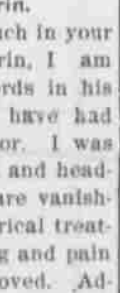
A Correction.

Their house of worship has been enlarged, the old country-looking edifice has been reconstructed with a new wing added, the old square belfry replaced with a pretty spire, the whole painted and made a comfortable church with all modern conveniences.

As the only church in the southern suburb it serves a large circle of families in a progressive and intelligent part of the community. The people are to be congratulated on the fine improvement that has been made, as the old structure had become antiquated and uncomfortable. R. C. Blackwell and his devoted wife, Dedication Service.
Presiding Elder Watters read from the Discipline the dedication service. Rev. Parsons, of the First church, offered prayer. Rev. Blackwell, pastor of Leslie church, read from the old scripture. Rev. Leach read from the new scripture. Mrs. Miller, the secretary, read the subscriptions in money and labor, to the amount of about \$500. The cost of the improvement is about \$1200. The church is reconstructed upon the old foundations. About \$400 was obtained from the church extension fund; \$300 remained to be raised. After the sermon the congregation were asked to raise this sum.

The building will seat about 150 to 200, by placing chairs in the Sunday School room, which can be separated from the rest by two large folding doors. The sermon by Bishop Earl Cranston was from a text taken from Exodus 3:5. The old church was erected thirty-four years ago.

Chairman Chamberlain announced the following committees, himself as chairman of the board, to be ex-officio chairman of each committee: Finance, Condit and Byrd; supplies, Fletcher and Davidson; insurance, Fletcher and Condit; repairs, Davidson and Byrd.
