WILL BE CROWNED MONDAY

Newly Elected County Officers To Begin Their Duties

Sketch of Those Who Will Serve in a Public Capacity

On Monday morning the newly-elected Marion county officers will assume charge of their respective departments for the two-years' term for which they have been elected. The political complexion of the officers-elect is the same as of recent years—all Republicans with the exception of the sheriff, who is a Democrat. The retiring officers, Clerk W. W. Hall, Sheriff F. W. Durbin, Treasurer O. L. Downing and Recorder J. H. Roland, abandon the work of their respective offices with the satisfying consciousness of a public service faithfully and impartially rendered, that for an economical record has for substantial evidence the complete extermination of an indebtedness of \$100,000.

The officers-elect will take up the work of their predecessors with the determination, voiced in their party platforms, to render an economical and efficient administration of the county's affairs. A brief sketch, with accompanying cuts of the new officers, is presented herewith.

Sheriff B. B. Colbath.

Ben B. Colbath, who succeeds Sheriff Frank W. Durbin, is a native Oregonian. He was born in Salem, April 22, 1866, and with the exception of eight years spent in Washington, where he followed his trade, that of a millwright and contractor, he has always lived in Salem. In July, 1898, Mr. Colbath was appointed deputy by Sheriff Durbin and six months later was promoted to chief deputy, Frank Derby having resigned. He continued as chief deputy during Sheriff Durbin's two terms and has the necessary qualifications born from experience for conducting this important department of our county government to which he has been elected by a neat majority in a strong Republican county. Sheriff-elect Colbath was the only Democrat elected in this county at the recent election. The nearest any other Democrat came to carrying the county was about 1200 votes. Mr. Colbath has a wife and one son. He is a member of the Woodmen of the World, Native Sons, and Salem Lodge No. 336, B. P. O. E. He has lived in the court house the past two years, and will for the present continue his residence there. He will without a doubt make a competent, accommodating and efficient official.

Treasurer W. Y. Richardson.

W. Y. Richardson, the county treasurer-elect, was born in Linn county, Oregon, June 24, 1864, three miles southeast of Stayton on June 2, 1864. In 1874 he moved to Stayton, where he obtained his education. He commenced the livery business with his father in 1885, and in 1887 continued the business alone. He then bought out the Thomas Bros. stables, and they remained in business until 1894, when he moved to Salem, and became a partner of Downing & Thomas in the Club stables. In October, 1895, he was married to Miss Maud Kress, of this city, and lived here until the fall of 1898, and then moved back to Stayton. He served the town of Stayton as councilman for four terms, and as mayor one term. He is a charter member of the Woodmen of the World, Stayton Camp, and his parents are among the oldest and best known people in Oregon. In 1891 he began the strawberry business, and continued it for three years.

County Commissioner Wm. Miley.

The electors of Marion county are not slow to reward efficiency on the part of a public official, this explains for the re-election of an increased majority of County Commissioner Wm. Miley, of Aurora. During his four years' service Mr. Miley assisted in accomplishing the liquidation of \$100,000 county indebtedness, and the placing of the county on a cash basis. Mr. Miley is a pioneer resident, and has for years been identified with the county's interests. He was a member of the Aurora colony that emigrated to Oregon from Missouri in 1863, and has ever since been numbered among the substantial residents of the county.

Assessor Chas. Lembecke.

The thorough and satisfactory administration of this important department by Chas. Lembecke, during his first term, that has just ended, was rewarded by his re-election by an enormous vote. Mr. Lembecke is a native of Germany, and has lived in the north end of the county since 1882. Prior to that time he was employed as railroad blacksmith in Michigan, Wisconsin and other states, and also served five years in the same capacity in Oregon. At the time of his election for the first term Mr. Lembecke was engaged in farming near Butteville. Without desiring to flatter Mr. Lembecke, it may be truly said that his work in the assessor's department has never been excelled. His assessment rolls have been the most complete and accurate in the history of the county.

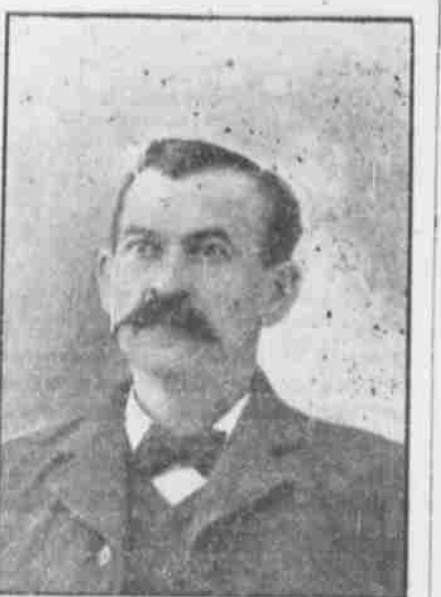

STORY OF A MAN WHO HELPED MAKE HISTORY

He Fought in the Famous Seventeenth Indiana Volunteers—Some of His Experiences.

Hall as county clerk, is a native of Illinois, where he was born in 1848, and has for 50 years been a resident of Marion county, having crossed the plains with his parents in 1852. Mr. Roland obtained his education at the Jefferson Institute, and for 16 years successfully engaged in the general merchandise business, removing to Salem about five years ago. Since his residence in the Capital City, Mr. Roland has conducted an insurance and guarantee bond business, which has been disposed of to H. Frank Meredith. Mr. Roland will devote his entire time to the management of his department of the county government, and with the qualifications he possesses for the work, there is no question but his administration will be most satisfactory.
