DECREE IN SUIT FOR ACCOUNTING

Circuit Judge Boise Finds for the Plaintiffs

In the Steeves vs. Willis Bros. & Co. Litigation

In the suit for an accounting of D. D. Steeves, Charles Craggett and Lydia Steeves, vs. Willis Bros. & Co., Circuit Judge R. P. Boise has rendered a decree for the plaintiffs. The defendants in the case were Eugene Willis and wife, and Percy Willis and wife, but the case was dismissed as to Percy Willis and wife. The court finds that Eugene Willis, as president of the corporation, had collected money belonging to the corporation equal to 40 per cent. of the total capital stock of \$18,500, amounting to \$7,400, for which he had rendered no account to the stockholders, except the sum of 6 per cent. of \$1080. The court further decrees that Willis, being a trustee of the balance, amounting to \$6,120, that he pay the sum over to the stockholders of the corporation.

J. H. McNary and B. F. Bonham were the attorneys for the plaintiff. For the defendants Brown & Wrightman appeared for Eugene Willis and wife, while R. J. Fleming represented Percy Willis ex ux.

EUGENE PIONEER IS DEAD

Maria McCormack, Mother of E. P. McCormack

Mrs. Marie McCormack, an Oregon pioneer of 1855, and mother of E. P. McCormack, of this city, died at her home in Eugene suddenly, of heart failure, early Monday morning. She was aged 78 years.

Mary Eakin McCormack was born near Londonderry, Ireland, January 7, 1824. She came to America in 1855, with her parents, who settled in Kane county, Illinois. In 1842 she married Andrew McCormack. They crossed the plains with ox teams in 1853, and settled late in the fall, near Olympia, Washington. In 1858 they came to Lane county, residing here ever since. Andrew McCormack died in 1872.

Twelve children survive them, as follows: W. R. McCormack, of Florence; E. A. H. F. and Miss Mary E. McCormack, Mrs. C. M. Collier and Mrs. J. E. Stevenson, of Eugene; Dr. W. A. McCormack, of Mendocino, Cal.; E. P. McCormack, of Salem; Mrs. Dr. P. G. Goulet, of Portland; J. K. McCormack, of Palouse, Washington; Mrs. F. A. Wells, of San Francisco, and Frank H. McCormack, of Klamath Falls.
