Vacation days have arrived and there will probably be no more meetings of local clubs until September or October.

The practice class of parliamentary usage is growing in interest. It has been decided to hold the classes twice a week until further notice, at the home of Mrs. Alice H. Dodd, corner of Court and Cottage streets. The meetings for the coming week are on Wednesday and Saturday evenings, at 7:30 o'clock.

The Salem Woman's Club will hold a reception on Monday evening in the grounds of the residence of Judge and Mrs. S. R. Bean, at 20th and Court streets, providing the weather permits of an outdoor affair.

The event marks the first anniversary of the birth of the club, and will help to promote the good fellowship that has characterized the work of the past year. Each member is privileged to bring three guests. A program will be provided, the details of which are not yet at hand at present writing, the matter is to be considered, however, at the meeting of the club this afternoon.

The women of the Eugene Patriotic League have adopted plans and called for bids for the construction of a resting place for women, to be constructed in the county park, near the court house.

They simply could not refuse, we are sure of it, and after we have the seats we might get further help in beautifying the grounds. Let us make a beginning right now.

Mrs. Harriet Lane Johnson has been invited by King Edward, over his own signature, to attend the coronation ceremonies at Westminster. Mrs. Johnson was mistress of the White House when King Edward, then Prince of Wales, visited this country, in 1860. President Buchanan and his niece then entertained the royal guest. Forty-five years have passed since that event, and Mrs. Johnson is now an aged lady, but King Edward has not forgotten the fair hostess of the White House, who entertained him in the sixties. Nothing more royal than this simple act has yet characterized the reign of King Edward, and it plainly reveals the fact

that behind the purple of the eastern monarch beats the heart of the English gentleman.

As a rule, women stars have made, or at least saved, more money than those of the male persuasion. Lotta Lott, the stage worth \$2,000,000, Patti, Duse, Bernhardt and Rejane are all wealthy. Maggie Mitchell, retired, could write a check for \$400,000, and Viola Allen may do the same act for at least one-fourth of that sum. Julia Marlowe, Amelia Bingham and Modjeska are all rated at an equal figure, while Leslie Carter and May Irwin can easily go beyond that interesting and agreeable financial point.

In the big factory where the government's paper money is printed there are some very skillful women who get very small pay. This is notably true of the women who inspect and count the sheets of bills as they come from the presses. Each sheet contains four bills; each bill must be perfect. If there is ever so small a spot or flaw in the printing it is rejected. The women who inspect and throw out imperfect impressions are experts who have served in all capacities from printer's assistant up. They can detect a flaw in an instant, which could not be seen by an untrained eye. They inspect and count 15,000 sheets of bills a day, and they have to pass rigid examinations before they can get into the service at all.

Anna B. Shaw, who has repeatedly said in her lectures that man never did woman justice except once, and then he placed her as a figure of justice on top of the court house and blindfolded her, will be made glad again, for the postoffice department has under consideration the question of placing on one of the postage stamps of the new issue the head of some woman who is connected with the history of the country. While no particular person has been decided on, there seems to be no doubt that Martha Washington will be so honored and her picture will grace the stamp. This will be the first recognition of woman upon any of the government securities issued by that department.

At the eighteenth annual convention of the Philadelphia County Woman's Temperance Union Mrs. M. V. Stringer read a paper on "Narcotics," in which she said:

"It is currently reported in the newspapers that women in large numbers and various grades of society are of different nationalities are taking to the cigarette habit; that they even smoke cigars. If, as stated on good authority, the taste is transmitted from parent to child, why not to the girls as well as to the boys."

"The taste for alcoholic liquors is transmitted regardless of sex. Here is a subject that demands the greatest consideration. Think of it, ye fathers; ponder its import, ye mothers, and oh, ye maidens, beware of the smoker."

Mrs. Louise S. Rounds, former president of the Illinois W. C. T. U., speaking on the subject, said:

"Stop marrying young men who smoke, I tell the girls, and make them walk their way alone."

The Chauncey Depew Club of Des Moines has gained a far-reaching reputation through one of its many distinguished members having become one of the first ladies of the land, Mrs. Leslie M. Shaw, wife of Secretary Shaw. Mrs. Shaw, since her entrance into Washington society, has been regrettably missed from active work in the club of her native town.

An adult suffrage bill has passed both houses of the Australian Commonwealth Parliament, and is now law. Under it all adults, without regard to sex, have the right to vote for members of Parliament in the six provinces constituting the federation, and it carries with it the right to sit in Parliament if elected. Woman has thus been put on a political equality with man throughout the commonwealth. It is believed to be the first case on record where an entire federation has enfranchised all its women, and the experiment will be keenly watched everywhere.

When Prince Henry of Prussia was in this country he gallantly said: "The American women are lovely simply beautiful and charming!" The men who run newspapers as gallantly printed these encomiums of the prince, and all over the world the news was carried that a German prince had added his testimony to the charms of American women.

This is very well, perfectly meet and proper. But now comes the Countess de Rochambeau, on a visit to America for the first time, and declares: "I admire American men, oh, so much. They are handsome and stronger than ours."

