Salem merchants have contributed liberally in prizes for the street sports and the manner of distributing the prizes will add greater interest to the events. A list has been prepared for the events, and placed in envelopes equal in number to the number of events on the program. In this manner the prizes will be distributed, and no one will know what the prizes for any particular event are until the contents of the envelopes are examined.

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Structure Will Replace the One Blown Down in 1901

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Five bids were submitted. The proposals were of a compound nature, consisting of an offer for the construction of the 174-foot span, the entire structure to be covered and painted, and a bid per lineal foot for the construction of an approach, the length of which has not yet been decided by the courts. The bids were:

C. A. Gray, Salem, bridge \$3999; approach \$140 per foot.

J. B. Tolpeltson, Albany, bridge \$4294; approach \$149 per foot.

C. P. Royal & Son, Salem, bridge, \$4475; approach \$155 per foot.

W. H. Mulhollen, Corvallis, bridge \$4500; approach \$155 per foot.

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The contract was awarded to Mr. Gray of this city.

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The Marion and Linn county courts will hold a joint meeting Saturday afternoon, when bids will be opened for the construction of a new west approach to the Willamette river steel bridge at Salem.

River Engineers' Strike.
People residing at way landings, where there is no rail connection, will feel the strike more than will the residents of Salem. Inquiry at the O. R. & N. dock elicits the information that the Steamer Pomona, which is operated by the O. R. & N. Company, an independent organization, will reach Salem on schedule time this evening, since its engineer and firemen are non-union men. They do not sympathize with the strikers in their present trouble, and they have remained at their posts.

Whale-Gatch Case in Court.
The suit for an accounting of C. A. Whale vs. Gatch, as receiver of the Gilbert Bros. bank, is today being heard by Circuit Judge Boise. The action has resulted from a misinterpretation of a contract in relation to the sale by Whale of musical instruments, in which the defendant corporation had an interest. The case is a complex one, and presents one phase of the bank litigation that has been engaging and will continue to receive the attention of the courts for several months. Henry St. Rayner, of Portland, and H. J. Dinger, of this city, appeared for Mr. Whale, while Brown & Wrightman and G. O. Bingham, of this city, represented Receiver Gatch.
