MAKE IT TEN THOUSAND.

There are now nearly sixty petitions in the hands of Governor Geer, with from ten to one hundred and twenty names of citizens on each petition, asking for a special session to pass a flat salary law and put the referendum into effect.

With the petitions that are out and still being signed there must be in the neighborhood of five thousand names on paper by this time asking for the legislature to meet and put these two propositions into effect.

The demand for a flat salary law was so strong that all three political parties put it into their platforms and made their canvases on it. The sentiment in the Republican state convention was so strong that no faction opposed it.

The referendum was adopted by a vote of over three-fourths of all who voted at the election. All the political parties stood for that amendment to the constitution, and for flat salaries, and every man who was elected to the legislature was elected to pass that law.

But the laws will only be enacted if there is an uprising of the people to demand them. Make the petitions ten thousand this week.

But even after all the people of all political parties have demanded a great reform it takes the action of the legislature to put it into effect.

The petition printed in this paper should be cut out and circulated and sent in at once. It does not include the Lewis and Clark Expo. proposition.

The Portland politicians want half a million dollars for their fair, but that should be submitted to a vote of the people and not be saddled on the people by the legislature.

Give the people what they all demanded in the political platforms and let the Portland fair bill stand on its merits before the people.

Neither Geer nor Chamberlain should be compelled to shoulder that job. Give the people the referendum on that.

For the present let every citizen who wants Oregon state taxes reduced circulate the petitions for a special session to put the referendum into effect and enact flat salaries. That is the first duty.

Make the petitions so large and strong that no party or politician will dare oppose it. All promised that it is right. Now do it.

Raise the petitions to ten thousand this coming week.

JUSTICE TO JOS. LEE.

During the recent campaign J. D. Lee, superintendent of the penitentiary, was absent from that institution much of the time making stump speeches, and during the time his guards were given frequent leave of absence. This confirms the statement made several days ago that if Mr. Lee had given more attention to his duties and less to politics the outbreak at the penitentiary would likely not have occurred.—Portland Telegram.

This does Mr. Lee an injustice in one way, as he was out making speeches for the Republican ticket, and doing just what the same class of newspapers criticized Mr. Geer for not doing. In the counties where Mr. Lee spoke good returns came in for Mr. Furnish, so that Governor Geer was really magnanimous in letting Mr. Lee go on the stump for Mr. Furnish. When the outbreak took place, Mr. Lee was one of the first on the ground and was one of the first in pursuit and left nothing undone to effect a capture.

ARID LAND SURVEYS.

At the request of Representative Moody, the geological survey will send three field parties into Eastern Oregon this summer. I. C. Russell will spend the season in making surface examinations in the northern extremities of Malheur and Harney counties, to determine the amount of artesian water available for irrigation, and the probable depth to which wells must be sunk. Last summer he conducted similar examinations throughout the southern part of Idaho.

A second party, which spent last season in making triangulations to the west of Baker City, will continue this same work east and north from that point, paying particular attention to the Cornucopia mining district. As soon as the triangulation is completed it is intended to have this mineral belt more closely examined with a view to determining the extent and richness of ore deposits in a manner similar to the Lindgren examination of the Blue Mountain gold fields a year ago.

A third party will be sent into the Blue Mountains to locate feasible sites for storage reservoirs, with a view to their ultimate use by the general government, under the new irrigation law of their utilization by private enterprise. The department is convinced that the waters from streams rising in the Blue Mountains, if properly stored and controlled, can be made to reclaim large tracts of lands that are now practically valueless. Examinations for reservoir sites will also be made in a part of Crook county and along the Deschutes river.

HANNA AND ROOSEVELT.

The Republican convention of Ohio was so lavishly unreserved in its devotion to Hanna that Roosevelt's friends have thought best to suffer in silence no longer. So Congressman Burton, of Cleveland, has gone into training against Hanna for the senatorship, and has interested President Roosevelt into breaking into Hanna's civil service reserves. These reserves were early set aside for Mr. Hanna by the late President McKinley, and so scandalous were the subsequent appointments to federal office in Cleveland that the federal building had acquired the name of "Hanna's retreat." Whenever a Hanna politician has lost his job in the city or county Hanna has promptly landed him at a federal desk, no other qualifications being required than fidelity to Hanna. Yet no account was taken of the civil service scandal by the truly good Republicans like Mr. Burton, until Mr. Hanna's disgraceful doings were discovered "stacking the cards" against the administration.

That was indeed scandalous, and Mr. Burton complained directly to President Roosevelt, who is reported to have decided to investigate. In the very face of Hanna's protests. "The affair may be smoothed over," said the inspired report; but smoothing over is rapidly out of the question. Though this particular squabble over "Hanna's retreat" may be quieted down, and though in itself it is a small affair, the contest between Hanna and Roosevelt over the presidential nomination of their party, of which this squabble is only a preliminary skirmish, is in its nature irreconcilable. It cannot be smoothed over until after the national convention adjourns.

In the meantime it is to be assumed that Mr. Hanna will use civil service officials to the fullest extent of his power to promote his ambitions. As a politician he is essentially a spoilsman, and makes no pretense of being anything better. Mr. Roosevelt is probably not a spoilsman in the same way that Mr. Hanna is; but it is doubtful if any one in political authority has done more than he to nullify the merit system. Though he posed well enough as a friend of the merit system while he was a civil service reform agitator, he has as president given it a solar plexus blow. On the 29th of May he issued an executive interpretation of the civil service rules which enables spoilsmen in office to discharge subordinates with the same freedom that spoilsmen enjoyed before any merit rules had been adopted. They need only say that the discharge is not for political or religious reasons, and that ends it. The reason may be political or religious, in fact, and even the reason which is acknowledged may have no bearing whatever upon the civil service qualifications of the victim, but at the word he goes.—Louis Post's paper, The Public.