Could anything be more delightful than this, coming from a charming French woman? Will it not now behoove the journals conducted by women to give as broad circulation to this statement in favor of the American men as did the journals run by the men to the statement of Prince Henry in favor of the American women? Here is our chance. Let us proclaim the American man as king by right of the queenly womanhood of America.

Agricultural Census Figures.

A census bulletin on agriculture in Oregon, just issued shows that farms of the state, on June 1, 1901, numbered 35,837, and were valued at \$132,337,514. Of this amount \$19,199,694, or 14.5 per cent., represents the value of buildings, and \$113,137,820, or 85.5 per cent., the value of land and improvements, other than buildings. The value of farm implements and machinery was \$6,506,725, and of livestock \$23,917,048. These values, added to that of farms, gave \$172,761,287 as the total value of farm property. The total value of farm products for 1901 was \$28,000,909, of which \$16,248,282, or 58 per cent., represents the value of annual products, and \$21,806,627, or 52.2 per cent., the value of crops, including the forest products cut or produced on farms. The gross farm income in Oregon in 1901 was \$31,896,248.

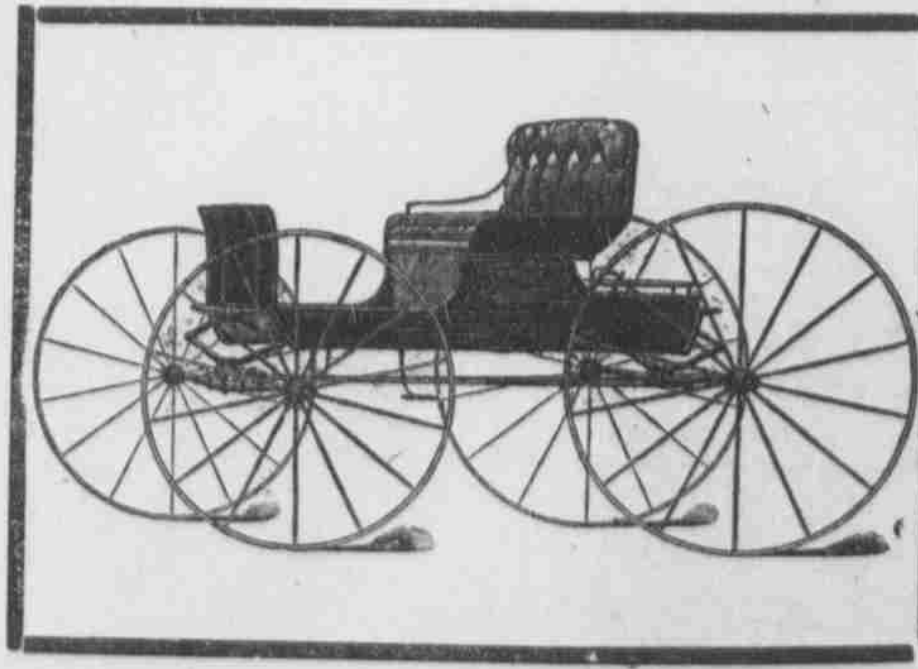
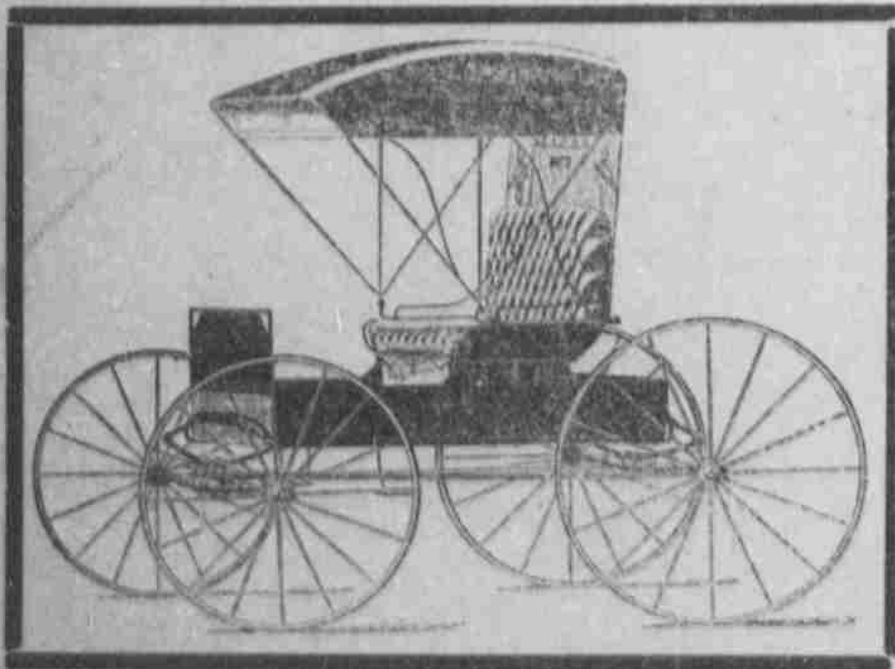
