alone could not have elected Chamberlain. Furnish showed himself. That was enough. He was defeated.

VOTE FOR SENATOR

Gov. Geer Has Compiled Total Popular Vote

Governor Geer has canvassed the popular vote for United States senator cast at the recent election. The total vote received by Governor Geer was 4,587 as against 32,627 for C. E. S. Wood, the Democratic nominee, and 156 scattering. The Governor received a majority of 11,944 over all votes cast and a plurality of 12,070 over Mr. Wood. The Governor considers his vote a complimentary expression from the people since he received about 5,000 votes more than was received by either of the gubernatorial candidates.

GROVER CLEVELAND ON EDUCATION.

For the first time in the United States, the honorary degree of Doctor of Jurisprudence was conferred at the Augustinian College, a Philadelphia. The recipient was former President Cleveland, who had already had the degree of LL. D. conferred by the Princeton University.

The exercises were held in the college. Archbishop Ryan, presiding. Previous to conferring the diploma Mr. Cleveland spoke briefly as follows:

"This incident prominently suggests to my mind the imperative need of education which forbids the hindrance or disturbance of its high mission by religious discrimination, social intolerance or any of the barriers that to a greater or less extent separate civilized humanity. The republic of education is based upon identical aims, equal rights in its opportunity and impartiality in the distribution of its rewards, and honors."

"This, it seems to me, is impressively illustrated when the severely Catholic college of St. Thomas, of Villanova, bestows its highest honorary degree upon one connected with the management and holding an honorary degree in the severely Protestant Princeton University."

"The processes of education as they exist in this country of ours, have, or always should have, in addition to other characteristics, special harmony of purpose and design, as they are related to our government, and this should constitute between our institutions of learning a bond of close fraternity. Whatever other objects and purposes may be involved in educational efforts among us, one of its constant and prominent aims should be the cultivation and maintenance of the high standard of American citizenship."

"It will be a sad day for our nation when the forces of education and the teachers of moral living shall cease to strive in unity to leave the entire mass of our citizenship, or when their influence in that direction will be divided and circumscribed by religious and sectarian differences."
