MARKLEY PLEADED NOT GUILTY

His Attorney's Insist Case Be Deferred Until October

John F. Markley, charged with the murder of John D. Fain, at Champoux, this morning pleaded not guilty to the information. His attorneys, Messrs. Carson and Adams, of this city, and John M. Gearn, of Portland, asked that the trial be deferred until the October term. In support of the motion, they contended that the best interests of the community would be served by the postponement, since the feeling against Markley had been augmented by the wholesale murders being committed by a fugitive convict, and that these conditions were adverse to insuring for the defendant a fair and impartial trial, as a disposition existed to punish somebody for some crime. Markley's attorneys said they were making investigations that promised to substantiate the protestations of the defendant as to the innocence of the crime for which he is charged.

Judge Burnett held that since the district attorney had refused to agree to a postponement of the case that it was incumbent upon the defense to show grounds why a continuance should be granted. Counsel for the defendant was given until 3 o'clock this afternoon to prepare an application for the continuance of the case. The application will be argued and considered by the court later this afternoon.

CHURCH PEOPLE OBSERVE

Fiftieth Anniversary Founding of Salem Church

Congregationalists Semi-Centennial Sermon

The initial service of a five days' program of exercises incident to the fiftieth anniversary of the organization of the First Congregational church, of this city, was held Sunday morning. The anniversary sermon was preached by Rev. P. S. Knight, who for 17 consecutive years, served the Salem congregation as pastor in the early history of the church. The auditorium was beautifully decorated with festoons of evergreens and flowers. Special music was given by the choir, which was under the direction of Francesco Seely, and included the following: Misses Heulst, Lewis, Cavanaugh and Raymond; Messrs Purvine, Fletcher and Boesch. The organists were Miss Beatrice Shelton and Miss Winnifred Byrd. Little Miss Lillian Stoege played the violin.

Rev. Mr. Knight selected as a text Leviticus 25:10—"and ye shall hallow the fiftieth year, and proclaim liberty throughout all the land unto all the inhabitants thereof; it shall be a jubilee unto you; and ye shall return every man unto his possession, and ye shall return every man unto his family." In his address, Rev. Knight omitted all reminiscences of a historical character, explaining that this phase of the history of the Salem church would be reviewed at subsequent programs. The speakers said this was a strenuous age, and that the full meaning of the half century just ended could be measured only by events, not by an increase in area or growth of population. In the period covered by the life of the Salem church, 5,000,000 slaves had been freed; the expansion along educational lines had fully equalled that in area and in population, through the agency of science there had resulted marvelous productions of home and public conveniences. At the time the Salem church was organized in 1852, there were only four churches in the territory represented in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana, with a combined membership of less than 100. At the present time the same district has more than 200 churches, with a membership exceeding 10,000. A single word—liberty—was representative of the work. Liberty implies justice, equality, universal kindness and helpfulness. True liberty implies physical, intellectual and spiritual life, while life implies growth and growth progress. A clear and practical interpretation of "ye shall return every man unto his possessions" is the symbol of the final jubilee. Have we by any act lost our right to those promised possessions? In spiritual things we are more apt to live beneath rather than beyond our means. We should strive to be equal to all our opportunities, large in charities, and earnest in our activities. Let us be thankful for the past, glad in the present, and ready to receive in the future such downpouring of the Holy Spirit that would prove a veritable Pentecost.

Special Sunday School exercises were held at the noon hour, and at 6 o'clock in the afternoon a reunion service was held by the Y. P. S. C. E., the meeting being addressed by Rev. J. N. Smith, a prominent missionary worker in the state. At 7 o'clock Sunday evening a twilight communion service, including the reception of new members, was conducted, the address being delivered by Rev. C. F. Clapp, superintendent of home missions.

Tonight's Program.

The exercises this evening will be of a historical character, and, in addition to the several musical numbers, will include two addresses, as follows: "Oregon and Salem of 1852," by Hon. R. B. Holse, judge of the circuit court.
